13. POPULATION GROWTH - ENCOMPASSING INWARD **MIGRATION** Different areas are experiencing different variations in migration, both increases and decreases, with different factors affecting this. As yet there is no specific recommendation as to which area to focus on, but it was noted that many of the issues mirror issues raised by other groups i.e. Dialogue Youth – housing and employment. Partners have to help identify and prioritise areas for action, asking ourselves if we have done enough for our existing migrants, if not, what improvements can be made, investment in infrastructure could help inward migration and there may be potential in the future from the Land Bank Fund for housing. It is also important to differentiate between recruitment and retention, as they are different issues and require different strategies. i.e. the new Campbeltown Police Station, which it is hoped will encourage retention. If Partners could forward suggestions or filters then this would be welcome. PARTNERSHIP REVIEW

1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report outlines the review undertaken into the structure of the Argyll and Bute CPP, and in particular governance, representation and communication issues. It introduces the recommendations of the review group.

2. BACKGROUND

- **2.1** The partnership review began in Autumn 2007 when a review proforma was sent to all the CPP partners. Reasons for the review:
 - Current structures have been in place now for over 4 years
 - Structures have not been addressed in light of the new Community Plan (2007-2017)
 - Structures must be fit for purpose and take into light the development of the SOA
 - The position of Community Planning is imperative for delivering on Scottish Government National targets and priorities
 - There is a lack of clarity as to the roles and responsibilities of partners

Key questions considered by review group

- Are existing structures fit for purpose and able to monitor the Community Plan and the Single Outcome Agreement?
- What is the perception of partners' participation?
- 2.2 The initial review sought information on who attended meetings, what their roles were, contact details, financial and in kind contributions, facilities available and geographical areas covered.

3. FINDINGS

- **3.1** Of the 32 current partners 19 pro-forma's were returned.
- **3.2** The review directly and indirectly identified a number of key issues that the review group felt directly impacted on the effectiveness of

the partnership.

- The lack of clarity and/or guidance in individual and organisational roles (particularly with membership of the management Committee) The current membership of the MC has not been formalised and many partners are there with no clear remit for representation
- The lack of any formal agreement as to the level of financial support sought from individual organisations
- The need to look critically at monitoring and evaluation procedures (possible use of ABC Pyramid System)
- More clarity is needed when short life working groups are formed. (purpose, aim and intended outcomes)
- The need for more formal arrangements to enable effective co-ordinated discussion and planning.
- The need to review existing protocols
- The large board membership makes decision making cumbersome and often allows for non-strategic, parochial issues to take over the discussion.

3.3 On a positive note

- Partners are keen to participate and contribute to the process
- Increased pressure on CPP's is acknowledged by partners

4. GOVERNANCE and REPRESENTATION

- **4.1** The aim of the restructuring of governance is to:
 - streamline decision making
 - ensure representation from all partners (through participation in Full Partnership or Management Committee)
 - drive forward the delivery of the Community Plan through Partnership activity, both at CPP and other strategic partnerships.
- **4.2** The current structure consists of a Management Group meeting six times a year and a Full Partnership which meets three times a year.

Management Committee - currently consists of up to 25 partners with no clear remit to represent other partners or to gather and disseminate information relevant to delivering on the Community Plan.

Full Partnership – the opportunity for all CPP partners to meet, network and contribute to the CP process.

4.3 Management Committee – The Management Committee should

consist of partners who will all have:

- clear understanding of roles and expectations
- communication procedures to ensure information is travelling in both directions within organisations
- where a number of organisations are being represented by one person they must be able to demonstrate that the other organisations have been consulted and are able to feed back to CPP through that representative.
- All those sitting round the table must have influence in other strategic partnerships and be able to demonstrate that.
- **4.4** Participation at Management Committee (see attached table)

All those sitting round the table should:

