1. WELCOME

2. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 10th NOVEMBER 2006

The Minutes of the meeting held on 10th November 2006, subject to the following adjustments, were accepted as an accurate record.

4. MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

- (a) The minutes of the Community Planning Management Committee meeting held on 7th February 2007, copies having previously been circulated were noted. An amendment was noted to Item 8(c) of the minutes Initiative at the Edge "the fast passenger ferry may not go ahead this year until funding is secured for the <u>revenue</u>", not the infrastructure. It was also noted that Initiative at the Edge were currently sourcing potential funders in order to fund three months' revenue which would help to show the need and develop the longer term sustainability.
- (b) The Partnership also noted the activities of the Committee Chair, Andrew Campbell, since the Partnership meeting held on 10th November 2006.

Matters arising from the Migrant Workers Forum held in Oban on 20th November 2006 were discussed and it was agreed that partners would do all they could to assist in attracting workers to the area. The Bute and Cowal Local Community Planning Pilot review meeting held in Strachur on 1st December 2006 was very successful, with positive feedback received.

PILOT SUSTAINABILITY WORKSHOP

1. SUMMARY

Highlands and Islands Enterprise (HIE) with University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI) Policy Web organised a seminar series with a range of senior speakers who presented their thoughts and visions on the sustainable development challenges for the Highlands and Islands, as a UK peripheral and rural region, in the first two decades of the 21st century.

The seminar series ran from September 2006 until June 2007 and there is now a proposal to develop this further with a pilot sustainability workshop in Argyll and Bute.

This paper provides detail and invites CPP partners to discuss the proposal.

2. BACKGROUND

Sustainable Development is development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. It involves achieving a balance within economic, social and environmental agendas. Focusing too much on one of these agendas potentially undermines the others.

Sustainable development therefore involves joining up activity, thinking more about the consequences of our choices and gradually changing our domestic and business behaviours. This in turn will create opportunities for new ways of linking business, local communities and the environment, new learning and skills and identifying new business opportunities. By identifying what these changes will mean for the future, the foundations can be built to let us realise these opportunities.

Highlands and Islands Enterprise (HIE) with University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI) organised a seminar series between September 2006 and June 2007 with the following three main objectives:

- To raise awareness of main sustainable development issues for the Highlands and Islands and how stakeholders propose to respond to challenges and opportunities;
- To allow stakeholders to think more strategically about the implications of sustainable development for their own organisations, and to 'join up' their own thinking with others:

 To assist in the development of UHI by providing a series of events, and potential output, to bind those UHI partners involved in a sustainable development research assessment exercise submission in 2007-8.

The seminar series included lectures from Chief Executives, Chairs and Heads of Service from the Scottish Executive's Environment and Rural Affairs Department (SEERAD), Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA), Highland Council, Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH), Highlands and Islands Enterprise, Communities Scotland, Macaulay Land Use Research Institute, Shell Exploration and Production, and the Centre for Rural Health.

3. DETAIL: PROPOSED SUSTAINABILITY WORKSHOP

Campbeltown / Ballycastle Ferry Service

1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report seeks the ongoing support of the Argyll and Bute Community Planning Partnership for the reinstatement of the Campbeltown – Ballycastle Ferry service.

