The Youth Service team engage with the most disengaged young people (16-19) through the Activity Agreement scheme. Youth workers act as Trusted Professionals supporting the young people, who are often furthest from the labour market, to progress and sustain further learning, training and employment. Operating in schools brings youth workers into contact with large numbers of young people and creates opportunities to target provision to those most in need. Better use of video conferencing and careful planning of residential activities has facilitated increased involvement of young people from rural and island communities. Argyll and Bute Council has demonstrated the value it places on youth work by maintaining budgets, attracting external funding and growing service delivery.