- Have a clear understanding of Community Planning
- Have been formally elected to represent the organisation or groups of organisations
- Be able to demonstrate how they gather and disseminate relevant information to and from the CPP
- Be able to commit time and resources to participating in time bound groups delivering on specific outcomes
- 4.5 There needs to be effective engagement of communities at an appropriate level ensuring decisions are made through a democratic process. Those partners sitting on the Management Committee need to look at the roles of the following:
 - Community Reps (Supported by Community Learning and regeneration)
 - Community Councils
 - 3rd Sector links
 - Local Community Planning structures
- **4.6** A smaller Management Committee should be able to co-opt members to:
 - Offer expert representation when required
 - Connect with local community planning and community representation when required

5. COMMUNICATION

- **5.1** Key communications issues to be resolved
 - Communication within organisations
 - Communication between organisations
 - Communication with other strategic partnerships
- **5.2** Communication within organisations. Partners must demonstrate

- that there are clear procedures/protocols in place to ensure that community planning is embraced within partner organisations.
- 5.3 Communication between partners and partnerships must be clear and robust. Where a partner is representing a family or group of partners there must be agreed mechanisms to ensure that information is gathered and disseminated. This should be agreed between organisations and communicated to the management Committee.
- **5.4** Communication with other strategic partnerships is essential to ensure delivery on the Community Plan and the SOA.

6. OPPORTUNITIES

- 6.1 The Single Outcome Agreement supporting the community planning approach enables us to look at short and mid term outcomes. A more focused and manageable management committee will enable us to report on progress.
- 6.2 More funding streams re being allocated through Community Planning and a more focused management committee will ensure that allocations are made in line with the Community Plan and the SOA

7. CONCLUSIONS

- 7.1 The CPP Review Group has considered the findings of the review and agree that some restructuring is essential for the future effectiveness of Community Planning in Argyll and Bute. The attached table details further the composition of the new management Committee.
- **7.2** The CPP needs to support the new governance arrangements in order to implement the Community Plan and oversee the SOA.
- **7.3** This report assumes that partner organisations continue to be responsible for service strategy and operational performance although it is hoped that the latter would be designed in such a way that information can be easily shared.
- **7.4** A robust partnership agreement and/or terms of reference should be developed to ensure full participation in this new, streamlined structure.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS

9.1 The Review Group seek support from the partnership to implement

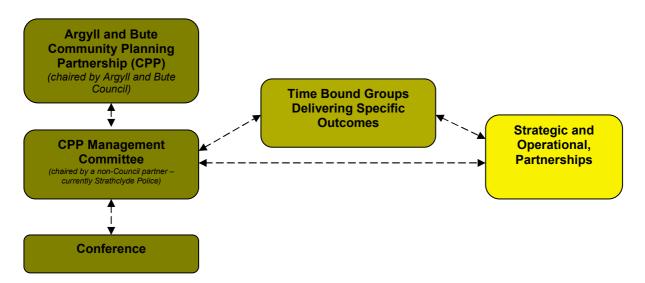

Strengthening the Third Sector

1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report updates the CPP on the developments to strengthen the Third Sector in Argyll & Bute.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

- **2.1** Note the situation and monitor progress of the Third Sector Steering Group
- **2.2** Note work with Third Sector in tandem with this development Fairer Argyll and Bute Plan, and "Harnessing the Potential of the Third Sector" Demonstration Project.
- **2.3** Consider inviting representatives from the Third Sector Steering Group to a future meeting to discuss their proposals.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 Council Leader and Chair of the Community Planning Partnership, Dick Walsh invited staff and Board representatives from the umbrella organisations of the Third Sector to a meeting on 21 May 2008 to discuss opportunities for development. In attendance were the 3 Councils for Voluntary Service (CVS), Argyll & Bute Volunteer Centre (ABVC), and Argyll & Bute Social Enterprise Network (ABSEN), as well as Mull & Iona Community trust (MICT) as a subcontractor to provide CVS services. Also presenting at the meeting were Scottish Government Third Sector Division and the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO). It was clear that national and local government bodies were all looking for the same outcomes.
- 3.2 The aim of the meeting was to strengthen the Third Sector and identify how it can best be involved in community planning processes, both locally and strategically. This was seen as the start of a process of identifying ways to improve the working together of Third Sector organisations in Argyll & Bute.

