BUTE AND COWAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACTION PLAN 2015/16 - UPDATE

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this paper is to provide members of the Bute and Cowal Area Committee with an update with regard to the actions contained within the Bute and Cowal Economic Development Action Plan (EDAP), 2015/16.
- **1.2** The content of the Bute and Cowal EDAP aligns with the Single Outcome Agreement (SOA) Delivery Plans developed by the Community Planning Partnership.
- **1.3** It is important to note that the Bute and Cowal EDAP is a working document so that economic opportunities can be captured and addressed as they arise during 2015/16.
- **1.4** The following recommendations are for consideration:
 - The Bute and Cowal members note the updates provided in this paper.
 - The Bute and Cowal members agree that future updates be provided on an annual basis given that many of the projects and areas of work require sufficient time to be developed to a point where there is something meaningful to report.

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2. INTRODUCTION

- **3.2** The Bute and Cowal members agree that future updates be provided on an annual basis given that many of the projects and areas of work require sufficient time to be developed to a point where there is something meaningful to report.

4. BUTE AND COWAL EDAP UPDATE

4.1 Following approval by the Area Committee in August 2015 of the Bute and Cowal EDAP, officers continue to work to implement the key actions. As members will be aware many of the actions are reliant upon partnership working with our Community Planning Partners. Many of the actions will be taken forward over a 12 month timeframe and therefore whilst an update can be given to each business day meeting a more meaningful update would be given over a twelve month period. The update below has been broken down under the four headings of competitive, collaborative, compelling and connected.

Competitive Bute and Cowal:

- Business Gateway's work with Dunoon BIDs is continuing. There will be a requirement to move the timescale back to later this financial year.
- The following describes the suggested measure for forestry within the B&C EDAP.

- SURF is continuing to move forward with the work in Rothesay. The Alliance for Action has held a number of public meetings and continues to meet regularly. It is hoped that SURF will appoint a part time development officer to work to support the Alliance for Action progress through 2016. Funding has been secured for a Charrette in Rothesay from Mount Stuart and the Scottish Government with officer support from the council. The funding will require to be drawn down by 31 March 2016 and the Charrette will be undertaken over the next 5 months. A submission has also been made for Town Centre Community Capital Grant.
- Town Centre Community Capital Grant is a £1.7m SG fund which was open to community organisations to bid into. The fund will support capital projects which will make real and lasting improvements to town centres across Scotland. Its purpose is to help enterprising communities to further unlock the potential of public assets in their town centres, improve amenity and first impressions of a place in line with the Town Centre Action Plan, the Town Centre First Principle and guidance available through the Town Centre Toolkit. The fund closed on 27 September and bids are currently being considered. http://www.gov.scot/Topics/Built-Environment/regeneration/town-centres/TCCCF
- SURF is now looking towards Dunoon to facilitate a similar project there. Fergus Murray has been identified as the lead officer from the council. Depending on what comes out of the Dunoon Alliance for Action, there is potential for submitting a bid to the Scottish Government for a Dunoon Charrette in 2016/17. This would align with the PPSL Committee decision on the June 2015.
- The Dunoon CARS scoping work should be complete by December. The
 remaining items of work relate to the cost and valuation analysis. The
 next CARS funding bid should be announced in 2016. A further report will
 be brought to Area Committee in the new year for members'
 consideration once the scoping work is concluded.

- The Dunoon Wooden Pier contract is underway for phase 1a and 1b (paper taken to B&C Area Committee on 6th October).
- Rothesay Pavilion is moving to tender stage following closure of the building. A substantial amount of investigative survey work has been undertaken since the closure of the building to the general public. The findings of this survey work are to be reported to the Area Committee through a separate paper.
- Rothesay THI is drawing to a successful close. A Stage One bid for a second project, a Townscape Heritage (TH) was made on 31st August, and which will be decided upon by a UK committee in January 2016.
- The Ardyne Masterplan showing a £19m potential investment has been approved by the council's PPSL on the 21st of October including a detailed consent for phase 1 which includes a processing plant and access road; HIE are now considering a business plan for possible funding for phase 1.
- Sandbank new offices, taken forward by HIE, are now completed and open for business.
- Portavadie Spa is complete and open for business.
- AITC has launched their **new** tourist rocket strategy on Wednesday 21st of October.

Collaborative Bute and Cowal:

Argyll and the Islands LEADER programme, 2014-2020:

We are delighted that Colin Fulcher was promoted through a competitive interview process in July 2015 to the new Strategic Co-ordinator for the LEADER and EMFF (European Marine and Maritime Fund). Colin works out of Eaglesham House, Bute.