2. RECOMMENDATION

- 2.1 That the CPP writes to the Scottish Transport Minister Stewart Stevenson and Northern Irish First Minister, Ian Paisley, seeking the reinstatement of the £300,000 p.a. subsidy from the Northern Ireland Office and the immediate re-tender of the service.
- 2.2 That the CPP asks constituency and regional MSP's, and their own particular oganisations, to write in similar terms.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 A summer only ferry service between Campbeltown (Scotland) and Ballycastle (Northern Ireland) was established in the late 1990's. Necessary infrastructure was installed e.g. ferry terminal in Campbeltown, however the service proved commercially unviable due to short operating period and restricted marketing activity.
- 3.3 Significant interest in the route has been maintained across a range of strategic partners within the Highlands and Islands and Northern Ireland who recognise the potential of the route as an economic and cultural catalyst for the area and a key tourism driver for the West Highlands.
- 3.4 The Scotland/Ireland Cross Border Programme is currently being prepared by the Special EU Programmes body in Ireland and the Scottish Executive. The broad priorities are likely to support a range of activities including enterprise, tourism, transportation and environment many of which could add value to such a transport link.
- 3.5 In September 2005 the Scottish Executive and Northern Ireland office announced the issue of tenders for the route on a basis of £1m p.a. subsidy over a five year contract period. £700,000 of the subsidy was to be met by the Scottish Executive with the balance (£300K) being met by the Northern Ireland office. No tenders were received from the four original bidders.
- 3.6 Following representations from interested parties, including potential operators, the Scottish Executive and the Northern Ireland office agreed in March 2006 that a final effort be made to identify any potential ferry operator, however prior to the tender being reissued the Northern Ireland office in October 2006 withdrew their funding commitment.

3.7 The return to devolved government within the Northern Ireland Assembly presents a significant opportunity for the funding commitment to be reasserted. The First Minister, Ian Paisley represents Ballycastle within his constituency and has always been a supporter of the route.

EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

1. SUMMARY

1.1 Argyll and Bute Council has produced an Equality Impact Assessment toolkit that can be used by partner organisations. This report describes how the toolkit was developed, outlines the process for Equality Impact Assessment and sets out the process for rolling out the toolkit.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Public authorities have a statutory duty to promote equality and as part of this need to carry out impact assessments in terms of race, disability and gender. All policies and functions should be impact assessed to ensure that they do not have a negative impact on people in the different equality target groups.
- 2.2 Equality Impact Assessments should help to develop more customerled services by involving people in the assessment process. This also helps to encourage greater openness about policy-making.

3. EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT (EqIA)

- 3.1 The EqIA is a forward-looking planning tool that allows us to:
 - Engage with communities
 - Assess the impact of our work on diverse groups of people within communities and take action where there are any negative impacts
 - Monitor the affects of our functions and policies over time, and take action where there are any negative impacts.
- 3.2 All new functions and policies need to be assessed and the Council also has a programme to review its current policies and functions. Equality Impact Assessments are carried out by policy makers, managers and lead officers in consultation with relevant groups, individuals and partners.
- 3.3 Equality Impact Assessments focus on people who are at risk of discrimination and social exclusion. Equality Target Groups are:
 - Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) people
 - Disability
 - Gender

- LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender)
- Belief (religious or political)
- Age (younger and older)

4. DEVELOPING THE TOOLKIT

- 4.1 The toolkit was developed by, firstly, reviewing equality impact assessment toolkits used by other public sector organisations and the guidance produced by the equality commissions. The Council's Policy and Strategy team worked with the Best Value Network to draft the Equality Impact Assessment Toolkit. Discussions were held with other councils about their approach and the user feedback that they had received. A development day was held to trial the draft toolkit and to provide an opportunity for input from users.
- 4.2 The result is a simple process that officers find easy to use and therefore it is more likely to be used.

5. ROLLING IT OUT

- 5.1 Within the Council, half-day workshops have been held to train officers who will carry out Equality Impact Assessments. The Improvement Service has promoted the toolkit via its website and has supported a workshop for other local authorities who had expressed interest in using the toolkit. Communities Scotland has also offered to support an equalities training event for community planning partners to include a workshop on the toolkit.
- 5.2 There is a requirement for service users, project partners, and officers with knowledge of the policy, function or project, to be involved in the impact assessment process. The Council's Policy and Strategy team can provide support for consultation and research and help officers to access relevant data.
- 5.3 The results of Equality Impact Assessments are reported to elected Members through the normal committee papers process. There is also a half-yearly report to the Strategic Management Team and a list of assessments carried out will be published on the Council's website.
- 5.4 Community Planning Partners are welcome to use the Equality Impact Assessment toolkit.

