APPENDIX 1: REPRESENTATION FROM CLLR ROSS MORELAND

Rowan wind farm offers a unique opportunity for Argyll and Bute Council, not just to do our part in combatting climate change but also to improve our communities. Rowan Wind farm offers a unique opportunity, in a time of dramatic budget cuts to our council, to provide significant investment into a local community. £429k per year for 35 years is a transformative amount of money and could significantly improve the lives of local residents. By rejecting this proposal we will also be rejecting the chance for significant investment and improvement.

We should not however just accept projects because they provide investment and officers objections are important to note. However it is equally important to note that there have been no objections "from key consultees such as NatureScot, Historic Environment Scotland (HES), Transport Scotland, SEPA and RSPB". At a local level South Knapdale Community Council, where 11 of the 13 wind farm turrets will be based, has raised no objections to the project, and has already earmarked how some of the money will be spent.

The councils own renewable energy action plan states "Argyll and Bute recognises the importance of working together to optimise renewable energy assets in a manner that benefits our local communities, our economy and Scotland" By rejecting a windfarm that can only be seen for 29 seconds when driving the speed limit, that is supported by the local community, will massively improve the local economy and has received no significant objections from Scottish authori ties, would not seem to fit with our own plans.

In my policy lead report to council tomorrow I will state - "Addressing Climate Change is a global issue that is hugely reliant on partnership, collaboration and the actions of us all. No single organisation can tackle it in isolation and as a Council we need to show clear leadership and lead by example in all that we do." I would ask the members of this committee to show partnership, collaboration and most importantly leadership and vote in favour of Rowan wind farm.