The LEADER/EMFF Local Development Strategy is now approved by the Scottish Government. Once launched, the EMFF funding is open to all applicants across the Argyll and the Islands area that meet the eligibility criteria. The EMFF themes for inclusion in the LDS were selected by the Fisheries Local Action Group (FLAG) from the list provided by Marine Scotland. The FLAG selected those which were seen as most relevant to support and maximise the following strengths and opportunities relating to Argyll and the Islands fisheries and aquaculture sector as identified in the SWOT:

- Specialist and high quality food and drink;
- Quality marine environment;
- Transport assets, airports and harbours;
- Agriculture and fishing potential;
- Food production;
- Develop community assets;

- Link sectors better e.g. food/drink/tourism;
- Dynamic fisheries and aquaculture sector with planned investments and growth;
- Activity tourism; and
- Supply chain improvements particularly, but not exclusively, in food and drink (including fisheries and aquaculture) sectors.

Priority 1 – Promoting innovation at all stages of the fisheries and aquaculture seafood supply chain. Aim – to encourage the use and exploration of new technologies and methods to improve efficiencies within the fisheries and aquaculture sector. This includes methods for increasing market demand and shortening the supply chain. Another aspect is to add value to primary produce before sending it to market.

Scope – projects which support the following objectives are encouraged.

Objectives:

Increasing market demand.

Shortening the supply chain.

Adding value to primary produce.

Upgrading of arbor facilities to enable diversification of catch and improve landings.

Priority 2 – Supporting diversification within the fisheries and aquaculture sectors.

Aim – this priority will provide support for businesses within the fisheries and aquaculture sectors to diversify into new and expanding markets. Applicants will be encouraged to seek support from business advice services before submitting applications.

Scope – projects which support the following objectives are encouraged.

Objectives:

To develop new business ideas and markets.

To support partnership and networking opportunities within the sector.

Priority 3 – Strengthening the governance of local fisheries resources.

Aim – to encourage co-operation between the various local actors within the fisheries and aquaculture sectors. By sharing common issues and recognition of a common geography, it is hoped that the sector becomes stronger and more efficient within Argyll and the Islands.

Scope – projects which support the following objectives are encouraged.

Objectives:

The creation of networks, with a focus on those which mobilise social capital.

Identifying common issues and developing common goals and objectives.

Cross sectoral and geographical working including neighbouring fisheries communities.

 All of the above Priorities can be considered for trans-regional applications. The FLAG will actively seek joint projects with other FLAGs where this is seen as beneficial to all parties.

- Other LEADER/EMFF posts include the following: 2 Development Officers, and 2 Compliance Officers. The posts have been through the Council's job evaluation process and an outcome is awaited for us to go ahead and advertise. All LEADER posts will be funded 100% from LEADER funding and therefore no match funding from the council is required.
- Business Gateway Local Growth Acceleration Strategic Intervention (ERDF): Further delays by the Scottish Government, but we still hope that this will be launched this calendar year. Details of what this programme will offer is outlined in the B&C EDAP attached.
- Enhanced Employability Pipeline Strategic Intervention (ESF):
 - Feedback from Scottish Government and will require to amend subject to comments and re-submit.
 - Sheena McLean, Operations Manager, Employability Team will be working on this re-submission from now until the end of the calendar year (need to do more work on our target markets and phasing of the proposed interventions/'operations' across the whole pipeline).

Compelling Bute and Cowal:

- Report on the initial findings was presented at the EDI Committee on 13th
 August. The full report is now available. A further report will be presented
 at the EDI Committee on 14th January 2016.
- The skills development issues within the report were presented at the Elected Member Seminar on 5th October (the whole report will be made available on the Council's website in due course as a key reference tool).

Connected Bute and Cowal:

- On track with the report on integrated sustainable transport networks; the council is working with HIE on producing a report for consideration by the CPP management in the autumn.
- Regarding digital connectivity:
 - Next generation broadband first live premises in Dunoon, Rothesay and Innellan exchange areas over the summer. Further work ongoing. Community Broadband Scotland are working with Colintraive and Glendaruel Development Trust to investigate the possibility of a Kyles of Bute community project. Representative from HIE updated the BC CPG during the summer.
 - Mobile Mobile operators expected to upgrade to 4G coverage across large parts of Argyll including Bute and Cowal, currently at initial planning and development stage with no fixed timescale for upgrade. The Council continues to liaise with the Scottish Government, Scottish Futures Trust and mobile operators to facilitate improvements wherever possible.

5. CONCLUSION

5.1 The Bute and Cowal EDAP is a working document for 2015/16 and officers continue to work and focus on the delivery of the actions with key partners.

