#### NOTE of INQUORATE MEETING of LOCAL LICENSING FORUM held in the COMMITTEE ROOM 1, KILMORY, LOCHGILPHEAD on WEDNESDAY, 5 NOVEMBER 2014

#### Present:

In the absence of the Chair, Sheila MacFadyen invited the members to elect a chair for the meeting. The Forum agreed Eric Dearie would chair the meeting.

#### 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Calum MacLachlainn, Tim Saul, Fred Bruce, Sheila Johnston, Raymond Boyle, Roanna Clark, Sarah Nicolson and Kenny Harrison.

It was noted that the meeting was inquorate however the Chair received agreement from the Local Licensing Forum to continue with the meeting.

The Forum agreed that all decisions would be homologated at the next quorate meeting of the Local Licensing Forum.

#### 2. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIR PERSON

The Forum was reminded that at their informal meeting held on 2 September 2014, the current Chair, Kenny Harrison had advised that he had intended to step down as Chair at the next meeting. The forum discussed the role of Chair of the Forum and agreed that it would be useful if an email was circulated in advance of the next meeting of the Forum asking all members to consider taking on the role as Chair and if they are interested in considering the role to let Susan know in advance of the next meeting.

#### Decision

The Local Licensing Forum agreed that an email should be issued in advance of the next meeting asking members to consider taking on the role as Chair.

#### 3. MINUTES

The Local Licensing Forum considered the Minutes of the last meeting. The Forum noted that at this stage, the sub group from the Licensing Board, which had been set up in order to form a view on overprovision had nothing to report to the group.

The group discussed the informal meeting that was held as a result of the last meeting to discuss, with the Licensing Board, the role of the Forum. The group agreed that they had found the informal meeting, in which the forum sat through a meeting of the licensing board prior to the discussion with some members of the licensing board very beneficial.

The forum highlighted that a major change to licensing law is about to be introduced in relation to the drink driving policy and some members of the forum felt that they should have been given an opportunity to submit their views. The forum was advised that the licensing board were also not involved in the consultation phase of these changes.

Sheila MacFadyen advised that she had a copy of the agenda from the most recent local licensing forum that had been held at West Dunbartonshire Council, and advised the meeting as to the items on the agenda. The meeting noted that although West Dunbartonshire had reports on the agenda (e.g. police and licensing standards), all the reports were for noting only and no recommendations were being made as a result of these reports. The meeting agreed that although reports from Police Scotland and the Licensing Standards Officers were informative, at a previous meeting they had agreed to stop requesting such reports as they felt they were of no benefit and required officers to collate information for noting only.

#### Decision

The Minutes of the Local Licensing Forum held on 30 April 2014 were approved as a correct record.

#### 4. MEMBERSHIP OF THE FORUM

The Local Licensing Forum were advised that this item had been put on the Agenda to provide the Forum with an opportunity to identify any potential gaps in the membership. The Forum had a discussion on the membership and advised that it would be useful to have representation from the off sales trade on the forum. The Chair advised that Mark Tyson, who is a pub licensee and member of the PubWatch scheme in Helensburgh, is keen to join the Forum. The Chair advised that there are approximately 60 licensed members clubs throughout Argyll and Bute and the forum agreed that it would be beneficial to have representative from them on the Forum. The group discussed the Geographical representation of the forum and agreed that most areas are currently well represented with the exception of Helensburgh and Lomond, Campbeltown and the Islands. The forum agreed that it was unrealistic to expect someone from an Island to travel to Lochgilphead for the meeting however the forum discussed the possibility of members attending the Forum via Video Conferencing. The Forum discussed ways of attracting new members and agreed that an advert in local papers or trade magazines could be a viable option.

#### Decision

The Local Licensing Forum agreed that representation from the off sales trade and a licensed members club would benefit the Forum and in order to cover all of Argyll and Bute it would be valuable to get members from Helensburgh, Campbeltown and possibly the Islands. The Forum also agreed that Susan Mair should look into methods of advertising in order to attract new members to the Forum and the advertisement should advise that Video Conference could be used to prevent people from having to travel.

#### 5. FESTIVE HOURS POLICY

The Local Licensing Forum were provided with a copy of Argyll and Bute's Licensing Board's Festive hours policy from last year and were advised that the Licensing Board will be considering the policy at their next meeting on the 18 November 2014 and although it is likely that they will agree the same policy as last year, would like the forums views on the policy before the decision is finalised.

The Chair explained the policy to the Forum and advised that this year the festive period would begin on the 12 December opposed to the 13 December.

The Forum held a discussion on the policy, and agreed that although they are happy with the policy, an emphasis should be placed within the policy reminding licence holders that if they are allowing children to be in a licensed premise until 1am on 1 January 2015, that it is their responsibility to protect the children, to ensure that they are not unduly exposed to intoxicated adults.

The Chair advised that protecting Children from harm is one of the five licensing objectives as set out in the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005.

The Forum discussed whether it would be beneficial to be provided with statistical information in future to determine if this policy works or if it creates more problems with regard to the health service and the police, however the forum noted that it would be hard to determine if the extended hours were a factor in any change as the holiday season and planned extra resources by Police Scotland could also be accountable for any change in alcohol related statistics.

#### Decision

The Local Licensing Forum agreed to make the following representation to the Licensing Board.

- 1. The Local Licensing Forum recommends that the Licensing Board make clear to the applicant that it is their responsibility to ensure that they are providing ample supervision at any event where children and young persons are present until late at night to ensure that they are not unduly exposed to intoxicated adults.
- 2. The Local Licensing Forum recommends that the Board consider using health and crime statistics in the future when deciding on their Festive Hours Policy to ensure the policy they have in place is

successful. However the Forum also noted that it would be hard to determine whether a change in statistics was a result of the Festive Hours Policy or was because of the increased resources put in place by Police Scotland over the holiday season.

#### 6. THE FIVE POLICY OBJECTIVES

The Chair advised that the agenda should read the five licensing objectives as opposed to the five policy objectives, and asked Sheila MacFadyen to remind the Forum of the five licensing objectives. Sheila MacFadven advised that it had been agreed at the informal meeting of the Local Licensing Forum that the five licensing objectives should be a standing item on all future agendas, and this would allow the forum to raise any issues they had at any meeting. The Chair advised that under the previous item we had spoken a lot about objective (e), Protecting Children from Harm and he advised that as part of The Air Weapons Bill currently progressing through the Scottish Parliament that this was being updated to read Protecting Children and Young Persons from Harm. The Chair reported that the Licensing Board are required to take into account each of the Licensing Policy Objectives when deciding whether to grant or deny every licensing application. The Forum agreed that it would be helpful if the five objectives were detailed on each agenda to remind people of what they were.

#### Decision

The Forum agreed that for future agendas, the Five Licensing Objectives should be detailed to remind the forum of what they are.

#### 7. ALCOHOL FOCUS SCOTLAND REPORT ON THE REVIEW OF STATEMENTS OF LICENSING POLICY

The Chair advised the Forum that the report had recently been considered at a licensing conference. The report highlights Alcohol Focus concerns regarding Licensing Boards throughout Scotland. Alcohol Focus believes that the licensing boards are not doing enough work in regard to overprovision. The Chair advised that when this report was written, Argyll and Bute Licensing Boards 2013-2016 Policy had not been finalised and therefore is not included in the report. The forum noted the clarity of the report, and the detailed suggestions for improvement. The forum held a discussion on the requirement for each local authority to have its own licensing board. The Chair asked the members of the forum to bring any comments they have on the report to the next meeting.

#### Decision

The Local Licensing Forum noted the report by Alcohol Focus Scotland and agreed to bring any further comments they had on the report to the next meeting of the Forum.

(Reference: Report by Alcohol Focus Scotland, submitted, dated August 2014)

#### 8. ANY OTHER BUSINESS Pub Watch

The Local Licensing Forum held a discussion on the pub watch scheme. The Chair advised that currently there are three pub watch schemes operating within Argyll and Bute, one in Helensburgh, Oban and Campbeltown. The group were advised as to how pub watch operates, and the forum held a discussion on this. In response to a question by the forum as to whether pub watch could include on and off sales trade the Chair advised that the pub watch scheme in Campbeltown, until recently, was chaired by the Manager of the Campbeltown Co-op. The group agreed that it would be useful to discuss pub watch schemes at a future meeting.

#### **Police Scotland Update**

Sergeant David Ferguson provided an update on behalf of Police Scotland. He advised the Forum that there were no major issues within Argyll and Bute. He advised that there had been an increase in assaults in Licensed Premises and Police Scotland are working with licensed premises to get their staff are trained in conflict management. Sergeant David Ferguson reported that Police Scotland is continuing to work alongside Licensing Standards Officers to make sure that licensed premises are receiving the support they require. He advised that Police Scotland is currently undertaking an exercise to ensure Personal Licence Holders refresher training is up to date. Sheila MacFadyen advised that personal licence holders who had not submitted their certificates by the end of November would have their licenses revoked at the Licensing Board meeting on 10 December 2014.

#### 9. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

Sheila MacFadyen advised that the group are required to have a joint meeting with the Licensing Board and reported that the proposed date for this meeting is Wednesday 10 December 2014.