6. CONCLUSION

6.1 In conclusion, the Council has developed an Equality Impact
Assessment toolkit in order to improve services. The process of
developing the toolkit involved the officers who were going to use it.
The result has been a simple and easy to use Equality Impact
Assessment process. The toolkit has been shared with other local
authorities and with community planning partners in Argyll and Bute.

Argyll and Bute Community Planning Partnership

Health and Well Being Theme Group (HWTG) Update

Good progress has been made on the review of the HWTG since the last report. It is felt that there is value gained from meeting as a group and Terms of Reference for the group have been drafted (see next page). The Management Committee is asked to approve those Terms of Reference. A sub group has been formed to take some of the more routine matters allowing the wider group to have time to discuss more strategic issues.

Review of the HWTG has also led to review of the co-ordination of the Local Public Health Networks (LPHNs). The role and remit of the Co-ordinator has been agreed. As previously noted some of the LPHNs are functioning better than others and action has been agreed to provide specific support for those networks that have additional needs.

A number of the Health Improvement Fund (HIF) projects (fully or partly funded by HIF) had completed recent evaluation. The total value of HIF monies spent by the projects was £38,300. The range of monies dispersed was £600 - £15,000. The main themes that money was directed towards were:

- Community capacity and knowledge
- Tackling social isolation for vulnerable groups, particularly older adults
- Increasing integration of public health work at a local level
- Physical activity
- Support for domiciliary patients and carers
- Healthy eating
- Social skills

Report on the April 2007 meeting of the Argyll and the Islands Local Economic Forum to Argyll & Bute Community Planning Partnership

Ken Abernethy updated the group on the major projects which HIE Argyll and the Islands (HIE AI) are pursuing.

The Marine Science initiative, which revolves around SAMS and the cluster of small biotechnology companies, should progress as the objections to the local area plan have been withdrawn. Planning permission for the Dunstaffnage site has been sought. The proposed development should include halls of residence and the opening up of estate land for further housing, the latter as part of the North Argyll Initiative run by Argyll and Bute Council. The impact of the expected population increase in the area should be recognised by community planners with specific regard to health services.

Argyll and Bute Council have put the Argyll Air Services out to tender. This will involve airlinks to Coll, Colonsay and Oban. It is anticipated that there would also be a daily air passenger service from Oban to/from Glasgow and this should benefit the marine science initiative, opening up easy access to international air routes.

A number of initiatives have been undertaken during the year to engage closely with local businesses within the National Park area, covering, amongst other things, the waterfront development, town centre improvements and environmental assets.

Jura and Coll remain within the Initiative at the Edge programme and both have developed healthy community groups that have challenging projects in mind. Although Colonsay is no longer in the scheme, HIE Al would continue to give support according to need.

HIE has produced an Economic Update publication and the contents were reviewed by the LEF group. The population of Argyll and the Islands increased 1.7% from 2001 to 2005. The median house price in Argyll and the Islands in 2005 was £82K compared to £88K in the Highlands and Islands. There were 5.5 new start ups per 1000 population in 2005 compared to 4.7 in the Highlands and Islands.

There was some discussion about unemployment rates and the dependency of the tourism sector on seasonal migrant workers. It was agreed that there are local variations in the number of unemployed available seeking work.

Unemployment in the LEF area was covered by Ken MacTaggart during his presentation. The figure for February 2007 was higher than for the previous months and is expected to top out in March. Overall, the unemployment figures are neither as high nor the fluctuation as great as in previous years, probably as a result of the seasonal migrant workers.

New business formation is counted by the LEF when a new business bank account is opened. Although there was a drop in early 2006, the numbers of new starts picked up by the end of the year. This corresponded closely to a change in HIE policy and also indicated high penetration by HIE AI in the new starts sector.

Broadband coverage was discussed. The problem appears now to be one of capacity, particularly for some areas on Mull.