- **3.3** The objectives set are to develop:
 - More active third sector, supporting more community activity
 - Better quality support for third sector organisations across the whole of Argyll and Bute
 - Equitable access to support for all communities in Argyll and Bute
 - A clear voice advocating the interests of the third sector in Argyll and Bute locally and nationally
 - Stronger and more active social enterprises winning contracts to provide services
- 3.4 The Third Sector was challenged to come up with a new plan to meet these objectives, with financial support from the Fairer Scotland Fund from 2009 2011, and thereafter, potentially, from the Council's block allocation.
- 3.5 Those present agreed to further consult with the sector on 6 June following the Volunteer Awards in Oban. Scottish Government, SCVO and the Council all gave presentations and assisted at workshops.
- 3.6 At this event, ideas were gathered in workshops facilitated by the Third Sector and partners, and a Third Sector Steering Group was established. This group had its first meeting on 17 June.
- **3.7** The timescale for developments are as follows:
 - End of September options presented by the third sector organisations to CPP
 - End of October final draft of Fairer Argyll and Bute Plan agreed
 - November agreement by Argyll and Bute Council and Argyll and Bute CPP
 - February 2009 Council budget decision
 - April 2009 chosen option enacted

4. CONCLUSION

4.1 The Third Sector Steering Group has a major task to complete in a very short timescale, the outcome of which is crucial to the future of a thriving and equitable Third Sector across Argyll & Bute.

1. SUMMARY

1.1 This reports sets out a proposal to further enhance community engagement in the former Community Planning pilot area of Bute and Cowal and develop a model of localised community engagement, which if successful, could be replicated in other areas of Argyll and Bute.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 The remaining members of the Bute and Cowal Community Planning pilot group continue as a working group to develop this proposal.
- **2.2** Two consultation events are held annually to bring together members of the public to discuss and air their views on local issues. The events will be structured to illicit consensus views on specific themes.

3. BACKGROUND

- **3.1** A pilot Community Planning project was established four years ago in Bute and Cowal which met with limited success.
- **3.2** An evaluation of the pilot agreed a new set of objectives for the Area Partnership which are:
 - To broaden community involvement
 - To have a local influence on service provision
 - To identify areas of concern and address these via CPP partners
- 3.3 Community involvement has been encouraged through the local seminar held in Strachur Village Hall in December 2006 and the Biennial Community Planning Conference held on Bute in June 2007.
- **3.4** Discussions amongst the Bute and Cowal Community Planning pilot group have suggested that although the conference/seminar

- model has a valuable role to play there is scope for more localised less formal models of community engagement.
- 3.5 This proposal consists of a twice yearly focus group featuring a representative grouping of members of the public from Bute and Cowal taking part in a debating event based loosely on the format utilised by the television programmes "One hundred Scottish Women/Men."
- 3.6 Each event will incorporate inputs from alternative viewpoints on key issues/themes following which, there will be an open questions and answers session and each issue will conclude with a vote on a question relevant to the issue/theme.. Three or four subjects will be covered at each event.

4. CONCLUSION

- **4.1** To effectively broaden community involvement a range of differing methods and models will require to be utilised.
- **4.2** This proposal is intended to complement existing structures and events not to replace them.
- **4.3** With further refinement, by the Bute and Cowal Community Planning pilot group, this proposal has the potential to stimulate community engagement, encourage discussion regarding issues in Bute and Cowal and raise awareness of Community Planning in the local community.