#### PROPOSED CONSULTATION FOR OVERPROVISION STATEMENT

#### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide details of the evidence collated from relevant agencies as well as surveys conducted with the public and licensees, in order that the Board may consider options and arrangements in relation to the required statutory consultation.
- 1.2 Financial implications are relevant in regard to the commissioning, methodology and the extent of the consultation process agreed by the Board. These are detailed at sections 6 and 7 below.

#### 2. INTRODUCTION

2.1 The Licensing Scotland Act 2015 (the 2005 Act) at Section 7, requires the Licensing Board to include in its policy statement:-

"a statement as to the extent to which it considers there to be overprovision of:

(a) Licensed premises; or

(b) Licensed premises of a particular description.

in any locality within the Board's area."

2.2 In accordance with that requirement, the Board's Statement of Licensing Policy 2013-2016 includes a section dealing with overprovision; as noted below:-

Section 6. 5: The Board does recognise, however, that there is a need to keep this matter (overprovision) under review and therefore an information and evidence gathering exercise has been commenced in conjunction with the Local Licensing Forum with a view to considering the matter of overprovision (including over provision of off-sales premises). The Board will conclude its consideration of overprovision by no later than 31st March 2015 and propose controls as appropriate.

2.3 The timescale for this process has been extended, with the agreement of the Board, due to unforeseen difficulties in collating and analysing the data received from external agencies. In particular, complications arose in relation to differences in the geographical areas referenced in statistical reports, the time periods for which data was available and in some cases, the absence of alcohol specific recording of incidents.

#### 3. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

3.1 The Board is asked to consider limiting the scope of the proposed consultation to licensed premises of a particular description; namely off-

sales premises, as discussed at section 4.1.1 and 4.6.3 below or as detailed at section 7.2 below.

- 3.2 The Board is asked to limit the scope of the proposed consultation to licensed premises in the locality's listed at section 7.1 below or as detailed at section 7.1 below or as otherwise determined by the Board.
- 3.3 The Board is asked to refer this report to the Local Licensing Forum, requesting that they provide a report to the Board stating their position on overprovision and identifying any relevant issues which they believe should be incorporated in the proposed consultation phase of this process.
- 3.4 The Board is asked to request the Overprovision Working Group to progress arrangements for consultation as detailed in sections 6 and 7 below, once decisions have been taken in relation to the type(s) and location(s) of premises.
- 3.5 The Board is asked to request the Overprovision Working Group to determine whether any additional localities should be included in the proposed consultation, once the report from the Alcohol and Drugs partnership is available (see section 4.2 below).

#### 4. **REVIEW OF EVIDENCE**

- 4.1.1 **NHS Highland Public Health Department** (Argyll and Bute Community Health Partnership) provided a report on potential overprovision, as attached at **Annex 1**. The period covered by this report is 2012-2014.
- 4.1.2 In relation to the 'particular description' of licensed premises, this report suggests a link between alcohol diagnoses / hospitalisations and those off-sales premise which have a large display area:-

"... while the number of licensed premises may be relevant, the capacity for sales of these outlets also has an impact on the health of the local population and should be taken into consideration. The overall capacity within and accessibility of adjacent intermediate datazones should also be taken into consideration."

4.1.3 In relation to the 'locality' of licensed premises, this report lists those areas that "the NHS have identified as being appropriate for inclusion within an over provision statement." These areas, in order of alcohol diagnoses per 1000 population, are:-

Dunoon: Campbeltown: Oban (North + South): Helensburgh (Central): Helensburgh (East): Rothesay

4.2 **Argyll and Bute Alcohol and Drugs Partnership** (ADP) is currently finalising a report on potential overprovision, a copy will be made circulated to Board members as soon as it becomes available.

- 4.3 **Police Scotland** provided a report; *Alcohol Related Crime and the Overprovision of Licensed Premises in Argyll and Bute, 01/04/2014 – 31/10/2015*, as attached at **Annex 3**.
- 4.3.1 In relation to the 'particular description' of licensed premises, the data in the report does not distinguish between on and off-sales premises.
- 4.3.2 In relation to the 'locality' of licensed premises, this report lists those areas linked with alcohol related serious crimes, alcohol specific crime, youth related alcohol incidents and alcohol specific domestic crime, as well as other categories. The report presents rankings for these statistics in terms of intermediate data-zones and for the main towns.

The top ranked areas for alcohol related crimes are:-

Intermediate data-zones: Oban North: Helensburgh Centre: Dunoon

Towns: Oban: Helensburgh & Rhu: Lochgilphead: Dunoon

- 4.3.3 It has not been possible to provide information on the Scottish average for the statistics included in the Police Scotland report as the data is not reported in this format at a national level.
- 4.4 **The Scottish Ambulance Service** (SAS) provided a statistical report; *Incidents Where Alcohol Noted as a Factor*, covering the period 2012-2013 to 2014-2015. A copy of this report is attached as **Annex 4**.
- 4.4.1 The data provided by SAS was collated into the Intermediate Datazones (the methodology agreed by the Overprovision Working Group) and was averaged over the 3 years reported. The re-formatted data is shown at page 2 of Annex 4.
- 4.4.2 The areas with the highest levels of alcohol related incidents include; Dunoon, Oban South, Greater Lochgilphead, Whisky Isles, Helensburgh East and Helensburgh Centre.
- 4.5 **The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service** (SFRS) provided a report; Incidents during 2012, 2013 and 2014 in Argyll and Bute. A copy of this report is attached as **Annex 5**.
- 4.5.1 The data provided by SFRS was collated into the Intermediate Datazones (agreed as above) and was averaged over the 3 years reported. The re-formatted data is shown at page 2 of Annex 5.
- 4.5.2 The areas with the highest levels of alcohol related incidents include; Dunoon, Rothesay, Helensburgh East and Oban South.
- 4.6.1 **Alcohol Focus Scotland** (AFS) has commissioned extensive research into the various types of harm linked to the use and availability of alcohol; this has facilitated the comparison of Argyll and Bute data with that of Scotland, the United Kingdom and Europe. A number of relevant AFS

publications are referenced below: more detailed information is available from their website:-

www.alcohol-focus-scotland.org.uk/licensing

- 4.6.2 Estimates of the cost of alcohol related harm in Argyll and Bute (as published by AFS for 201/11) include:-
  - Crime: £10.42m
  - $\succ$  Health: £4.01m
  - ➢ Social Care £3.45m
- 4.6.3 AFS have published its findings in regard to the relationship between alcohol outlet density and alcohol related harm. The key findings included:-
  - Argyll and Bute has an alcohol outlet availability lower than Scotland as a whole, but has pockets of high availability; one guarter of neighbourhoods in Argyll and Bute have an outlet density greater than the Scottish average, largely accounted for by on-sales outlets
  - In Argyll and Bute as a whole there is an annual average of 22 • alcohol-related deaths (24 deaths per 100,000 adults); this is similar to the Scottish average of 25 deaths per 100,000
  - An average alcohol-related hospitalisation rate ratio of 125; this • is 25% higher than the Scottish average of 100.
- 4.6.4 Perhaps the most noteworthy finding from the AFS research was in regard to the relationship between alcohol outlet availability and alcohol related harm in Argyll and Bute, as copied below:-
  - Areas with the highest density of on-sales premises had death rates 60% higher than areas with the lowest
  - ✤ Areas with the highest density of off-sales premises had hospitalisations 167% higher than areas with the lowest.
- 4.6.5 AFS recently commissioned research presenting statistics which provide local authority specific data in relation to alcohol related hospitalisations and death rates by individual data-zone; this data include details of the respective Scottish average. The figures provided for the relevant Scottish average are referenced at section 5.1 below. A summarised version of this data is attached at Annex 6
- 4.6.6 A copy of the full information summarised above is available via the AFS website noted above or from Legal Services.
- 4.7.1 A public survey was conducted during the month of February 2015. There were 273 valid responses to the survey. A comprehensive

statistical review of the results is available from Legal Services on request.

- 4.7.2 An analysis of the results showed that :-
  - Responses were received from each of the 22 Intermediate Data-zones, with the exception of Helensburgh East
  - 76% of the respondents were over 40 years old
  - 73% of the respondents indicated that they used 'off-sales' premises most frequently when buying alcohol
  - 24% of the respondents indicated that they used 'on-sales' premises most frequently buy alcohol
  - 34% of the respondents indicated that they also used online retailers to purchase alcohol
- 4.7.3 It was not possible to provide a statistically robust analysis of the results by local area due to the low number of responses in relation to individual Intermediate Data-zones.
- 4.7.4 There were 87 responses which included free text comment; these are copied at **Annex 7**. The Board may wish to give consideration to the issues raised in these comments e.g.
  - 20 indicated that overprovision was not an issue
  - 10 indicated that overprovision was an issue
  - ✤ 17 raised concerns about sale of alcohol to young people
  - 9 raised concerns about alcohol sales from supermarkets

Other concerns included; the (perceived) low price of alcohol, opening hours of licensed premises, the (perceived) ready availability of Occasional licences, over-consumption of alcohol on licensed premises.

