1. APOLOGIES

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and general introductions were made.

2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest intimated.

3. MINUTES

The Minute of the previous Annual General Meeting of the Argyll and Bute Windfarm and Renewables Trust was approved as a true record.

4. EAST KINTYRE WINDFARM TRUSTEES

The group gave consideration to an annual report and audited accounts of East Kintyre Windfarm Trust to the year ending 31 March 2018, having heard from Alastair Bennett.

Decision:

The Argyll and Bute Windfarm and Renewables Trust agreed to note the detail provided.

5. WEST KINTYRE WINDFARM TRUSTEES

The group gave consideration to an annual report and statement of accounts of West Kintyre Windfarm Trust to the year ending 31 March 2018, having heard from Margaret Pratt.

The group gave consideration to the annual report and associated accounts of Inveraray Windfarm Trust to the year ending 31 March 2018.

7. ALIENERGY

The group gave consideration to a report by ALIEnergy outlining the background and staff detail of the company, together with current and recent projects and activities.

Decision:

Argyll and Bute Windfarm and Renewables Trust agreed:-

1. to note the information provided; and
2. requested that the 2017-18 accounts be forwarded to the Senior Committee Assistant for circulation by email to Members of the Trust, when they become available.

8. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

The group noted that Scottish Power Renewables had written to the Council in respect of Beinn an Tuirc 1 and 2 and Clachan Flats intimating a revision to the Minute of Agreement. Ms Semple explained what was behind the proposed updates and a detailed discussion followed on a range of issues that might need to be considered, especially the question of wide ranging interests in very small communities. It was noted that Ms Semple would contact the Council to discuss what could be done to resolve the points raised.

Margaret Pratt raised a query about whether a water bore hole for a Residents Association would meet the criteria. Mr Reppke agreed to check and get back to her. She also enquired about the Community Support Network and whether anyone knew of this group. It was confirmed that this was an HSCP run service based in Campbeltown.

It was noted with disappointment that Cour Windfarm had not yet made any community payments and whilst it wasn't to operate within the Council trust umbrella, Mr Reppke said that he would ask colleagues to raise concerns with them.

Mr Reppke confirmed that payment have recently been made for Deucharan Hill Windfarm after a delay in receiving the funds and that SSE had still not paid the monies for Tangy Windfarm.

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East Kintyre Windfarm Trust Annual Report 2019

East Kintyre Community Council is currently made up of 6 elected members and 1 co-opted member. These members, along with 3 independent trustees, currently make up East Kintyre Windfarm Trust.

In the financial year ending 31 March 2019, EKWFT received £32,886 in grant payments from Argyll & Bute Council. This was approximately £27,000 less than usual due to 2 Beinn an Tuirc II payments having been received in the previous financial year. The total also included 2 payments from Tangy 2, totalling almost £6,000, one of which was carried over from the previous year.

During the financial year 25 grants totalling £44,720 were approved for local organisations and groups. A further £9,800 was agreed for 2 projects, although the payments were not cleared within the reporting period. A total of £56,036 in grants was paid out during the year, which included £20,779 for repairs to Carradale Village Hall roof that had been agreed in the previous financial year.

As well as the tranche meetings in May and November, EKWFT held an extraordinary meeting in January 2019 to consider an application to help fund a temporary community shop in Carradale. A grant of £7810 was made to help fund the project with just under half of it made as a loan to be repaid from the profits of the shop, which is being run by volunteers.

A number of grants were made to Carradale Community Trust (CCT), which acts as an umbrella charity for a range of local projects including Carradale Harbour Enterprises Ltd, which is a wholly owned subsidiary of CCT. Grants made included planning fees for a community composting scheme, valuation of shop premises, the refurbishment of the local heritage centre and purchase of new outdoor furniture. The temporary shop project also comes under CCT.

Carradale Village Hall also benefitted from grants for the purchase of new chairs and lights and Peninver Village Hall received an award to cover the cost of insurance and new window blinds.

