Community Safety Forum Exception report to the Oban Lorn and the Isles Community Planning group

1. SUMMARY

The purpose of this Paper is to update the Oban, Lorn and the Isles Community Planning Group (CPG) regarding the main pieces of work undertaken by the Area Community Safety Forum (ACSF) in the last time period.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Community Planning Group:

- 2.1 Note the exception report provided below (If further detail is desired the full minutes are published on the Council website);
- 2.2 Consider whether there are any specific tasks or issues which it wishes the Area Community Safety Forum to undertake or review, and;
- 2.3 Note that the group, in common with the other forums, continues to consider the future direction of community safety provision, and how best to support it.

3. DETAIL

- 3.1 The Area Community Safety Forum is a partnership focusing on community safety issues in a broad sense, and undertakes various pieces of work in this arena.
- 3.2 There is a move to align all service provision with the outcomes identified in the Single Outcome Agreement, to which all public sector partners are signatories.
- 3.3 Each Area Community Safety Forum had an agenda item during this round of meetings, to provide an update on their consideration of the future role of the Forums. It was noted that the Chair of the Community Planning Partnership Management Committee, Chief Superintendent Barry McEwan, is also leading on the work stream relating to outcome 6 of the Single Outcome Agreement "People live in safer and stronger communities" and that he will be providing a strategic lead on community safety.

- 3.4 It was noted that the view of those present remained unchanged from before and that while a strong lead was to be welcomed, this should not be at the expense of local knowledge, expertise or solutions.
- This meeting heard a presentation from the Choose Life Coordinator Tracy Preece about suicide prevention, including shocking statistics about the number of incidences of suicide in Scotland. It was agreed that Tracy would meet with the Oban Scottish Fire And Rescue Area Commander to organise further training.