- 4.8.1 **A survey of licensees** was also conducted during the same period; surveys were issued in relation to 581 licensed premises and 17 responses were received.
- 4.8.2 The Data-zones represented in the responses were; Oban North (1), Cowal South (2), Islay (1), Rothesay (2), Helensburgh Centre (1), Whisky Isles (1), Helensburgh West & Rhu (1), Mull, Iona, Coll & Tiree (4), Benderloch Trail (1), Cowal North (1), Campbeltown (1) and Mid Argyll (1).
- 4.8.3 Of the responses, 10 related to on-sales only premises and the remainder to on and off-sales premises.
- 4.8.4 Only 5 of the responses indicated membership of 4 different trade associations; the Scottish Licensed Trade Association (2), Brewers Association of Scotland (1), British Hospitality Association (1) and the Islay and Jura Marketing Group(1).

- 4.8.5 It was not possible to provide a statistically robust analysis of the results by local area due to the low number of responses in relation to individual Intermediate Data-zones; however comments made in the survey are copied at **Annex 8**.
- 4.8.6 There were 22 comments; the Board may wish to give consideration to the issues raised e.g.:-
  - 8 indicated that there was no overprovision
  - 7 raised concerns about sales from supermarkets
  - 3 identified issues relating to the price of alcohol

Other concerns related to licensing hours, seasonal constraints and late licences.

- 4.9.1 **Scottish Government** statistics include data on the index of multiple deprivation. The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) provides a relative ranking of the data-zones (rather than Intermediate Data-zones as referenced in this report) in Scotland. The data is ranked from 1 (most deprived) to 6505 (least deprived), based on a weighted combination of data in the domains of Current Income, Housing, Health, Education, Skills and Training, Employment and Geographic Access and Crime.
- 4.9.2 Data for Argyll and Bute is attached at **Annex 9** (a) and (b). The highlighted section of Table (a) shows which Intermediate Datazones have levels of deprivation above the Scottish average (in terms of SIMD).
- 4.9.3 Table (b) shows a ranking of the Intermediate Data-zones within Argyll and Bute but also identifies (in the last column), those localities that are within the top 20% of the most deprived areas across Scotland (in terms of SIMD).
- 4.9.4 More information (including a guidance leaflet, a general report, a statistical compendium and a technical report) can be found at <u>www.scotland.gov.uk/simd</u>. An SIMD interactive mapping website is available from <u>http://simd.scotland.gov.uk/map</u>.
- **4.10** Data packs have been prepared to illustrate the key data described above, with maps of each data-zone within Argyll and Bute. These are attached as **Annex 10**.

#### 5. Summary of Initial Findings

5.1 The proposal from NHS Highland Public Health Department (Argyll and Bute Community Health Partnership) is that the focus of the Board's overprovision statement should be on off-sales premises in the Datazones of **Dunoon, Campbeltown, Oban South, Helensburgh Centre, Helensburgh East, Rothesay and Oban North**. This proposal is based on the level of alcohol diagnosis / hospitalisations in those areas. All of these areas, have a level of alcohol diagnosis / hospitalisations which is higher than the Scottish national average, as detailed in research undertaken for AFS (see section 4.6.4 above and Annex 6)

- 5.2 The Alcohol and Drugs Partnership is currently preparing a report to identify any link between the number of licensed premises and alcohol related hospitalisations. Once this report is available any additional localities may be considered for inclusion in the proposed consultation.
- 5.3.1 The statistics provided by Police Scotland for crimes and related incidents do not identify whether alcohol was purchased from on-sales or off-sales premises. However the report from Police Scotland does identify the relative ranking of Intermediate Data-zones as well as ranking of main towns (in terms of crime and related incidents) which, they suggest should be considered in determining the Board's overprovision statement.
- 5.3.2 The Police Scotland statistics incorporate details for 4 specific types of alcohol related crime and incidents; Serious (Group 1) crimes (e.g. assault); Alcohol Specific crimes (e.g. drink driving); Youth Drinking Incidents and Alcohol Specific Domestic Crime. An extract detailing the area which all have at least one top 3 ranking for these alcohol specific crimes and incidents derived from the table presented on p18 of the Police Scotland report, is shown below:-

- 5.3.2 A comparison of these areas to those identified by NHS Highland indicates that the area of **Greater Lochgilphead** could be added to the list of those areas that potentially indicate overprovision.
- 5.4 Data provided by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service indicates that the average number of alcohol related fire incidents during the 3 year period 2012-2014 were highest in the Dunoon, Rothesay and Helensburgh East Data-zones. These areas are already identified as potential areas of overprovision within the Health and Police reports.
- 5.5 Data provided by the Scottish Ambulance Service indicates that the highest levels of alcohol related incidents include; Dunoon, Oban South,

Greater Lochgilphead, Whisky Isles, Helensburgh East and Helensburgh Centre. With the exception of the **Whisky Isles**, all of these areas are already identified as potential areas of overprovision within the Health and Police reports.

- 5.6 The findings from AFS research complement those reported by NHS Highland; particularly in regard to the relevance of off-sales premises and confirming those areas where the levels of alcohol related hospitalisations are higher than the Scottish average.
- 5.7 A survey to assess public perception of the availability of alcohol was conducted during February 2015. Although the geographical spread of the responses to the survey was extensive, the number of responses received represented less than 1% of the area's population. Over three quarters of those who responded were over 40 years old. Given these limitations it is suggested that statistics based on the data provided would not be reliable. However the issues raised in the responses could reasonably be incorporated in the planned local communities consultation stage.
- 5.8 Similarly the level of response to the survey of licensees was low; fewer than 3% of licensees. As above it is suggested that, although the numerical data may not be statistically robust, the issue identified could be referenced within the planned consultation with licensees.
- 5.9 The Scottish Government data shows that, of the localities identified in the NHS report, Dunoon, Campbeltown, Rothesay and Oban South are also above the Scottish average for multiple deprivation.
- 5.10.1 In summary, a number of localities have been identified as areas of potential overprovision by agency, as detailed in the table below:

5.10.2 Although these localities have been identified by particular agencies

as being linked to the sale or consumption of alcohol, a statistical correlation between this and the number / type of licensed premises has not been explicitly addressed.

#### 6. Framework for Proposed Consultation

- 6.1 Section 7(2) of the 2005 Act states that:-
  - It is for the Licensing Board to determine the "localities" within the Board's area for the purposes of this Act.
  - In considering whether there is overprovision in any locality, the Board must have regard to the number and capacity of licensed premises in the locality
  - The Board must consult the Chief Constable, the relevant health board and such persons as appear to the Board to be representative of the interests of—
    - *(i) holders of premises licences in respect of premises within the locality,*
    - (ii) persons resident in the locality, and
    - (iii) such other persons as the Board thinks fit.

This section also clarifies that references to "licensed premises" do not include references to any premises in respect of which an occasional licence has effect.

In terms of Section 6(3) of the 2005 Act the following representatives should be added to this list:-

- *(iv)* persons having functions relating to health, education or social work
- (v) young people
- 6.2 On this basis it is suggested that the Board should include the following agencies and groups within the proposed consultation:
  - a) Police Scotland
  - b) NHS Highland
  - c) Licensees of premises within the localities as identified by the Board
  - Residents and relevant community groups within the localities as identified by the Board, including groups representing young persons
  - e) Chambers of Commerce representing the localities as identified by the Board
  - f) Relevant council services e.g. Regulatory Services
  - g) Elected Members representing the localities as identified by the Board
  - h) Alcohol Focus Scotland

- 6.3 The Scottish Government published Guidance for Licensing Boards (the Guidance) which includes specific provisions in relation to consultation on the issue of overprovision, including the scope and the considerations leading to a determination of overprovision.
- 6.3.1 Scope of consultation: the Guidance lists the factors which the Board may take into account:
  - the information provided by the Chief Constable;
  - evidence from the licensed trade that the density of licensed premises in the locality has resulted in levels of competition which have applied downward pressure on the price of alcohol;
  - evidence gathered from local residents of anti-social behaviour associated with licensed premises;
  - information from the local authority's Environmental Health Department about noise complaints which can be attributed to the operation of licensed premises in a locality;
  - data supplied by the NHS Board or other health bodies, for example, local Accident and Emergency Departments or Alcohol Action Teams.

In particular the Board should not take into account:-

- the manner in which individual premises in a locality are managed, since it is possible that well-managed premises may act as a magnet for anti-social behaviour, or may eject a substantial number of customers who collectively produce disorder and nuisance to a degree which is unacceptable;
- any concerns as to the quality of management of individual premises, which should separately be addressed through other statutory mechanisms;
- the need or demand for licensed premises in the locality. Commercial considerations are irrelevant to a policy which is designed to protect the wider public interest; or
- the hours during which licensed premises in the locality trade, since these will be controlled through operating plans.
- 6.3.2 Considerations in relation to overprovision: the following extracts from the Guidance are noted for the Board's reference:-

'It will not normally be appropriate to arrive at a decision based on one particular factor alone; but rather consideration should be given as to whether aggregated information and evidence from a number of

sources points compellingly towards a particular conclusion.' This statement is made in relation the various types of evidence under consideration and confirms that a range of sources should be taken into account.

'Proper regard should be given to the contrasting styles of operation of different licensed operations and the differing impact they are likely to have on the promotion of the licensing objectives. A policy which discourages premises where the primary activity is the consumption of alcohol may leave room for the introduction of licensed premises which are likely to produce positive benefits for the locality or which will have a neutral impact on the those objectives.' With particular reference to rural areas, the Guidance notes includes the example of a hotel whose trade is mainly derived from bar sales but which may also provide a valuable local function. Similarly the Guidance states that convenience stores may provide an essential local service in some communities, particularly those with an elderly population where transport considerations make it difficult for residents to take advantage of more extensive shopping facilities available at large supermarkets in adjoining localities.

