SUPPORTING COMMUNITIES FUND - Monitoring of Projects Funded

1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide monitoring information on the funding given to community projects from the council's Supporting Communities Fund.
- 1.2 The time period of this report covers projects funded within 2019/20, 2020/21 and 2021/22. Due to the disruption of Covid 19 on the planned funded projects of community groups, the council agreed to lengthen the time projects had to be delivered. Therefore this report summarises projects completed within the years disrupted by Covid 19.
- 1.3 Members are asked to consider the contents of the report showing a summary of the information supplied by organisations in their End of Project Monitoring Reports.

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2.0 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 This report highlights the positive outcomes for communities in Oban, Lorn and the Isles through the allocation of the Council's Supporting Communities Fund between 2019/20 and 2021/22.
- 2.2 A total of 52 projects were awarded funding. Due to the challenges throughout that period for community groups and adjustments that had to be made to the running of their projects, it has been more challenging to receive an End of Project Monitoring Report from all awards of funding. These were exceptional years and we are grateful to the 42 grant recipients who were able to submit information for this report.

3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Oban, Lorn and the Isles Area Committee:

3.1 Note and consider the positive contribution of the Supporting Communities Fund detailed in section 4 and the attached table.

4.0 DETAIL

- 4.1 The funded projects supported approximately 13,897 people to participate in a variety of themed activities including outdoor activities, sports, music and mental health. Highlights include:
 - Friends of the Argyll Papers

A multi-media project inspired by Tiree stories and themes and the Tiree landscape. Myths and 'true' stories were extracted from historical records from different periods in both Gaelic and English. Musicians, a songwriter and a filmmaker responded, creating new music, songs and films, re-telling traditional stories and creating new ones.

The works have been published on the project website and were incorporated into a multi-media performance delivered in June. The project welcomed 2,356 participants and culminated in an exhibition of complete works of drama, music, song, filmmaking and creative writing linked to the history of the island and its landscape. The grant supported artist fees, poetry and creative writing group, production of a booklet, performance costs and evaluation for a bi-lingual community arts project.

Hope Kitchen

Martyn's Monday Club and a new Women's Club provided a weekly space for people in the Oban area who have experienced suicidal thoughts or who have been affected by another person taking their own life.

The grant enabled Hope Kitchen to partner with Martyn's Monday Club to deliver 92 sessions. On average 20 people attended the men's group on a weekly basis and 19 attended the women's group.

Mull and Iona Community Trust

The Ulva Ferry Transport Project ran a scheduled 3 day a week accessible minibus service and electric car, helping residents to access local services. The bus service was utilised to deliver food to those shielding or on low income during Covid-19 restrictions.

An elderly resident did not arrive at the arranged time, the driver knowing the person, went to check. He was found to be in need of first aid and immediate hospitalisation and without the bus service would have died.

South West Mull and Iona Development

The project workers transformed an overgrown green space in Bunessan into a vibrant community garden and tree nursery, the grant enabled the employment of a sessional worker and provided tools and transport for volunteers. Schools and pre-school groups, a nature club, volunteers and allotment bed holders have accessed the garden to participate in activities and workshops, plant swap events and to gather produce from the raised beds, poly tunnels and fruit cages.

- 4.3 42 grant recipients have submitted an End of Project Monitoring Report.
- 4.4 In the 2020/21 funding cycle, Oban & District Access Panel were granted an extension to complete their project of funding for a P/T

- Secretary to 31 March 2024. They are listed as project no. 9 in the 2020/21 list.
- 4.5 In the 2021/22 funding cycle, Oban & District Access Panel were granted an extension to complete their project of funding for a P/T Secretary to 31 March 2024. They are listed as project no. 11 in the 2021/22 list.
- 4.6 In the 2021/22 funding cycle, Tiree Community Council were granted an extension to complete their project of funding for a Community Garden to 1st October. They are listed as project no. 16 in the 2021/22 list.