Bute and Cowal Economic Development Action Plan, 2015/16 (working document)

As detailed in the Local Development Plan the aspirations for the Bute and Cowal area for 2024 are outlined below:

- A place that enjoys revitalised town centres and waterfronts in both Dunoon and Rothesay, with Dunoon taking full advantage of its gateway position to the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park and Rothesay capitalising on its outstanding built heritage.
- A **competitive place, better connected to the global economy** with thriving local rural communities that provide an incentive for businesses to locate to, particularly major new mixed use and tourism developments in places such as Portavadie, Castle Toward and Ardyne.
- A place of **outstanding natural and built heritage** with enhanced natural assets, better public realm and restored iconic buildings such as the Royal Hotel and Pavilion in Rothesay and the Queen's and Burgh Halls in Dunoon.
- A better connected and accessible place with improved ferry services, road and active travel links, together with improved telecommunications networks and broadband coverage.
- A place that can offer **a wide range of housing choice** in places with modernised essential services and infrastructure, with a focus of larger scale growth in Rothesay and Dunoon.

Overview

With close proximity to Glasgow, a pristine natural environment with opportunities for growth in the aquaculture and quality food and drink industry, the significant built and cultural heritage of its communities, such as Dunoon and Rothesay, make this area a location for resort tourism and short-breaks. Both Dunoon and Rothesay have the potential to build more competitive tourism propositions based on their rich built and cultural heritage, diversity of venues and proximity to Glasgow. Dunoon has the additional opportunity to build on the marine leisure market and capitalise on its proximity to the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park.

It is important therefore that the Bute and Cowal Economic Development Plan for 2015/16 capitalises on existing and new opportunities to assist and create sustainable economic growth in areas of strength.

Overarching Challenge, Actions and Success Measures for Bute and Cowal

The overarching challenge for the Bute and Cowl economy, aligned to the whole of Argyll and Bute, is to reverse the overall decline in population while rebalancing from aging to young/working age residents by achieving positive net migration. (Current projections suggest a decline of 27% of the Bute and Cowal population by 2037; with a forecast that the working age population will fall by 37%).

The recent Compelling Argyll and Bute and its Administrative Areas study (EKOS Ltd, June 2015) found that the sectoral strengths across Argyll and Bute as a whole are in tourism, food and drink, aquaculture and renewables; with further opportunities in care, construction and the primary sectors.

As noted above a key focus for the Bute and Cowal area is to build more competitive tourism propositions with a focus on resort tourism and short breaks, including day visitors. Data from the Visit Scotland

Marketing Opportunities study, 2013/14, noted that annual footfall at the Rothesay and Dunoon Visit Scotland Information Centres has increased by 13% and 7% respectively between 2013 to 2014.

The incidence of micro businesses in agriculture, forestry and fishing is considerably higher than the total Bute and Cowal business base. The professional, scientific and technical sector is also well represented at the micro level in Bute and Cowal (source: NOMIS, 2013). However, the key employment sectors in Bute and Cowal are real estate, health and social care work (source: BRES/NOMIS 2013).

A principal requirement for attracting labour from outside the region is the availability of affordable housing and a mix of type and size of housing e.g. larger family homes. It should be noted that Bute and Cowal has a much higher proportion of second homes than the national and regional average (which can drive up the cost of private houses) coupled with a good stock of vacant social rented housing, particularly on Rothesay.

Therefore, for the 2015/16, there are **three** main overarching actions and success measures. These are outlined below as follows:

- To undertake a mapping of the tourism industry in the area, with input from the Compelling study and the recent Tourism Barometer work at the local level being undertaken by Argyll and the Isles Tourism Co-operative (AITC). This work will provide an evidence base on the visitor type to the area coupled with the number and ambition of the resident (indigenous and inward investing) business base by rebalancing focus on companies of scale and with growth aspirations and those capable of moving up the value chain. Business growth targets for this sector could then be established; taking into consideration the added value opportunities that Business Gateway aims to achieve through the Local Business Growth Accelerator programme, match funded by the new European Regional Development Programme, 2014-20.
- Leading on from the above (as outlined in the plan below), is the **increased provision of premises for small businesses**. With focus on the Sandbank Business Park Masterplan, Dunoon, Highlands and Islands Enterprise is currently delivering a 742m² facility at Sandbank by the summer of 2015. The new premises will provide up to 5 business units ranging in size from 115m² to flexible space for inward investors and business growth. Aligned to this activity, the Council's Business Gateway team will also undertake a study to establish why the conversion rate of business start-up enquiries to actual starts differs between and within administrative areas.
- In addition to the recent focus on the education sector, Argyll Community Housing Association
 (ACHA) and Fyne Homes, in partnership with Argyll and Bute Council and Highlands and Islands
 Enterprise to identify alternative clients groups (businesses and inward investors) to increase the
 tenant base to newly refurbished properties on Rothesay. ACHA wishes to see a step change in the
 uptake over 2015/16; setting a specific target number was not viewed to be realistic or
 appropriate.

Discrete actions and success measures which fit with and will contribute to the overarching issues are detailed below in the Bute and Cowal Economic Development Action Plan, 2015/16.