Sports clubs that benefitted from grants included Carradale Amateur Football Club, Campbeltown Tennis Club and Carradale Golf Club. Young people also benefited from grants made to Carradale Primary School for swimming lessons, to Carradale Activity Play Park for the completion of the new play park and to Carradale Scouts to help them establish a group in East Kintyre. A grant was also made to Carradale Music Festival, which is organised and well attended by many young people in the local and wider community.

Other clubs, societies and charities to benefit from grants included Carradale Camera Club (new projector for community use), Peninver Players (drama production costs), Saddell Abbey Trust (maintenance works), Carradale Surgery Patient Group (Patient Transport) and Campbeltown Picture House (new audio equipment).

Grants were also made to The Kintyre Way and Kintyre & Gigha Marketing to help promote tourism in Kintyre.

As grant funding has increased, trustees of EKWFT have sought to support larger projects which are more likely to deliver long term benefits to the community. A development fund, to help finance such community projects, was established in 2016 and currently has a balance of almost £56,000. Trustees have recently agreed in principle to help fund a feasibility study for a community hub in Carradale from these funds and, if this is successful, will consider making a significant grant from the fund towards the total project costs.

Each year, 10% of all community benefit funds received are transferred into a retention fund (2 bank term deposit accounts) for use by future generations. At 31 March 2019 it had a balance of £51,408.

Wherever possible, trustees look for evidence of match funding from applicants, although a degree of flexibility is often necessary as it becomes increasingly difficult for them to obtain such funding.

ANNUAL REPORT 2019

Since the last report to the Umbrella Trust AGM there has been two allocation meetings held in October 2018 and April 2019 with the next scheduled to take place in October 2019. We continue to many regular events and activities such as the Kintyre Way Ultra, local ploughing matches, village halls and other local clubs and groups such as the four local Scottish Women's Institute groups in the area.

Some of the larger grants include:

- £1600 to Shopper-Aide a local charity that collects and delivers repeat prescriptions in the area for those not able to carry out this task themselves plus offers a befriending and social activities service to residents in the area.
- £1500 to the Kintyre and Gigha Marketing Group to help with the redesign of their website.
- £2800 to West Kintyre Community Council for the replacement of out of date batteries and pads in the 6 defibrillators dispersed throughout the area
- £1500 to the Killean and Parish Church group for the purchase of a digital hymnal. Due to the loss of several local people able to play the church organ this purchase will allow music to be played at all services held within the churches
- £12000 to the "Turn Tayinloan Around Project" an exciting project linked to the West Kintyre Community Action Plan which identified the need for a playpark in the West Kintyre Area. The only suitable area in the west is that of the playing fields at Tayinloan. A local group has taken up the challenge to fund raise and develop part of the playing fields with state of art play and adventure equipment ranging from infant's swings for the very young to zip wires for older age groups. The cost of the equipment including insurance and maintenance is £58000 of which much fund raising has been done by the young people themselves. To date £52000 has been raised. At its last meeting the wind farm trust agreed it would "top up" the final amount needed if the final sum had not been reached by October of this year. This will enable the equipment to be installed over the winter months and be available for both residents and visitors to the area by the spring of 2020. It is hoped to further develop the playing fields over the next few years to that of an excellent outdoor sporting facility area able to host a variety of outdoor events and sports activities.
- Clachan Village Hall £4800 – due to the hall's deteriorating state the villagers have set up a redevelopment fund to raise funds for its replacement, to help with this project the wind farm trust has given £1000 for a conditions survey of the hall and £3800 revenue costs for two large fund raising events.
- £2500 to the McCorkindale School of Dancing, Campbeltown to help with the costs of their attendance at the American Highland Dance Championships held in Las Vegas in July of this year. This small school of dancing was the only group from Scotland invited to attend these prestigious championships and returned home having won several trophies.
- £9000 for the purchase and erection of a much-needed bus shelter at Glenbarr.

- £7830 to Rhunaharine Primary School to help with the costs of the pupils researching the ruins of Old Largie Castle and the heritage of the area, which will culminate in the children re-enacting life, costumes, music and customs of the castle and setting up a display of their findings in Campbeltown Museum. This extracurricular project is taking place with the guidance and help of the staff of Kilmartin Museum.

This list is not exhaustive but gives a flavour of the variety projects and groups the trust helps throughout the area.