#### 7. Options for Proposed Consultation

7.1 Localities for Consultation:

The evidence gathered from relevant agencies, together with that provided by Alcohol Focus Scotland, indicate a range of available options in regard to those Intermediate Data-zones which could be considered as potential areas of overprovision for the purposes of consultation:-

- (i) All areas which have been identified by **4 or more** agencies; Dunoon, Oban South, Helensburgh Centre, Helensburgh East, Rothesay
- (ii) All areas which have been identified by 3 or more agencies; as above with the addition of Campbeltown and Oban North
- (iii) All areas as identified by **any** of the agencies, i.e. as at (ii) above with the addition of the Whisky Isles and Greater Lochgilphead
- 7.2 Type of Premises

Each of the options listed at section 7.1 above could be considered in relation to:-

- (a) Off-sales premises only
- (b) On-sales premises only
- (c) Off-sales and on-sales premises

7.3.1 Method of consultation

The view of the Overprovision working group is that, in order to demonstrate fair and independent process, the consultation should be undertaken by an external consultant. An appropriate budget has been identified for this purpose.

7.3.2 A formal briefing, approved by the Overprovision Working Group, will be prepared for the consultant selected, to reflect the requirements of the legislation and statutory guidance. A report detailing the findings of the consultation will be provided to the Board to assist in producing a policy statement on overprovision.

#### 8. CONCLUSIONS

- 8.1 A significant amount of preparatory work has already been completed, with a large volume of material available for the Board's consideration.
- 8.2 The evidence gathered indicates that a number of localities should be included in the proposed process of detailed consultation with identified groups.
- 8.3 The proposed consultation exercise will provide a robust basis on which the Board can determine the content of their policy statement on overprovision.

#### 9. IMPLICATIONS

- 9.1 Policy Argyll and Bute Council has approved the Board's policy statement in relation to the Act and the content of this report is consistent with that policy statement.
- 9.2 Financial expenditure will be incurred if a consultation exercise is commissioned in terms of section 7.2 above but the extent of those costs would be closely aligned to the scale and scope of the agreed brief.
- 9.3 Legal it is not envisaged that implementation of any of the proposed actions would exceed the powers of the Argyll and Bute Licensing Board or Argyll and Bute Council.
- 9.4 HR limited staff resources may be required to assist Board members in the implementation of agreed actions.
- 9.5 Equalities it is not envisaged that implementation of any of the proposed actions would result in a breach of the council's Equality duties.
- 9.6 Risk it is not envisaged that implementation of any of the proposed actions would result in any associated risk for the council.
- 9.7 Customer Service this report incorporates a range of options with local

communities and traders to gain a better understanding of issues which may impact on the Board's statement on overprovision. It is suggested that the proposed consultation would therefore assist in improving services to people living in or visiting the area and to local businesses.

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## NHS Highland Public Health Department (Argyll & Bute CHP) Recommendations for Inclusion in Argyll & Bute Licensing Board Overprovision Statement

NHS Highland, Public Health Department (Argyll & Bute) have reviewed the data for each Intermediate Datazone (IDZ) regarding alcohol related hospitalisations and their relationship to the density of the total number of licensed premises and off sales display capacity. Seven areas in Argyll & Bute have Alcohol Diagnoses/ Hospitalisation levels above the Argyll & Bute average of 54.64 per 1000 population.\* It is these seven areas that the NHS have identified as being appropriate for inclusion within an over provision statement.

Other than Rothesay Town all of the IDZs ranked highest for Alcohol Diagnoses/ Hospitalisation within Argyll & Bute have, or are situated adjacent to an area with the largest combined off sales display area. The figures for three areas require some clarification: (see appendix 1)

- The Mull, Iona, Coll, Tiree IDZ is ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> in the off sales display capacity rank but includes three premises which appear to have grossly overestimated their display area (Coll Hotel 73.67m<sup>2</sup>, Coll Island store 58.96m<sup>2</sup> & Browns Ironmongers on Mull 55.5m<sup>2</sup>).
- Lomond Shores IDZ includes Waitrose, which is situated at the far east of Helensburgh. This inclusion doubles the off sales display capacity of the area and places Lomond Shore into 3<sup>rd</sup> on the rank instead of 11<sup>th</sup>.
- As indicated above Helensburgh East IDZ does not have the Waitrose included in its list of off sales even though it is located in the east end of Helensburgh. Inclusion of Waitrose would raise Helensburgh East IDZ to 9<sup>th</sup> on the rank. In addition it is bordered by Helensburgh Central which ranks highly for off sales display capacity.

This would indicate that while the number of licensed premises may be relevant, the capacity for sales of these outlets also has an impact on the health of the local population and should be taken into consideration. The overall capacity within, and accessibility of, adjacent IDZs should also be taken into consideration.

NHS Highland would like to request that this information is taken into consideration when developing the overprovision statement.

\* According to the EASR statistics for alcohol-related hospital stays Argyll & Bute Alcohol had a rate of 615.2 per 10000 in 2014(a). While this is less than the Scottish average of 696.9 per 10000 Scotland's relationship with alcohol should be looked at in the wider context of the UK and European data.

- Scotland has the highest alcohol-related death rate in the UK. Alcohol related death rates in Scottish men are double that of the rest of the UK.
- Rates for alcohol disorders in Europe (including Eastern Europe) are 7.5% of the population (aged 15+). Alcohol dependence rates are 4% of the population.(b)

#### Argyll & Bute ADP Recommendations for Inclusion in Argyll & Bute Licensing Board Overprovision Statement

The development of the overprovision statement and any grounds for objection must clearly be based on the analysis of statistical evidence. As such the Argyll & Bute Alcohol and Drug Partnership analysed the available data regarding both alcohol related deaths and alcohol related hospitalisations in relation to the density of licensed premises. On-sales and off-sales licences were considered both separately and together. In order that the analysis was looking for patterns within settings of an appropriate size: Intermediate Geographies were used taking into consideration the number of Data Zones within each Intermediate Geography. The data for alcohol related discharge diagnosis and alcohol related deaths were from 2010 to 2014, this information was sourced from a NHS National Services Scotland database. The licensing data came from the Centre for Research on Environment, Society and Health (CRESH) report; their data for outlets licensed to sell alcohol for consumption on the premises (on-sales) and off the premises (off-sales) were obtained in 2012 from each local licensing board. It should be noted that the CRESH data does not say where a premises offers both on and off sales facilities; these premises will be included in either the on or off sales figures.

While the number of alcohol related deaths in relation to licensed premises were analysed the small numbers involved make the establishment of significant patterns impossible.

The initial analysis of alcohol related hospitalisation (diagnosis at point of discharge) highlighted points of significance. Where significance was shown the results were then studied further to establish patterns in order that areas of specific concern could be highlighted appropriately. The areas fell in to four specific groupings as follows:

## 1. Areas where there is no significant correlation between alcohol related hospitalisation and licensed premises:

• Bute (off-sales and on-sales)

Recommendation: The links between the prevalence of alcohol related hospitalisations and number of on-sales and/or off-sales premises has showed no significance. In some areas the correlation is high but not at significant levels. Our recommendation is that the situation in these areas be reviewed regularly and that decisions should take into consideration any further increase in the relationship between alcohol related hospitalisations and number of both off-sales and on-sales premises. As such our recommendation would be to not include these areas within any over provision statement at this time. ADP recommendations for Argyll & Bute Licensing Board

## 2. Areas where the link between alcohol related hospitalisation and licensed premises was reducing in recent years:

• Mull, Iona, Coll and Tiree (off-sales and on-sales)

Recommendation: In these areas the correlation between alcohol related hospital discharge diagnosis and licensed premises has generally decreased from being significant in 2010. Our recommendation is that the situation in these areas be reviewed regularly and that decisions should take into consideration any further increase in the relationship between alcohol related hospitalisations and number of off-sales and/or on-sales premises. As such our recommendation would be to not include these areas within any over provision statement at this time.

## 3. Areas where there was no recurring pattern of hospitalisations linked to numbers of licensed premises:

- Helensburgh and Lomond (on-sales)
- Mid Argyll (off-sales and on-sales)
- Oban, Lorn and the Isles (on-sales)

Recommendation: These areas have, at least once, shown significant links between the prevalence of alcohol related hospitalisations and number of off-sales and/or onsales premises. There has been no clear pattern of change within these areas. As such our recommendation would be to include these areas within any over provision statement as areas of concern.

## 4. Areas where the significant link between alcohol related hospitalisation and licensed premises is clear and sustained:

- Cowal (off-sales and on-sales)
- Helensburgh and Lomond (off-sales)
- Islay, Jura & Colonsay (off-sales and on-sales)
- Kintyre (off-sales and on-sales)
- Oban, Lorn and the Isles (off-sales)

Recommendation: In all of these areas the links between the prevalence of alcohol related hospitalisations and number of on-sales and/or off-sales premises has showed sustained and significant patterns. In Cowal (on sales), Helensburgh & Lomond (off sales), Islay, Jura and Colonsay (off and on sales) and Kintyre (off and on sales) the correlation between alcohol related hospital discharge diagnosis and licensed premises are reasonably stable though significant. In Cowal (off sales); and Oban, Lorn & the Isles (off sales) there is significant correlation, however this correlation is generally lowering suggesting the relationship between alcohol related hospital discharge diagnosis and the number of off-sales premises in this area is becoming less significant. As such we would consider these areas to be overprovided with on-sales and/or off-sales premises and would request that under the Licensing Boards requirement to take public health matters into consideration, these areas be expressly included in an overprovision statement stating that they are at present over provided with licensed premises.