1. WELCOME AND APOLOGIES

The Chair welcomed everyone to the Meeting, with a special welcome to the new members of the LEF.

Apologies were noted from Matt Mochar and Jim McAloon.

2. MATTERS ARISING FROM MEETING HELD ON 28 FEBRUARY 2007

2.1 **Common Branding**

Aileen Edwards had met with the Secretariats of the three Alliances. The issue of a common logo or branding was discussed, which all Alliances would share, and which would demonstrate the connection to the LEF. The Secretariat would work with Comms to come up with a strapline. This will be done over the next couple of months.

Action: Secretariat to progress common branding. Sub Group to meet and Andy Jones and Gary Groves to attend.

3. RECRUITMENT OF NEW MEMBERS TO THE FORUM

Two new private sector members have recently been recruited onto the LEF. Stuart Cordner of Cruise Loch Lomond and Andy Jones of Cloudline were identified, and were in attendance. The Chair asked each of them to say a few words about themselves.

Stuart Cordner said that his business ran cruises on Loch Lomond and was expanding into the Corporate and Wedding Markets. The Company ran 40-50 wedding cruises per annum. They had just purchased a new vessel bringing the fleet to six, which makes Cruise Loch Lomond the largest operator in the country.

Andy Jones told the LEF that Cloudline's business was advertising, marketing and PR covering most industry sectors. Andy had worked within the public sector for the past 10 years working with the Scottish Executive, working on Glasgow's Miles Better and the City of Architecture when it was hosted by Glasgow.

Alison informed the LEF that new Local Authority representatives would be coming onto the LEF subsequent to the recent election. There are also new members from VisitScotland and JobCentre Plus. She went on to say that, as a result, the next meeting of the LEF would be a half day Away Day for a teambuilding exercise. She was looking for volunteers to help scope out the half day, and Andrew McAllister and Andy Jones both offered their help.

Action: Small sub group to meet with Andy Jones and Andrew McAllister to progress LEF Away Day

4. TOWN CENTRES DISCUSSION

David McGregor explained to the new members that the LEF had previously discussed the Town Centres (TCs), which had been raised by the Chambers of Commerce and the Federation of Small Businesses who were concerned about the national situation regarding TCs and the drain of out of town retail outlets.

The LEF had asked Scottish Enterprise Dunbartonshire to investigate the position of TCs. Copies of the responses had been circulated to the LEF.

A full discussion was held around the issue of town centres within each of the Dunbartonshire local authorities. All three Local Authorities are clearly committed to investing within their town centres, however there do appear to be issues with retaining and attracting businesses. In particular this seems to be related to an issue around business rates and increases in rental charges within some town centres.

Fraser Campbell felt that, if this is the case, we should be working with other LEFs to bring the issue up to a national level. Kevin Williams said that the recommendation is that small towns should be expecting help from the Scottish Executive.

Aileen Edwards said that she could raise this with the three-monthly meeting of the LEF Co-ordinators to ascertain whether any of them would be willing to jointly lobby the Scottish Executive. Crawford McGhie said that the reduction of business rates was high on the agenda of all parties during the local elections. There is money available to the Local Authorities for town centres from the Scottish Executive which, in the past, had to be bid for. However, it is currently unclear how these funds will be allocated.

It was agreed that, as a first step, a letter would be written to the Scottish Executive raising the issues discussed.

Action: The Secretariat to draft a letter on impact of business rates in town centres to be sent to the Scottish Executive on behalf of the LEF. Secretariat to raise issue at LEF Co-ordinators' Group.

5. NATIONAL PARK – PLANNING, PERSPECTIVE PRESENTATION

The Chair welcomed Gordon Watson, Director of Planning for the National Park, to the Meeting. Gordon gave a presentation on Planning in Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park.

He explained the differences between Local Authority Planning and Planning in the National Park, together with the key planning issues and challenges.