We continue to operate the toilets at Tayinloan ferry terminal. We have over the past few years funded a port-a-loo at the car park of Westport beach – our “jewel in the crown” beach for both visitors and residents alike. As this is a less than ideal solution for toilet facilities in the area we were party to a 3 month survey of beach users. The results of this survey showed that due to the extensive use of the beach and water by both residents and visitors for wind surfing and water sports there was a majority view of a need for toilet and possibly shower facilities at the site. The panel members of the trust have agreed to set aside 50k for up to 2 years whilst a feasibility study is undertaken, and to develop facilities at this site if the results of the study show it is possible.

All applicants to the fund are now informed of SPR’s review of community benefit funding and the new compliance “rules” with regards to spend.

Our next meeting is scheduled to take place Monday 21st October with adverts for applications being placed in the papers and notice boards within the next three weeks.

Following on from last year's report, to confirm the Clachan Flats (Inveraray) Windfarm Trust paid out £9046 for the Avenue Project last October, which has been deemed a great success by the community and convinced the Community Council that the Windfarm money was best awarded most years to larger community projects.

Inveraray Community Council were in the fortunate position in January to be granted a large sum of money to help purchase a Community Minibus that would be run by Inspire Inveraray (Inveraray Community Company) and the Community Council, it was then decided at subsequent meetings to use a large proportion of the remaining monies in the Windfarm Trust to help purchase the bus.

In the July Community Council Meeting it was agreed to use £5,500.00 from the Clachan Windfarm Trust to help purchase a second hand minibus.

Presently, this is the only award from the monies from the previous Windfarm Trust money.

Accounts covering the period April 2019-August 2019 will be brought to the meeting. The application form for the Windfarm Trust money will also be brought to the meeting.

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ALlenergy is a sustainable energy charity based in Argyll and Bute, Scotland. It was established in 2000 by Argyll and Bute Council under the EU 'SAVE' programme. Part of a network of energy agencies across Europe, ALlenergy's aims are:

- To help people with fuel poverty and energy efficiency issues
- To encourage community renewables and local energy economy
- To reduce carbon emissions and mitigate climate change.

ALlenergy was incorporated on 27th September 2000 (SC SC211429) and achieved charitable status on 15th January 2001 (SCO32495). To date the charity has been largely dependent on grant income. In the past, Argyll and Bute Council provided some core funding. This ended in 2017, but Council continues to give various in-kind help, such as payroll services.

A small amount of core funding is provided through the Argyll Wind Farm Trust from the SSE Tangy 2 windfarm development. This underpins a range of charitable activities and is typically between £5k and £10k per year. ALlenergy's annual turnover is currently around £400k.

In July 2017 a wholly owned trading subsidiary was created, ALlenergy Ltd. Its aim is to create income to support the aims of the parent charity. The trading subsidiary was incorporated on 21st July 2017 (SC571709).

We currently have a staff team of 10 working on a range of projects in three areas:

- Renewable Energy and Local Energy Economy
- Education and Skills Development
- Affordable Warmth

ALlenergy - Current and Recent Projects and Activities

Renewable Energy and Local Energy Economy

Algal Solutions for Local Energy Economies (ASLEE) - a collaborative project between ALlenergy, systems manufacturer Xanthella and six other organisations: Woodlands Renewables, Ardnamurchan; the University of Stirling's Marine Environment Research Laboratory, Machrihanish; FAI Aquaculture, Ardtoe; VCharge UK; University of the West of Scotland; and Wood. The project is developing the use of modular photobioreactors with submerged LED lighting as a transactive load and demand side management tool in the manufacture of algal products using intermittent electricity from local renewable energy. The algal products are intended for use in the local aquaculture sector as feedstocks for oysters, wrasse and salmon. The ASLEE project is funded by the Scottish Government's Local Energy Challenge Fund and the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust.