#### **1.0 Introduction**

This report was requested by Sergeant Quinn to provide Argyll and Bute Council with police data concerning alcohol related crimes and the over provision of licensed premises. This report will subsequently form part of the Argyll and Bute Council Over Provision Report.

#### 2.0 Aim

The aim of this report is to provide analysis around the location and number of licensed premises within the Argyll and Bute Council area and the levels of associated crimes and incidents, indicating where alcohol was a factor where possible. This report will highlight those areas with high levels of crime and recorded incidents as well as a high number of licensed premises.

#### 3.0 Method

Figures for licensed premises location and licence type were provided by Argyll and Bute Council. This information was plotted onto the Police Scotland ArcGIS system and combined with the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) 2013 data. Population figures for each Intermediate Data Zone (IDZ) were retrieved from the Scottish Government website www.sns.gov.uk and crime and incident data from Police Scotland Crime Management System and ScOMIS. Data was searched between the dates 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014 and 31<sup>st</sup> January 2015 and retrieved on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2015. All Group 1 Crimes involving alcohol were extracted from the Performance Database held locally.

Due to the low number of residents per IDZ and town in Argyll and Bute the comparative rate per head of population was set to 1,000 in order to provide clarity on the figures.

#### 4.0 Data Limitations

It should be noted that there is no accurate way of recording which antisocial behaviour crimes and incidents involved alcohol or where alcohol may have been a contributing factor. Similarly after the conversion to a new system for recording domestic abuse there is no current means of identifying which incidents involved alcohol. Figures contained in this report SHOULD NOT be considered as official police statistics.

#### 5.0 Argyll and Bute Licensed Premises

Within Argyll and Bute there are a total of 586 licensed premises with these being a mixture between on sales, off sales and club licenses. Table 1 below displays the location of these licensed premises in terms of IDZ, the types of licenses in each area and the population size.

Table 1 shows that the IDZ with the highest number of licensed premises is Mull, Iona, Coll and Tiree with 56 such premises and approximately 14.4 licensed premises per 1,000 head of population against a total population for Argyll and Bute of 88,050. This places Mull, Iona, Coll and Tiree as having the second highest number of licensed premises per 1,000 head of population with Oban North the highest at 15.1. The Loch Awe IDZ has the third highest number of licensed premises per 1,000 population.

Given the geographical profile of the Argyll and Bute area and the remoteness of many of the towns and villages analysis was also conducted on a town-by-town basis. To obtain data for specific towns all the IDZ which cover these towns were added together, showing the total number of licensed premises for the largest towns. Table 2 displays the IDZ which encompass the major towns.

With the combination of IDZ into what towns they cover it is possible to analyse the information regarding licensed premises on a town-by-town level as shown in table 3.

By analysing the data on a town-by-town level Oban is shown to have both the highest number of licensed premises within Argyll and Bute as well as the highest number per 1,000 population. Similarly Rothesay has the second highest number of licensed premises per 1,000 population in terms of population and Campbeltown the third highest. Whilst Helensburgh clearly has the largest population size, in comparison to other towns it has relatively few licensed premises per 1,000 population.

#### 6.0 Crimes and Incidents

The following information relates to the number of crimes and incidents within each IDZ and town over the period 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014 to 31<sup>st</sup> January 2015. It should be noted that there is no accurate method of determining whether alcohol was a factor in all crimes and incidents unless the crime directly relates to alcohol consumption or a licensed premise. Group 1 crimes which involved alcohol were identified using the L Division Performance Database.

#### 6.1 Group 1 Crimes

Group 1 crimes are those considered to have involved 'serious violence' and includes crimes such as murder, robbery, serious assault and Children and Young Person Scotland Act 1937. Within Argyll and Bute there were 42 Group 1 crimes<sup>2</sup> over the reporting period which equated to 0.5 Group 1 crimes per 1,000 population. Table 4 shows the number of Group 1 crimes located within each IDZ and the number of crimes within the major towns in the area.

Of all Group 1 Crimes within Argyll and Bute 55% involved alcohol and the vast majority of these were serious assaults. A total of five crimes took place within or outside licensed premises during this time. On a town-by-town basis Helensburgh shows as having experienced the highest number of Group 1 crimes during the reporting period with 10 crimes in total, albeit the number of crimes per 1,000 population is lower than in other areas. The majority of the Group 1 Crimes took place within the town centre where the highest concentration of licensed premises is also situated. Eight of the crimes were related to serious assaults, the remaining two being for an assault with intent to rob and a Children and Young Person Scotland Act. Five of the crimes in Helensburgh involved alcohol, all of which were serious assaults, and three took place in licensed premises.

Campbeltown had the highest number of Group 1 crimes per 1,000 population with five having taken place. These crimes included attempt murder, serious assault, firearms offences and Children and Young Person Scotland Act. Alcohol was involved in two crimes, being a serious assault and a firearms offence and no crimes took place within or outside a licensed premises.

Oban, which had the second highest Group 1 crimes per 1,000 population, had eight Group 1 crimes. Five of the Group 1 crimes in Oban were serious assaults with alcohol involved in each crime. One serious assault in Oban took place within a licensed premises, the three remaining crimes were for Children's and Young Persons Scotland Acts and did not involve alcohol.

#### 6.2 Alcohol Specific Crimes

Alcohol specific crimes<sup>3</sup> are those where the consumption of alcohol or the act of being intoxicated are the libelled crimes. Also incorporated in this section are those crimes which come under the Licensing Scotland Act 2005 for crimes including being heavily intoxicated in licensed premises or attempting to enter premises whilst heavily intoxicated. Over the reporting period a total of 95 alcohol specific crimes were recorded as shown below in table 5.

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Of all alcohol specific crimes 23 were related to drinking in the street and 26 concerned persons being drunk and incapable, not in the care of a suitable person. All of the remaining 46 crimes were for various Licensing Scotland Act 2005 related to alcohol. Table 5 clearly shows Helensburgh Centre IDZ recorded the most alcohol specific crimes per 1,000 head of population furthermore the Helensburgh area as a whole contained 38% of all alcohol specific crimes recorded in Argyll and Bute. Helensburgh East IDZ in particular recorded seven alcohol specific crimes and only counts five licensed premises within the area. Within Helensburgh the crimes recorded were mainly for drinking in public places and for patrons conducting themselves in a disorderly manner within a licensed premises.

It should be noted that in Oban, which has the highest number of licensed premises, there were relatively few alcohol specific crimes committed when compared to other towns such as Helensburgh and Dunoon.

#### 6.3 Disorder

Crimes of disorder<sup>4</sup> and incidents of disorder<sup>5</sup> normally include actions which cause annoyance to others or damage to their property as well as physical harm. There is only one incident code which directly relates to drinking in public, AB-55. Youth disorder was also analysed although it should be noted that there is no reliable way to determine the involvement of youths in incidents and therefore a key word search was utilised for these incidents<sup>6</sup>. Table 6 provides the levels of disorder within Argyll and Bute as well as the towns which recorded the most disorder incidents.

Disorder crimes and incidents were highest in the Dunoon IDZ where a combined total of 354 disorder crimes and incidents occurred. This was the second highest IDZ per 1,000 population after Helensburgh Centre which recorded 111.1 disorder crimes and incidents. Of note are the IDZ Hunter's Quay and Helensburgh East which both recorded high levels of disorder crimes and incidents and only containing 15 and five licensed premises respectively.

Analysis of disorder crimes and incidents by town shows that Rothesay, per population size, has the highest rate of disorder crime and incidents in Argyle and Bute followed by Campbeltown. Helensburgh, whilst having the highest number of disorder crimes and incidents, has a significantly lower rate per 1,000 population compared to other towns.

The figures for youth disorder within IDZ and towns are shown in table 7. To calculate incidents related to youths drinking<sup>7</sup> or being intoxicated a key word search had to be employed. It should be noted that the number of youth related disorder incidents and youths drinking or intoxicated is likely to be larger than searching on key words allows.

In terms of youth disorder Helensburgh Centre and Dunoon IDZ showed the highest numbers of incidents per 1,000 population. Helensburgh Centre IDZ and the town itself show the highest numbers of youth disorder within Argyll and Bute with 23.3 youth incidents per 1,000 population in Helensburgh Centre and 10.3 incidents per 1,000 for Helensburgh as a whole. Youth disorder in Helensburgh was mainly described as groups of youths congregating and causing annoyance by shouting and being rowdy. Helensburgh Centre IDZ also recorded the highest levels of youth drinking with 6.2 incidents per 1,000. The youth disorder and youth drinking in Helensburgh is mainly around the town centre which is also where the majority of licensed premises are located however there is little to suggest the youth disorder is linked to the licensed premises.

