3. Background

Youth Service Primary: Work (Focus: upper end of Primary schools P4-P7 (11 Primary schools plus Parklands School)

Work including:

Supporting Transition between primary and secondary school

Improving Health and Wellbeing

Developing Literacy and Numeracy

Promoting and Recognising Achievement

Community based Family Learning

Promoting Citizenship

All of the activities delivered support the 4 capacities of the Curriculum for Excellence and GIRFEC and work towards supporting SOA 4.

4. Detail

Homework Club- after school

Young people are supported to complete homework as

- directed by class teacher.
- It is anticipated that young people who attend the club will feel more confident about completing their homework tasks.

1x twelve week blocks with 6 children per group August -December 2015(6 children attend)

Terrific Times Tables

- young people will be supported to develop their numeracy skills by improving their times tables
- Young people participating in the Times Table Programmes will experience improved confidence in knowing and using their times tables.
- Progression is measured by a start and finish evaluation

5 x 6 week blocks have been delivered from August-December 2015 (77 children have attended)

Self- Esteem Groups

- Children are identified by parents and class teachers and are invited to take part in 6 sessions.
- Using artistic prompts, sentence completion and positive experience activities.
- It is anticipated this will assist the children to build skills to build rapport with others, demonstrate their value within their family and develop positive traits that can be further developed for goal setting in the future.

3 groups have run for 6 sessions from August -December 2015 (29 children have attended)

Young Carers Afterschool Club-afterschool

• The aim of this club is to allow children who are in caring roles within their family setting the opportunity to have some respite from their role and take part in fun activities.

1 group has run for a period of 6 weeks between August and December 2015

(11 children attend)

Internet Safety for children

- 1 hour awareness raising sessions on Internet Safety have been delivered to 6 local primary schools
 - P4-P7 have taken part in an awareness raising session regarding keeping themselves safe online

(256 have attended the 1 hour session)

Internet Safety for Parents

 1 hour awareness raising sessions on Internet Safety have been delivered to parents of 6 local primary schools (86 parents have attended the 1 hour session

Family Learning Opportunities

- 2 family learning activities have taken part between August-December 2015
 - I Family Fun Fitness session 21 children and 4 parents (25 in total)
 - I Family Heartstart session 22 children and 3 parents (25 in total)
- 5. Conclusions In total the Youth Service Primary has worked in school provision with 422 children and 93 parents or carers from August 2015-December 2015. This report does not reflect the provision that is offered to children by other service providers in the Helensburgh and Lomond Area. The report does not cover all of services delivered by the Youth Service.