ENBIO (Energy Bioeconomy Project) – here we take the ASLEE concept one step further by focussing on the circular economy aspects of the model: investigating the use of local waste streams of nutrients (eg from agriculture, aquaculture or distilleries) and carbon dioxide (eg from fermentation or combustion processes) as feedstocks in the algal photobioreactors; producing human nutraceuticals rich in essential omega-3 oils (Chlorella, Spirulina); and creating a complex economic model to explore the viability of this approach in different local scenarios. ENBIO involves ASLEE partners Xanthella, ALlenergy and Woodlands Renewables and is funded by Zero Waste Scotland.

GeoAtlantic (funded by ERDF Interreg Atlantic Area) – this project is investigating geothermal energy potential around the Atlantic coast of Europe. The GeoAtlantic project aims to encourage transition away from fossil fuel dependence; promote the use of renewable energy from the ground; and facilitate uptake of geothermal energy or ground source heat technologies. The project will improve knowledge, develop skills, facilitate technology transfer and new business, and provide funding for a demonstration project in each region. ALlenergy is one of 12 European partner organisations across Spain, Portugal, France, Ireland, England and Scotland.

COBEN (Community Benefits in Civic Energy) - ALlenergy succeeded in putting forward Oban as one of four local communities in the HIE area which were selected through the COBEN project for the development and implementation of a pilot Local Energy Plan, investigating supply, demand and future potential and including electricity, heat and transport. ALlenergy carried out community engagement work for this project in Oban and contributed to the Scottish Government 'Guide to developing local energy plans'. The Oban Local Energy Plan is now complete.

LEO (Local Energy Oban) – ALlenergy has permission from SSE for an 850 kW grid connection at Moleigh, Oban. The Community and Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES) Infrastructure and Innovation Fund (IIF) provided funding for an options appraisal, by Ricardo Energy and Environment, to assess different potential options for energy generation, storage, grid balancing, local ownership and local energy use, ensuring maximum local benefit.

Argyll Woodfuel Forum - ALlenergy established and provides Secretariat for Argyll Woodfuel Forum, funded by Forestry Commission Scotland, to encourage the use of local woodfuel for sustainable renewable heating. Activities include organisation of events and site visits; marketing and distribution of relevant updates and information to interested parties; keeping a database of biomass projects in Argyll and being the key contact point for woodfuel related advice queries in Argyll.

REScoop202020 - The REScoop202020 project (funded by Intelligent Energy Europe) focussed on encouragement and social acceptance of community ownership of renewable projects of all types – cooperative models; examples of shared ownership; community benefits; and knowledge exchange between different European countries. A legacy has been the establishment of the European Federation of Renewable Energy Cooperatives (REScoop.eu), of which ALlenergy is an associate member - this active network enables continuing involvement and collaboration with a wide variety of European community energy projects and initiatives.

Affordable Warmth

Affordable Warmth for Sustainable Rural Communities project (funded by Big Lottery)

In-depth energy advice and targeted support to the most vulnerable low income households throughout Argyll. Home energy advice visits are offered along with income maximisation services. Clients are monitored over time and revisited where necessary to ensure that best outcomes are achieved. Training is provided for staff and volunteers who work with the target group to enable them to recognise people in fuel poverty and refer them on to ALLenergy for further assistance.

Money Skills Argyll is a partnership project coordinated by Argyll and Bute Council involving eight local advice providers. Its focus is on achieving an increase in disadvantaged participants with improved money management skills; and a decrease in disadvantaged participants affected by debt as a barrier to social inclusion, using an integrated, multi-agency approach. ALLenergy's affordable warmth team offers home energy visits and provides advice on fuel poverty issues, with a focus on low income households, single parents, and the unemployed. The project is funded by the European Social Fund, Scottish Government and the Big Lottery Fund.

Young Carers project (funded by Energy Action Scotland) - Targeting care leavers and young carers, and the local agencies and organisations who support them, and offering a bespoke energy saving toolkit of energy saving items to young carers and care leavers in Argyll and Bute, as well as providing advice/support, mentoring and awareness raising. The project assists young people who are the main users of energy or manage their energy bills in their homes, either because they live on their own or because they are carers for family member(s).