The figure of 1.3 youth drinking incidents per 1,000 population in Lochgilphead is also notable. Whilst this number is the same as that found in Helensburgh there were only five incidents in Lochgilphead over the space of one year and 6.7 youth related incidents per 1,000 head of population which was the lowest number recorded in any of the towns.

#### 6.4 Domestic Incidents

Due to the introduction of a new system for recording domestic abuse the ability to determine which crimes and incidents involved alcohol is not currently available. Figures for domestic incidents include those in which no criminality was established on police attendance and also those where crimes were libelled. For domestic Group 1 crimes and domestic common assaults the L Division Performance Database was utilised to provide details of alcohol. Figures for domestic abuse within IDZ and towns are shown in table 8.

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There were no Group 1 domestic crimes in which alcohol was a factor throughout the reporting period. Of the 134 common assaults recorded that were domestic abuse crimes 89 involved alcohol being consumed by either or both parties involved. This equates to 66% of all domestic common assaults in Argyll and Bute involving alcohol with both victim and offender having consumed alcohol in most crimes.

Domestic abuse incidents were highest per head of population in the Campbeltown IDZ area where there were 51 domestic incidents. It is of note however that in terms of volume of crime this area had a lower number of domestic incidents compared to the towns of Dunoon and Helensburgh. Both Dunoon and Helensburgh, whilst recording the highest number of domestic incidents, had lower numbers of domestic incidents per head of population with Helensburgh itself recording the lowest figure per head of population across Argyll and Bute. The highest concentration of domestic incidents was within Campbeltown town centre where there were 30 domestic incidents, 11 of which involved no criminality.

# 7.0 Findings

To give an overall result for which areas had the highest numbers of various crime and incidents throughout this report the following two tables show which IDZ and town were highest for each crime and incident type by head of population. Each IDZ and town was given a number representative of its position or rank within each section and the top three highlighted to show which IDZ or town appeared most often as an area with high levels of crime or incidents.

Please note that the numbers within the following tables 9 and 10 are only indicative of the position the IDZ or town was in each crime or incident category, with 1<sup>st</sup> representing the IDZ or town had the highest number or crime or incidents and 22<sup>nd</sup> the lowest number.

Helensburgh Centre IDZ recorded the highest numbers for six different crime and incident categories when normalised by 1,000 head of population and also has the 6<sup>th</sup> highest number of licensed premises. Dunoon IDZ, which had the 9<sup>th</sup> highest number of licensed premises per 1,000 population, recorded the second highest number of crimes and incidents for five different categories. It should be noted that the IDZ with the highest number of licensed premises by head of population, namely Oban North; Mull, Iona, Coll and Tiree; and Loch Awe, did not generally rank the highest in terms of crime or incidents with the exception of Oban North where Group 1 crimes were the second highest amount in Argyll and Bute per 1,000 population.

This same method was used to analyse the six major towns in Argyll and Bute to show which towns recorded the highest numbers of each crime or incident per 1,000 population as shown in table 10.

When examined on a town-by-town basis Campbeltown appears as the town which has the third highest number of licensed premises and also the highest numbers of Group 1 crimes, disorder crimes and domestic incidents per 1,000 population. The town of Helensburgh, which has the lowest number of licensed premises per 1,000 population, has the highest numbers of Alcohol specific crimes and youth related incidents. For youth related incidents involving alcohol Helensburgh has the second highest recorded numbers. The town of Rothesay had the most crime and incident types in the top three highest recorded numbers. The town of Rothesay also has the second highest number of licensed premises per 1,000 population.

From Table 10 above the towns of Rothesay and Campbeltown have the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> highest numbers of licensed premises within Argyll and Bute as well as recording high numbers of crimes, incidents and alcohol specific crimes and incidents. Analysis of IDZ areas indicates that Helensburgh Centre had the highest numbers for nearly all categories related to crimes and incidents. It should be noted that when analysing the town of Helensburgh the vast majority of licensed premises are located within the Helensburgh Centre IDZ with far smaller numbers in the outlying areas. When all Helensburgh figures are collated together the higher number of alcohol related crimes and incidents taking place within Helensburgh Centre are diffused by the larger population size.

Consideration should be made when analysing these figures as to the presence of large events within areas such as the Cowal Games held in Dunoon each year. These events typically draw in an influx of visitors and can skew figures for areas such as Dunoon.

#### Annex 7: Overprovision – free text comments from public survey

- 1. Alcohol abuse is a problem across Scotland, but is particularly prevalent on the West coast. We need to tackle the problem head-on and invest more in education on alcohol awareness and on interventions to stall alcohol abuse
- 2. Alcohol availability is such that if you want some you can get it
- 3. Alcohol is a legal drug, and its use has health implications, good and bad. Other recreational drugs, with similar health implications, should be de-criminalised, licensing devised, and treated in a similar manner to alcohol.
- 4. Alcohol is available far too cheaply. It is an addictive drug and should be priced to discourage use
- 5. Alcohol is not a problem in our area. I think the biggest problem in our area seems to be recreational drugs and hopefully this will be acted on by the authorities
- 6. Alcohol is too cheap and too easy to access when you add in Scottish drinking culture you get a dangerous and damaging mix. People are able to access drink at an earlier age, in greater quantities and on a regular basis. The rise in drinking at home, fuelled by cheap deals at the supermarket, means little or no regulation. At least in a pub the publican has a responsibility not to serve people that are too drunk

- 7. Alcohol will always be accessible from a variety of sources and if people want it they will find it, regardless of whether there are 100 outlets or 10. Until it is socially unacceptable for people to use alcohol as an excuse their bad/criminal/abusive behaviours, there will always be multiple consequences to deal with
- 8. Alcohol, in general and not specifically in this area, is priced too low, and is too readily available and socially accepted
- 9. All areas of Britain have alcohol related incidents related to crime, health, noise and disorder and this has been the case since alcohol was invented, so there is nothing new there. As an ex police constable things are much better than they were 30/40 years ago when it was common to see males staggering about drunk & incapable, so things have improved considerably. Young people, particularly from families with parents who suffer from alcohol related problems need support and protection. The problem is how do you protect the vulnerable without penalising the law abiding sensible majority and therein lies the problem and it always has. Stringent rules and regulation only shift the problem so I think in Argyll & Bute you have got the balance just about right where tourists and locals alike can enjoy a refreshment at reasonable times of the day and night.
- 10. Although it can present problems to youngsters, I feel if we were more 'relaxed' like the Europeans, then there would not be so many teenagers using it under age & there would be a different attitude towards!
- 11. As a former B&B owner, I felt that the cost of licencing was prohibitive. It would have been good to be able to offer guests a glass of wine on arrival. As an area reliant on tourism, high levels of service bring return customers this service was something I could not offer. At the time I wondered if this was why restaurants in Lochgilphead were not licenced? (Taj Mahal, Coriander including when it was Edo).

- 12. as an ex drinker/drug user, takin away the availability wont stop the drinker, u need more info out there in schools an other places about the dangers of drinking, alcohol is a drug, and no matter wot the media says, alcohol is the first step to harder drugs. Look at the mental health issues caused by alcohol, health issues, crime, the list could go on forever...teach people the honest facts about alcohol
- 13. At least 10 premise selling alcohol for a population of approx. 500 people
- 14. Availability of drugs is closely controlled, but this hasn't stopped widespread drug misuse. Control of availability, and pricing, have become the top political priority, but they will never be the silver bullet people believe them to be. Social attitudes and education is the key
- 15. Binge drinking in teenagers is worrying
- 16. Both shops near to me and most, if not all on the peninsula have a licence, including 2 in Garelochhead. I personally don't think it's the amount of shops that is the problem, it's the people who feel the need to drink it in public and be a nuisance to others. This isn't so much in my area but Rosneath does seem to have this problem. Capping the number of shops with a licence will just mean people will go elsewhere which will mean either drink driving or drinking in public on the way back
- 17. Cheap supermarket alcohol is killing communities and their pubs.