The National Park covers a wide area, crossing various Local Authorities and SE LECs. The NP has a responsibility for conservation, which has to be balanced with other considerations. It receives 450-470 planning applications a year, of which 90% are approved. Its policy framework was inherited from four council areas.

The National Park aims are:-

- to conserve and enhance the natural and cultural heritage of the area.
- to promote sustainable use of the natural resource of the area.
- to promote understanding and enjoyment of the special qualities of the area by the public, and
- to promote sustainable social and economic development of the communities in the area.

Unlike Local Authorities, the National Park Authority has to prepare a Park Plan and give greater weight to conservation aim where other aims are in conflict. The National Park Plan is effective from 2007-2012 and was approved in March 2007.

Gordon told the LEF that the new National Park Headquarters will be a building which embodies the aims of the National Park. He added that new legislation had come in before the election, which means that the National Park will become the sole planning authority for its area.

Following the presentation, Gordon responded to questions from the LEF. He told them that the amount of investment in tourism development has increased over the years in the National Park. He also said that the National Park takes account of Local Plans of all the Councils in their area.

In relation to the communities within the Park, the Communities Futures programme had been set up to help communities have control over their future development.

Regarding rural development, the National Park is looking at which type of development would be best to invest in. Farming, in general, is less viable and farms have to look at diversification.

Gordon also talked about climate change and mentioned that Loch Lomond had flooded in the past and this could have an effect on development. He went on to say that there has to be a balance between the attractiveness of the area for the visitor and the people who live in the area, and planning policy would reflect this.

Aileen Edwards said that this was of specific concern to the Federation of Small Businesses and the Chambers of Commerce, and asked if Gordon could come back to them with the Authority's Plan.

Action: Gordon Watson to provide Chambers of Commerce and FSB with a copy of the NP Planning Authority Plan.

6. **CONSTRUCTION ALLIANCE UPDATE**

John Allan of the Construction Alliance joined the Forum to give a presentation on the Dunbartonshire Construction Alliance, together with a demonstration of its website (www.dunbartonshireca.org).

John went on to say that the Alliance had established a new logo and the new website was designed and live. The Alliance had 89 local construction companies and four national contractors registered on its website and had an agreement with Scottish Construction News to link to their website. It had also arranged for 18 apprenticeships through the West Dunbartonshire Council's NEET Construction Apprenticeship Training Programme. The National Park is also looking to take on an apprentice.

He said that most of the Dunbartonshire construction businesses were small. The Construction Alliance can contract locally and encourage people to take on apprentices from the local area. He told the Meeting that most vacancies come through the JobCentre Plus website for sites that the Alliance can access.

The Forum agreed that the Construction Alliance had performed well for its first year. Fraser Campbell asked if there was anything the Alliance wanted the Forum to do to help continue the success into its second year. John Allan replied that the aim of the Alliance is to bring agencies in and talk face to face with construction companies. One of the main objectives is to start up Working Groups, which the Alliance would facilitate to get people together to exchange ideas and keep communication open. The LEF will help to get to the key players who the Construction Alliance can then bring to the table.

7. WRITTEN UPDATES FROM OPERATIONAL SUB GROUPS

7.1 Business Gateway Management Group

The Business Gateway contract had been extended for a further six months until the tender process has been finalised for the new Business Gateway contract.

7.2 Global Connections

For the benefit of new members, Alison Bennett explained that there had been previous discussions around the viability of continuing with this Sub Group. There would be a scoping exercise carried out on this to ascertain what other groups and partnerships exist, and a whether there is a potential role for a Global Connections Partnership.

Action: Secretariat to work with partners to scope out potential role for Global Connections Partnership.

8. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

There was no other business.

9. **DATE OF NEXT MEETING**

It was agreed that the next Meeting of the LEF would be held at the end of August or the beginning of September, and would be a team Away Day. Alison would circulate the exact date to the LEF at a later date.

STRATEGIC HOUSING & COMMUNITIES FORUM

The Forum met yesterday with the main topic for consideration being the Local Housing Strategy Annual Update. This is currently being prepared for submission to Communities Scotland in early July.

