Tiree High School is a 3-18 school that serves the island of Tiree. It comprises an Early learning & Childcare unit that offers provision catering for English and Gaelic language learning and has been selected to be part of the Scottish Government's pilot for 1140 hours of free childcare.

The Primary department has four classrooms, two providing English medium and two Gaelic medium learning. The Secondary department offers pupils a wide range of qualification options both vocational and academic that utilises the available skills and needs specific to the Isle of Tiree such as Skills For Work courses in Construction Crafts, Rural Skills and Hospitality, all of which are viable career options for pupils on Tiree. The Secondary also offers a broad range of Advanced Higher options for pupils that wish to pursue further or higher education routes when transitioning out of Tiree High School. The school has strong community links and is regarded as a significant resource to the whole island both in terms of employment and as a positive attraction to people considering moving to the island.

The school has had a recent appointment of Head Teacher (August 2016) and Depute Head Teacher (Jan 2017). The last year has seen a significant change to the arrangements of language provision in the ELCC. Work has been going on to re-locate the ELCC into the heart of the main school building with construction work completed in summer 2017. Re-location took place by the end of August 2017. This will impact on the position of the primary classrooms and should result in improved arrangements for the Gaelic medium opportunities. The secondary has converted from 5 to 6 certificate subjects in S4 and has had a widening of course choices with the addition of six other subjects that run depending on demand.

Recognising Wider Achievement

During session 2016-17, the school recognised that wider achievement was an area that required development for opportunities to be available for pupils. For session 2017-18, the timetable has been re-structured to include a Wider Achievement period for S1-6. A group of teaching staff and community volunteers are engaged with the Duke of Edinburgh Award and this is being delivered to S3-6. Nearly all pupils are commencing the Bronze award and in future years, there is an expectation that some pupils will go on to Silver and possibly Gold. The Active Schools Coordinator is at the initial stages of introducing a Sports Leader Award programme that will be up and running this session. This is envisaged as an alternative to pupils that do not wish to undertake the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

For S1-2, the pupils have commenced the Saltire Award and opportunities are being looked at to have pupils undertake mentoring roles within the Primary department where possible.

In Primary, we are hoping to commence planning for The John Muir Award before the end of the session but certainly for session 2018-19. The context of Tiree is ideal to promote the ideals of The John Muir Award and there are staff who are keen to support its introduction.