- 18. Children's mental health suffers due to domestic incidents involving alcohol. Also problems are occurring through alcohol/drug combinations. (Legal Highs)
- 19. closure of hotel and pub has resulted in the death of the community and more home drinking
- 20. Due to the rural location it is often easier for the underage not to be served but this can be got round by an older youth or resident buying for those underage
- 21. Far too much being displayed in supermarkets. Much less on display would, I am sure suffice!!
- 22. For such a small Island, there are a lot of public houses, hotels and off licences within a short radius of the town centre
- 23. for such a small town there are far too many alcohol outlets. I think the use of all council buildings should be alcohol free including school buildings where the premises are used for functions at weekends
- 24. Government policies on licensing regulations and driving limits is closing down rural pubs, driving people to drink cheap, supermarket alcohol in greater measures than they would in a pub. these policies should be reversed with special measures laid down to protect rural pubs and off licences

25. great concern over under-age drinking

- 26. I believe the majority of people in my locality are able to enjoy alcohol for celebrations and relaxation within reason and the number of places to support such activities seems right. However, one cannot rule out the availability of alcohol as an influence on the choices of younger people or those with issues of addiction. I do not think there is too much availability but there does undoubtedly need to be support for those who are vulnerable to abusing this availability
- 27.1 do not agree with registered alcoholics getting more benefits, if this still happens. They should be given support to quit not money for alcohol
- 28. I feel it is not a good idea in Helensburgh, my nearest town for shopping to allow pubs, licensed cafes/restaurants etc to have tables and chairs out on the pavement outside their premises as it makes it difficult for pedestrians to pass by which is a hazard. Especially disabled people and people with prams/buggies etc. and young families. Not enough space before the busy roads too which is a danger! Also the noise disturbance and the threat of disorderly behaviour due to the alcohol consumption. The cigarette smoke is awful too, who wants passive smoking when visiting a seaside town! This is all a health hazard! Please rethink the licensing laws and keep all alcohol consumption to indoor premises. In fact I thought it was an offence already to drink alcohol outside in a public place!
- 29. I have not encountered any negative influence of the availability of alcohol in Argyll and Bute
- 30.1 know a lot of youngsters (under age) get alcohol so am suspicious of where they get it. I think the smaller shops are not always as diligent as the supermarkets.
- 31. I know for a fact that some convenience stores in the Helensburgh area sell alcohol to underage children
- 32. I live on an island and although availability is limited here it causes horrendous damage to health, families and lives
- 33. I personally think that the worst thing that happened was all day and much longer licencing hours many years ago

- 34. I think availability is immaterial. If people want it they will get it. What is required is a more responsible attitude towards alcohol, taught first & foremost by parents, and also by the authorities
- 35. I think it is silly that I cannot purchase alcohol anywhere until after 10:00. I am an adult, and can look after myself, without state supervision of this single aspect of my shopping
- 36.I think there is very little choice of off sales. The supermarkets are the only places, all other off sales in Oban have now closed down
- 37. I think we need to look at what makes young people particularly drink the sheer volume that they often do. Availability of alcohol plays a part but motivation (or indeed lack of general motivation) plays a huge role. Many young people use alcohol as temporary self-confidence and that's surely not going to work out well as a long term coping strategy? Definitely a much bigger picture than "are there too many places to buy alcohol?"
- 38. I think we over focus on young people's drinking, at the expense of addressing all ages and areas of society and overuse of alcohol. Often the local press sensationalise young people's issues in relation to alcohol and drug use which is unhelpful in keeping perspective and addressing the wider issues. Whilst it is my perception that alcohol increases criminal activity involving children in my area, I don't actually have any direct evidence for this opinion. Increase the price to assist with reducing alcohol use per capita per head across the population, to contribute to reducing costs to health and crime.
- 39. I'm particularly upset that the recent remodelling of our local supermarket increased the range of alcohol sold, and placed it immediately adjacent to the queue for checkouts (previously it had been in a dedicated aisle, and thus a little easier to bypass). I have expressed my concerns to the supermarket chain (Co-op).

- 40. If people are determined to drink, they will find the means and place to purchase alcohol. The vast majority of people are sensible, social drinkers, who shouldn't be penalised for the sake of the alcoholic-dependent or irresponsible others. Under-aged drinking is a problem nationwide
- 41. If the council did away with some of these places and tried to get more up market shop keepers into the town this would help to make the town more attractive for people to come and visit the way that they used to do before the town became a ghost town and maybe bring it into the 21st century and try and bring jobs into the town fr the young people who live in the area instead of them having to leave when it is time for them to leave school because there is no work to be found
- 42. If you try and hide alcohol you make it more attractive. Dependency unit visits should be available to 5th and 6 year pupils so that they can evidence the affects of alcohol abuse. School visits from reformed alcoholics as guest speakers
- 43. In addition to ease of availability, there is also the strong inherent culture whereby over indulging in alcohol consumption (e.g. going out to get a 'fill) is accepted as the norm and is the basis for a high level of social interaction.
- 44. In the immediate area Tighnabruaich and Kames, we have four hotels and two licenced grocers
- 45. Increasing emphasis on the significance of the role alcohol has on health / performance particularly aiming that at young people
- 46. It doesn't matter how many licenses establishments if people want to they will find it anywhere

- 47. It is good that we have a specialist wine shop in Helensburgh so that we do not have to rely on supermarkets. Whilst recognising the hazards of excessive alcohol consumption, we should also acknowledge that alcohol; has a positive role when consumed in responsible amounts in a social environment. Most of us manage our alcohol consumption sensibly we do not all drink in order to get drunk. So I hope availability of alcohol in this area is not about to be reduced, thus penalising the responsible drinker.
- 48. It is no big deal. There is a much smaller problem than in the past
- 49. It would help if shops and supermarkets could not sell alcohol after, say 6pm. People who are clearly drunk should not be served alcohol in pubs or shops
- 50. It's all well and good blaming alcohol for local problems, but maybe if Argyll and Bute council were more proactive in proving activities for children and bored young adults to do they may 2t resort to drinking you can't just lay the blame at those that sell alcohol. Do something positive for the young people of Argyll or the population may continue to dwindle
- 51. It's not just a local issue, it is a national issue, I think alcohol is too readily available locally there are various corner shops which sell drink as well as lots of pubs. I think if people are determined to get it, they will, and most people don't think it is a problem - it is in my opinion
- 52. It's not the availability of alcohol that is the issue. It's the lack of support for those who abuse it, along with drugs that you need to look at. In Campbeltown they won't even admit there is an issue, and those wanting assistance in this cannot get help from the gp, as they refuse to prescribe the correct medicines. It's pathetic in this day and age that those who are suffering from an illness mainly caused by some form of trauma cannot get help as they live in a rural area. Kintyre is the

worst for it. It's time something was done to assist those who suffer from alcoholism, and those who take illegal drugs. It's a real issue, and surveys like this don't do anything to help unless you take these comments on board and do something about it. From past experience though I am sure this will be ignored by a&b could council, as admitting they have an issue would be bad publicity!

53. It's too cheap and too readily available underage persons can get it easily without being checked for id

54. Like most things alcohol is OK in moderation. Landlords / shopkeepers continue to sell vast amounts to alcoholics, some people can hold the evidence of the intake of alcohol and continue to purchase at least a bottle a day from the same store. I personally think this is out of order. Alcoholics will 2t admit their addiction and can2t be told however they should be refused the sale of continuous large amounts

55. No Licensed premises on the island means people drink at home and probably drink more as a consequence.

- 56. No wonder people drink, just no jobs in our island and we take in many people where alcohol has already been a problem. We have so many empty properties and landlords and council happy to fill them, so the alcohol will remain problem
- 57. Not enough people involved in the license trade in Campbeltown, specifically pubs, are abiding by the law. Drunk people are served alcohol, despite this being against the law. There are many people working in pubs who do not have the required personal licence, and therefore have no idea of the law regarding the sale of alcohol. The pub watch system is being abused by over zealous licensee, who will get people put on it for personal reasons, and at the same time, very troublesome people avoid being put on pub watch. It's shambolic.

- 58. Of course there is harm in the consumption of alcohol but only when consumed irresponsibly. Alcohol can be safe when consumed responsibly. Education is the answer not limiting availability. If someone wants to buy alcohol they will find a way. Remember prohibition did not work in the USA.
- 59. Older youths purchase alcohol in the local shop walk round the corner out of the camera lens and provide younger youths with alcohol
- 60. One issue that annoys me is that often I do my main shopping early mornings and as such If I would like to buy alcohol for consumption through the week I am unable to do so
- 61. Rothesay bowling club lets people into the club in a state of disorder and underagers too and does not refuse sevice to them
- 62. Should not be available in every shop and supermarket in area
- 63. Some people drink too much. Cutting the number of places alcohol is available will not stop this they will just go to where they can get a drink. Bars should be cutting off their customers before they get to the point where they are causing trouble, and police should be monitoring areas where drunken kids congregate. I don't know what you can do about the idiot parents who allow/encourage their children to drink, other than educating said children from a young age on how it could impact on their life.
- 64. South of Dunoon, there is only one off licence, one pub and one licenced hotel. No over provision here

- some parents ban it, some hold parties and supply alcohol so thy can monitor it, some try and set good example, some 66. Strange mixed messages about alcohol. Tourism puts an emphasis on whisky and there are lots of outlets but other alcohol
- seems demonised. Worried about the alternatives to alcohol sought by young children and would sometimes quite like a cup of coffee when I am at a bar a night, interspersed with my alcohol, but this does not seem possible

65. still hearing stories about people buying alcohol for young people. Would like advice to parents of teenagers (as I am) -

- 67. The fact that licensed premises continue to serve people drink that are clearly to the brim annoys me and then they are falling all over the road trying to get home. The local supermarkets are more vigilant when selling alcohol
- 68. The level of availability of alcohol in Garelochhead is just about right (1 pub, 1 club and 2 off-sales) although there appears to be too many on-sales in Helensburgh
- 69. The licensing hours in shops is ridiculous. Alcohol should be available any time a particular shop is open

don't drink with teenagers - how do we know what is best?