Affordable Warmth for Health Project, funded by British Gas Energy Trust. The purpose of this project was to forge links between health professionals and the work of ALLenergy's Affordable Warmth Team. Fuel poverty is a proven cause of health issues. Thus, it would make sense for home energy efficiency considerations to be incorporated into the Care Plans for vulnerable patients where the patient's home may not be conducive to good health. The project sought to establish a referrals system to reach vulnerable people who have become socially isolated through fuel poverty and ill health and may be unlikely to take the initiative to seek support for home energy efficiency issues or fuel debt.

Digital Energy Advice in Argyll and Bute, funded by Scotland's Digital Participation Charter. This project aims to enhance the digital aspects of our activities and promote digital upskilling in our organisation. Through this project, advisors now use tablets during house visits to carry out activities online. All staff members are developing their digital skills. We launched an Instagram account- ali_energy_insta- showcasing photos from our day to day travels across Argyll and Bute, and #argyllenergyhour on Twitter, an opportunity to discuss energy matters across Argyll and Bute, every Friday morning 10-11am.

Affordable Warmth and Food, funded by Big Lottery Investing in Communities – this project addresses the 'eat or heat' dilemma by providing energy workshops and drop in sessions in local food banks alongside events focussing on saving money on eating and cooking.

Education and Skills Development

Bright Sparks: ALLenergy's Education and Skills Development Programme is funded by Scottish Power Renewables (SPR) Beinn an Tuirc Community Benefit Fund of which ALLenergy is receiving the 40% 'Regional Tranche'. The steering group includes ALLenergy, SPR and Argyll and Bute Council. This project encourages and facilitates young people to seek careers in STEM subjects and the renewable energy sector, providing events, workshops and careers advice in schools and communities, particularly in the areas of Mid Argyll and the Kintyre Peninsula.

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ALIENERGY

Argyll, Lomond & the Islands Energy Agency

Alienergy

Established initially by Argyll & Bute Council in 2000, ALIenergy works across a range of activities to promote sustainable energy use. The three broad areas of focus are:

- Renewable energy generation;
- Addressing fuel poverty; and
- Enhancing the development of skills relating to carbon reduction targets.

Project staff employed by ALIenergy act as facilitators, project managers, programme coordinators and case workers. We devise projects, educate, advise and improve access to knowledge and skills so that communities build capacity to participate in renewable energy and energy saving activity.

ALIenergy is at the interface between communities, economy and environment – ensuring that these themes are integrated in all our projects and activities. We also provide the link between the strategic overview at regional, national and currently European levels and direct action locally and in recent years have been increasingly involved in identifying grant opportunities for appropriate ongoing funding to broaden, support and strengthen our delivery.



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ScottishPower Renewables Beinn an Tuirc 2 Windfarm

As the UK's leading onshore wind developer Scottish Power Renewables (SPR) is at the forefront of the development of the renewables industry through pioneering ideas, forward thinking and outstanding innovation. ScottishPower now only produces 100% green electricity – focusing on wind energy, smart grids and driving the change to a cleaner, electric future.

SPR has been a neighbour in Argyll & Bute for over fifteen years with four operational sites, one consented windfarm and another, Sheirdrim Windfarm, on the Kintyre Peninsula, at the pre-planning stage.



As part of the community benefit package for their operational Beinn an Tuirc 2 Windfarm, 60% of the annual fund is received and distributed by the surrounding communities of East and West Kintyre. The remaining 40% goes into a regional tranche held by Argyll & Bute Council, to use for the benefit of communities throughout the region. It is this regional tranche which has funded the role of an Education Officer to allow ALIenergy to deliver several initiatives across the region. These initiatives seek to increase local employability and knowledge about renewables & STEM careers, and in recent years have been targeted ever closer towards the needs of pupils in Kintyre and partnership working with schools, youth and community groups.



Project delivery (2017/18)

The Education Officer's activities during this period focused on a variety of local environmental workshops for school pupils and members of the community, with particular emphasis on raising awareness of career opportunities within Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) subject areas. These activities involved working alongside relevant local groups and partner organisations in the planning and delivery of a wide range of events, such as:

Energy from the Sea – 120+ pupils taking part in wave and tidal experiments

Energy of Science – 100+ 3-45 year olds learning about energy and heat transfer



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Cruach Mhor Windfarm visit – Visit to SPR’s operational windfarm in support of a partnership programme with HELP (Argyll & Bute) Ltd which aims to give 16-24 year olds an opportunity to gain employability skills, as well as the confidence to apply for employment, college or further training

Junior STEM Ambassadors Project - senior pupils completed the STEM Ambassador programme, part of which involved delivering STEM learning opportunities to younger pupils in their school.

