## **SUPPORTING COMMUNITIES FUND - Monitoring of Projects Funded**

#### 1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide monitoring information on the funding given to community projects from the council's Supporting Communities Fund.
- 1.2 11 constituted, not-for-profit, community organisations were awarded funding by the Area Committee in 2022/23. Organisations are required to spend their funding within 18 months and submit an End of Project Monitoring Report outlining the project's projected costs, actual costs and beneficiaries.
- 1.3 Members are asked to consider the contents of the report showing a summary of the information supplied by organisations in their End of Project Monitoring Reports.
- 1.4 Members are asked to note the return of unspent funds and that these and that these are made available in future allocations of the Supporting Communities Fund in OLI.

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## SUPPORTING COMMUNITIES FUND - Monitoring of Projects Funded

#### 2.0 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 This report highlights the positive outcomes for communities in Oban, Lorn and the Isles through the allocation of the Council's Supporting Communities Fund in 2022/23.
- 2.2 A total of £24,030.29 was awarded to 11 organisations in 2022/23. Organisations have 18 months to spend the funds, and up to two months from the end of the project, to complete and return a project monitoring report.
- 2.3 A total of £2,617.50 total has been identified as unspent funds and returned. This can be included in the distribution of the SCF in OLI for 2024/25

#### 3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Area Committee:

- 3.1 Note and consider the positive contribution of the Supporting Communities Fund detailed in section 4 and the attached table.
- 3.2 Note that a total of £2,617.50 in total has been returned, and agree that this be included in the distribution of the SCF for 2024/25.

- **DETAIL** 
  - 4.1 The funded projects supported approximately 20,311 people to participate in a variety of activities including outdoors, sports, music and projects positively impacting mental health. Highlights include:
    - Argyll Wellbeing Hub delivering a series of peer support sessions,

walking trips and events to support and develop LGBTQ+ awareness and celebration for mental health and well-being for marginalised communities following the pandemic.

- The Ardchattan Centre delivered 2 intergenerational projects for a series of history & heritage, and arts & culture workshops which were delivered to a wide range of participants with the aim of countering the isolation and fragmentation brought about by the pandemic.
- Mull & Iona Community Trust ran a series of guided walks, outdoor events, drop in events and beach cleans, developing a volunteer after school programme and a holiday club.
- 4.2 The attached table summarises information received from individual projects.
- 4.3 10 grant recipients have submitted an End of Project Monitoring Report.
- 4.4 Note that a total of £2,617.50 in total has been returned; £2,617.50 to be included in the distribution of the SCF for 2024/25. The return of funds is a combination of projects under budget or funds unable to be spent.