CPP PACKAGE FOR EUROPEAN FUNDING

1. SUMMARY

1.1 This report updates the Management Committee on the progress of the Community Planning Partnership European Funding Package. It also seeks the formal approval of the ESF Element of the Package from the Management Committee.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 That the Management Committee notes the terms of this report, and more specifically;
- 2.2 That the Management Committee formally approves the ESF Element of the Community Planning Partnership European Funding Package.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 As reported previously, Community Planning Partnerships across the Highlands and Islands have been invited to prepare an integrated package of projects for European Structural Funds assistance.
- **£11** million has been made available across the Highlands and Islands to support the CPP European Funding Packages which will be allocated on a competitive basis.
- The money to support the CPP European Funding Package will be drawn from the following sources of European Structural Funds:
 - European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) Priority 3
 Enhancing peripheral and fragile communities, and;
 - European Social Fund (ESF) Priority 1 Increasing the workforce.
- 3.4 Although the Management Committee should note that as a result of the integrated approach to the development of the ESF Element of the Package it has been agreed by the Highlands and Islands Partnership Programme (HIPP) that the Package can draw funds from all 3 Priorities of the ESF.
- This means that in addition to ESF Priority 1 the Package is able to draw funds from ESF Priority 2 Investing in the workforce and ESF Priority 3 Improving access to lifelong learning.
- 3.5 As the Management Committee will be aware after holding an information seminar about the CPP European Funding Package a steering group was set up to develop the Package. This group

has met seven times and has been developing the Package in accordance with the integrated theme of creating a Robust and Dynamic Economy in Argyll and Bute which is drawn from the Vibrant Communities vision of the CPP Action Plan.

- In developing the CPP European Funding Package the steering group has separated the ESF Element of the Package from the ERDF Element. This decision was taken after it became apparent during the project mapping exercise that the ERDF projects needed more time to develop and meet the basic criteria of statutory permissions and match funding.
- This means that the ESF Element of the Package will be submitted to HIPP on 11 July 2008 for approval and the ERDF element will be submitted in October 2008.
- 3.8 It should be noted by the Management Committee that the Argyll and Bute ESF Element of the CPP European Funding Package is the only CPP Package from across the Highlands and Islands being submitted to HIPP in the July round.

4 APPROVAL BY THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE OF THE ESF ELEMENT OF THE CPP EUROPEAN FUNDING PACKAGE

- The Management Committee is being asked to formally approve the ESF Element of the CPP European Funding Package prior to its submission to HIPP.
- 4.2 The ESF Element of the Package was circulated to the Management Committee on 2 July 2008 for consideration and comment.
- 4.3 The ESF Element of the CPP European Funding Package and is tabled today for your formal approval.

5 ERDF ELEMENT OF THE CPP EUROPEAN FUNDING PACKAGE

- Progress with the ERDF Element of the Package will resume after the submission of the ESF Element of the Package.
- 5.2 It has been recognised that the composition of the steering group may change given that the focus of the group will be on developing the ERDF Element of the Package.

CONCLUSION

1. SUMMARY

1.1 The first Youth Focus meeting took place in the council chambers, Kilmory on Tuesday 17th June. 30 Young people form four areas of Argyll and Bute attended either through the Youth Forum, Pupil School Councils, the HELP project, SYP or Young Scot.

The meeting; chaired by Andrew Lochrie, chair of the Argyll and Bute Youth Forum, was opened by councillor Dick Walsh with a few words on the importance of involving young people in Community Planning, followed by Eileen Wilson, Community Planning Manager who discussed Community Planning, what it means and how it affects young people.

Young People from Argyll and Bute Youth Forum and MAKI Youth forum made presentations on the work they have been doing over the last year and invited other young people to join the Youth Forum.

The young people then went on to do an exercise to look at what they wanted to achieve from the Youth Focus meetings. The top three were to have fun, get their voices heard and to make things happen. They also looked at how best to promote the group to other young people by designing a poster or leaflet.

The meeting concluded with a review of the Youth Work Plan. The consultation was revisited to see if the questions were still relevant and would be answered in the same way. A selection of questions was asked with the majority showing the same results as the consultation done the previous year.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 It was recognised that more work needs to be done in local areas in preparation for Youth Focus meetings to make them as productive as possible as they are to be held three times a year.

Two young people volunteered to attend the full Community Planning Partnership in July and feed back to local forums and the next Youth Focus meeting. Roanna Taylor will meet with them

prior to the meeting to prepare them and to discuss their input.

It was also pointed out that we will have to continue to get a wide representation of young people to attend future Youth Focus meetings. It is planned to use the posters and leaflet designed at the meeting to do this.

3. CONCLUSION

3.1 The first Youth Focus meeting was well attended by a wide representation of young people from a large geographic area, although work needs to continue to build on this. The Young people concluded that the meeting was a success and they gained a lot form attending.