A major paper was also presented in relation to Communities Scotland's Investment Programme. Last year's outturn expenditure was reported as £21.4m which permitted 203 site starts. Members also noted that the budget available for investment within Argyll & Bute for 2007/08 would be circa £17.675m. In addition, Communities Scotland presented papers on the new Strategic Housing Investment Plans which local authorities will require to submit by the end of November. These are designed to create a more explicit linkage between the housing needs assessment contained within the Local Housing Strategy and the investment plan that is to be put in place over a three to five year period to address the needs. Agreement was also reached to promote an Argyll & Bute wide research project into options for the use of Homestake to promote opportunities for low cost home ownership.

Other papers included an update on Community Learning & Regeneration, an outline of Scottish Water's Investment Programme for Argyll & Bute together with updates on the measures that are being undertaken to combat Homelessness and to develop the Telecare Strategy following the allocation of £141,953 from the Scottish Executive Telecare Development Fund.

BUTE AND COWAL COMMUNITY PLANNING

1.0 SUMMARY

1.1 This report outlines recent progress in taking forward localised Community Planning in Bute and Cowal.

2.0 RECOMMENDATION

2.1 The Management Committee is asked to note the contents of the report and to consider the request for partnership funding for development of the talk site website.

3.0 DETAIL

- 3.1 The Committee will recall that following evaluation of community planning in the Bute and Cowal area it was agreed that each of the five themed issues raised at the seminar held in Strachur in December 2006 would be progressed where possible by an existing partnership group, and that a small management group would track progress of issues and provide feedback to those who attended the seminar, community groups and any other interested party. It was further agreed that feedback would be provided by way of a 6 monthly newsletter, and that a follow up/further planning seminar would be held in late 2007.
- 3.2 Progression of actions has been taking place over the 6 month period since the Strachur seminar, and the management group will be meeting in late June to collate progress reports and ensure these are issued during the Summer to all attendees. At this time people will also be asked to start considering the issues which they would wish to see discussed at this year's seminar, likely to be held in late November.

Community Planning Partnership – 6 July 2007

3.3 In relation to progressing the clearly expressed desire of the seminar in Strachur for better communication amongst partners and community groups and the need to develop effective consultation tools for the areas groups and community organisations, the Bute and Cowal Community Planning Management Group is proposing to undertake a pilot initiative to develop a talk site website as a consultative tool, and to enable community groups to publicise their work and activities. The site enables groups to publish ideas which they are developing for their community/group, and for members of the community to give feedback, both positive and negative, in relation to ideas and initiatives. It is envisaged that the provision of such a website would prove very successful in an area such as Bute and Cowal, particularly among young people and groups, who frequently are unable to communicate their ideas and developments face to face due to their rural location.

To progress this, investigations were carried out into where this type of toolkit has been effectively developed, and a very effective community talk board exists at www.dennistoun.co.uk. The group have met with the person responsible for the development of the Dennistoun site, who has provisionally agreed to set up a similar site for the Bute and Cowal area.

The set up of such a site would require identification of a lead client (likely to be the local community planning group), and an overall editor for the site who would act as a gatekeeper and agree which groups could run the individual pages. Thereafter page editors would need to be identified for every organisation who wished to have a page on the site, these editors taking responsibility for the content of their individual web page. It is envisaged that page editors could be from Community Councils and other Community groups.

The cost of the ICT to set up a community talk board would be £500 and there would then be the initial costs of setting up the structure to run, monitor and maintain the site. Communities Scotland have agreed to provide £1000 towards set up and early costs of the initiative, provided match funding is made available from partner organisations.

The provision of such an innovative community development and consultation tool is seen as significant in developing localised community planning and cross working in a rural area such as Bute and Cowal, and the Community Planning Management Committee is asked to consider favourably this request for partnership funding of £1000 to enable the pilot development to proceed.