Project delivery (2018/19)

Building on the successes of previous years, ALIenergy now employs two Education Officers who job share the post (2 days a week each) and continue to work to promote and maintain pupils’ interest and motivation to study STEM subjects, and to pursue career and or training opportunities related to these areas.

Katie Evamy started working with ALIenergy in 2015 and has a particular interest in how renewable technologies benefit remote rural communities, and the part that young people can play in this.



Michael Wall started working with ALIenergy in 2016. He enjoys working with young people to help widen their knowledge of opportunities in STEM related training and careers.



The delivery takes a joined-up approach whereby the following elements combine to provide a rolling programme taking participants on a STEM ‘journey’ from the end of primary school until the point at which they may be starting to consider subject choices for later study at secondary school.

- Primary 7s
- Transition to secondary schools
- Family learning events
- Careers



Supporting each of these elements is an individual workbook for each participant the use and monitoring of which enables structured engagement through a two-year timeframe and promotes

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
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participants' ownership of their learning experience. It is not only a learning tool to support the sessions themselves, but also as a means to foster teacher and parent involvement as well as generating useful evaluation and research data. In addition, it acts as a reflective journal for participants to inform decisions around academic choices taken in their third year.

Primary 7s

In this part of the project (Apr-May 2019), the Education Officers worked with all of the P7 pupils in the 15 feeder primary schools making the transition to S1 in Mid Argyll and Kintyre (Campbeltown, Tarbert and Lochilphhead). A number of short welcome talks on STEM and the project were delivered to these pupils to introduce the basics of energy science as a foundation for STEM learning and also to orientate pupils over the content and schedule of the activities ahead through the reference to their workbooks.



Transition to secondary schools

This element of the project forms the second part of the two-year schedule of events and activities within Argyll & Bute schools in the target area and provides an opportunity for the Education Officers to re-engage with participants as part of their transition week or early on in their first term in S1. In the 2019/20 academic year two of these events took place in May/June, with a third at Tarbert Academy scheduled for the new term in August.

The sessions take the form of interactive workshops which are tailored to each school's requirements and focus on STEM subjects and opportunities within the renewable sector. Support activities for the session are provided in the workbook, which also contains adaptable tear-out sheets for low-cost activities (for use by / with parents and carers, youth groups and other community organisations) as well as details of the family learning events the Education Officers offer at public events in the target area during the summer holidays.



Family learning events

These events are sessions which parents/carers and young people can attend to participate in fun and interactive activities related to STEM subjects and career opportunities. The aim is to attract both ongoing participants in the project (from the Education Officers' work in schools) and members of the

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wider general public. All visitors to the events have a chance to investigate and interact with resources and signposting information as well as to attend more structured workshops featuring hands-on activities. Confirmed events for 2019 are: Kintyre Show (2nd August), Islay Show (8th August) and Mid-Argyll Show (10th August).



To further increase reach of the project, the Education Officers offer schools the opportunity for ALIenergy to provide a presence and support materials for parents evenings taking place in the three target high schools.

Careers day

The Education Officers are working with a number of partners (Argyll & Bute Council, Skills Development Scotland and Developing the Young Workforce) to deliver a combined careers event, catering to the needs and interests of S2 pupils from Campbeltown Grammar, Tarbert Academy and Lochgilphead High School. Although other formats may be considered, the current aim will be to deliver the first of these

careers days in one of the schools in March or April 2020. The preferred conference style event would benefit from ALIenergy networks to promote STEM and renewable energy careers and signpost to STEM and renewable energy courses. Participants from regional and national employers, STEM Ambassador volunteers (from the West of Scotland hub) and training organisations would allow the order of the day to include a series of workshops and opportunities for attendees to visit a market place of local employers.