70. The local hotel is at the heart of a small community like ours - from social events like music nights and Burns Nights to funeral gatherings. Alcohol has traditionally always been a part of these, and I see no reason why it should not continue to be so. In our small community we have just lived through 2 winters when our local hotel/pub was closed - we are very pleased that it has re-opened, but it now needs support. The demonizing of alcohol and raising of prices will only lead on the one hand to places like pubs being forced to close through lack of custom, and on the other hand will drive alcohol consumption 'underground'. I ticked the box for '3' because I believe it would be good to have more licensed restaurants in

the area, where locals and visitors alike could go for a meal and a glass of wine. This would not only please locals and benefit tourism but would give young people a healthy attitude towards alcohol consumption

- 71. The majority of people in the community use alcohol sensibly. The local hotel, the Galley of Lorne, is an asset as a meeting place for a significant section of the community. Regrettably there are the inevitable few who drink to excess thereby endangering their health. There is very little bad behaviour resulting from alcohol and when it does occur is often dealt with by the 'self policing' that small and close communities are so good at
- 72. The questions are biased right from the start: too many outlets suggested, not too few. The biggest problem now is home drinking and no socialisation of younger drinkers in controlled environments such as pubs, golf clubs, etc. The other major problem in rural Argyll (and Scotland) is the unjustified emphasis on criminalising anyone who drives with even a small amount of alcohol. This is unjustified statistically and is leading to closures of rural hotels, will make golf and other clubs unviable and will have consequent adverse effects on Scotland's tourism. How many rural licensed premises remain in the Sandbank/Kilmun/Ardentiny/ Loch Eck area for a start. There are consequences of introducing the recent licensing act and the drink drive legislation which were ignored in the consultation process. This consultation will also draw responses primarily from those opposed to alcohol and who see the harmful effects as paramount. And I would emphasise that I am not a heavy drinker and have never been stopped for drink driving or anything similar
- 73. The real issue here is the need to educate people on drinking responsibly, whilst control of where and when it is available is fine to a point, it does not tackle the underlying issue of the need for the individual to take responsibility for their health and behaviour

- 74. The restriction of purchase of alcohol before 10am is most inconvenient as I invariably complete my weekly shopping before this time and thus have to make a special trip to buy the occasional bottle of wine/beer. How this restriction works to prevent problem drinkers obtaining alcohol eludes me. Stop worrying about alcohol and instil some discipline into our young people then they will have some self discipline
- 75. The supply of alcohol will be decided on a commercial basis, if there is too much provision licencees will stop selling people with dependency will find alcohol even if you close all the suppliers. would the expense incurred in this survey not be better spent providing toilet facilities in the town rather than expanding the nanny state
- 76. There are far too many late licenses in Oban and occasional licenses are handed out like sweeties. How can it be socially responsible to grant 3am licenses for two weeks around Christmas including Christmas Eve? Apart from the harm to those people drinking, the whole town is disturbed by noise. What does it say as about us a society with vomit on the street on Christmas morning supporting families, I don't think so!! 3am opening for 3 days at St Patrick's day? Not even a Scottish occasion it's just a ploy to get round the licensing laws and the public has no say, no data is available to monitor this. The Licensing Board needs to take a hard look at themselves they are part of the problem and abdicate their responsibility.
- 77. There are now only 4 outlets apart from Licensed Premises in Rothesay although another will be opening soon. Part of the problem has been adults buying for under age young people so I think there have not been enough prosecutions for that
- 78. There is by far too many outlets for purchase of alcohol in this area. I personally have confronted several unscrupulous retailers within the area whom are blatantly selling alcohol to children. In my opinion any retailer involved in this practice should automatically have their licence revoked with immediate effect

- 79. There should be a comparison made with numbers of other locations selling alcohol and also with numbers of alcohol related crimes and illnesses before any new licences are granted. The applicant should be required to demonstrate that they have procedures in place to prevent sale of alcohol to minors and to people who clearly have already had too much to drink. Landlords of pubs etc should be proactive about taking keys off drivers
- 80. There should be more availability of late licenses so everyone doesn't descend on the one place
- 81. Too cheap in shops and too costly in pubs. Pubs provide a safe, sociable, supervised environment, much healthier than drinking alone in your house
- 82. Too cheap in supermarkets.
- 83. Too cheap, too easily available and superstores show no responsibility at all
- 84. We have the main supermarkets that sell alcohol along with corner stores. On top of this there are garages getting in on the act along with pubs on every corner and side street. Argyll & Bute need to look into providing better facilities for youngsters to find alternative ways to amuse themselves. i.e. sports centre, bowling alley. The kind of venues that kids and or families can attend! Take the focus away from alcohol!
- 85. We should be more like the continent and stop trying to hide everything. You should be able to buy alcohol if the shop is open no restricted times
- 86. Young people are able to access alcohol through adults purchasing it and i think this is a big problem.
- 87. Younger people, mainly teenagers or slightly older, still bulk buy at supermarkets, mostly Friday/Saturday

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#### **ANNEX 8: OVERPROVISION - LICENCEES SURVEY COMMENTS**

- Supermarkets seem to be taking so much trade away from Pubs. In a pub, the barman can say when to stop for a customer, but in the supermarket or off license there is no one to keep an eye out for the customer and drinking can be carried to excess far too easily. If Tesco can provide alcohol cheaper than we can buy it it makes the pub a dying business.
- 2. We operate 7 days per week during the summer (beginning of April until the end of September) but operate a reduced service during the other months usually three days per week.
- 3. Our premises is very rural with the nearest off sales shop being more than 8 miles away and not open evenings. The next nearest hotel is 3 miles away. We know the majority for the young people well and underage drinking in hotels is not a problem. I do believe that cheap off sales drink is a problem as older children buy it for younger children.
- 4. There are two types of drinkers. The pub drinkers and the house drinkers. The public house cost basis means that fewer people than ever can afford to purchase alcohol this way on a regular basis and as such the majority now purchase from off sales for home consumption. The percentage divide is widening rapidly.
- 5. My local Coop, which by volume, will retail hundreds of times the amount of alcohol I sell pays NO BUSINESS RATES! (Small bis rates relief scheme). My rateable value is £16,000 and as such I pay £7000 approx. The intake of alcohol is controlled in licensed premises. Who has an optic in their house?
- 6. 20 cans of lager for £11.00 Off Trade is equivalent to approx. £49.00 On Trade. Basically a no brainer.
- 7. Alcohol in supermarkets is being subsidised. If you wish proof of this then please contact me.
- 8. My brother owns a substantial sized brewery which supplies a global market. UK supermarkets are selling his products at less than cost price!
- 9. Around 1980 there were 47 licensed premises on Bute. Today I believe the figure is 17. The On Trade is being decimated. I reckon my pub will be a cafe/charity shop/bookies etc. in 5 years time.

- 10. Living in a rural community, I feel we have no problem with the availability of alcohol between both on and off sales.
- 11. In our small community we are aware there are people who have problems with alcohol, and occasional incidents of noise/nuisance but these are not in our opinion related simply to issues of provision.
- 12. The island is a seasonal economy so this hotel is closed through the winter when there is no demand and open from March to the end of October 7 days a week.
- 13. During the season there are 2 hotels, a licensed bar and a shop selling as an off-licence. There seems to be a balance of supply and demand.
- 14. Alcohol problems have nothing to do with availability of alcohol. The problem is with the consumption of alcohol. People have to make an informed personal choice in this matter. I believe education, not dictation, can help people make this choice.
- 15. With regard to children the more difficult you make it to obtain alcohol then the harder they will try to obtain it. Again education should be the way to tackle problems. Other European countries have a much more lax attitude and you rarely see binge drinking on the streets.
- 16. I believe that low priced alcohol from supermarket promotions and deals are a factor in all of the above. Also the over provision of licensed premise in the Campbeltown area. The number of public houses were fine when it was a vibrant town but now there is not the custom to supply the number of bars. Prices are cheaper in Campbeltown bars as there is so much competition. I believe if any other bars were allowed to open/reopen then there would be price reductions to compete with them. This is not good for current businesses in Campbeltown.
- 17. Late licenses after 12.00 are to me a bit stupid as the customer has a set amount he/she can spend. Opening the bas for longer won't increase the customers spend but wages/lighting/heating etc. all go up. In Oban and surrounding areas there are about the right amount of pubs but there is not the business especially in the winter when you consider how many customers now smoke and drink at home. Much as I agree with the smoking ban in Pubs I think it has killed too many pubs.

- 18. I consider that the more rural areas of Argyll and Bute need to hold on to their pubs and diversify to remain vital hubs for local communities in our area residents have to travel some distance for a night out. However like most of the country, local hotels and bars struggle to survive off season as they are less used by locals as supermarket alcohol is so cheap in comparison and public transport non-existent in evenings and weekends. Vigilance re underage/drunks by hotels/bars also makes home drinking attractive to those who are under age or those over indulging. The closure figures in Scotland bear this out. Our bar is over 500 years old but present legislation reduced drink drive limit etc. is sorely affecting viability difficult.
- 19. There are areas where we are aware overprovision could be an issue, but Mull and Iona are not in our opinion subject to this.
- 20. There is a certain pub in Oban promoting cheap alcohol this has to encourage binge drinking which can lead to health and anti-social behaviour. Such pricing should be discouraged by the licensing board.
- 21. We supply a wide range of outlets in Argyll, and obviously the area is very varied, but we haven't heard of any reports that would suggest that over provision is an issue. We would be wary that designating an area as over provided could prevent new licensees being able to open new businesses and so provides protection to existing licensees. This lack of competitive pressure in our view can cause a problem in the industry, leading to old fashioned offerings that aren't meeting the current needs of residents or visitors.
- 22. I don't believe we have a problem in most areas of Argyll
