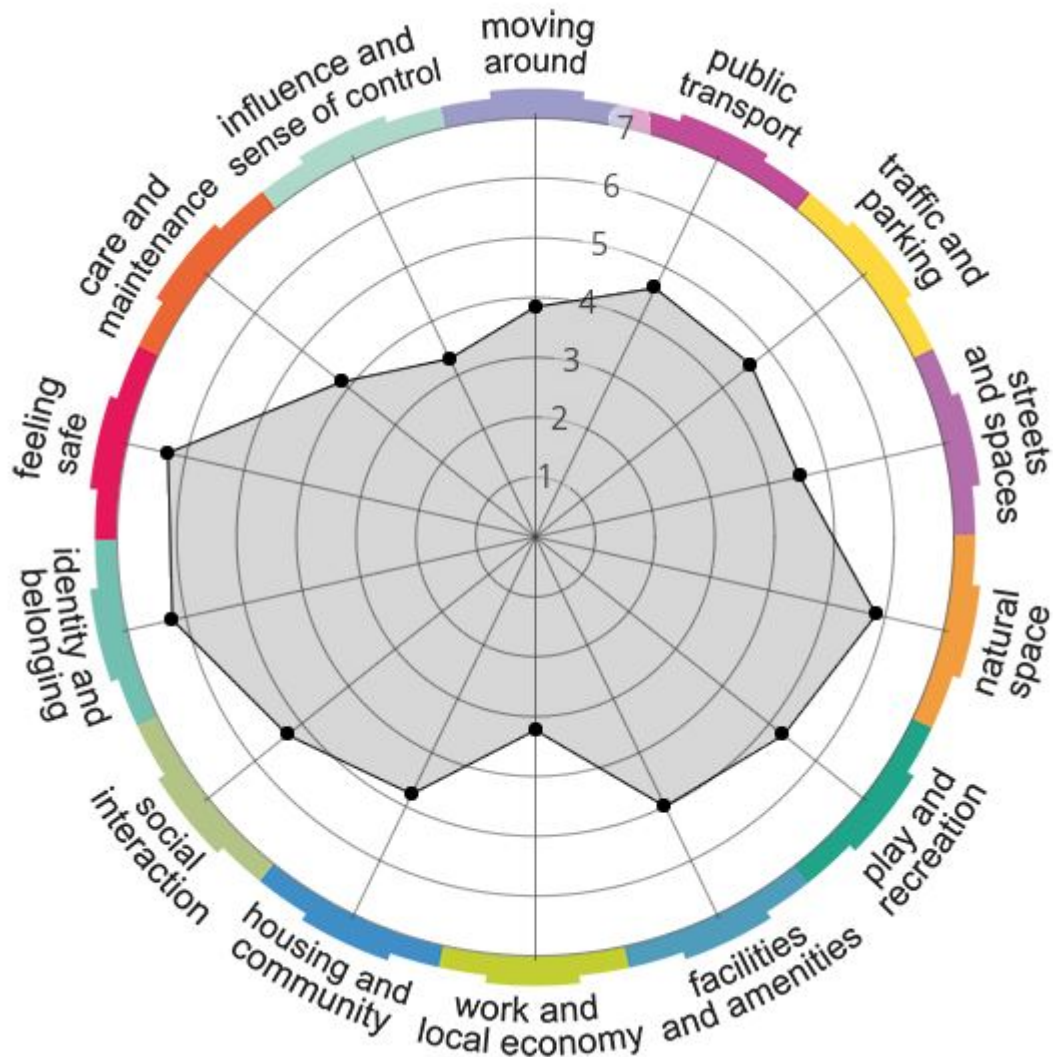

How good is your place? Area wide engagement results using the Place Standard Tool

Between May and October 2019, the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) used [the Place Standard tool](#) to engage residents in Argyll and Bute on how they feel about the place(s) that they live and work in Argyll and Bute.

We are very grateful to all the responses that we received. We hope you find the information easy to understand and of interest to you and your community.

We are pleased to see that the thematic areas of Natural Space, Feeling Safe, Identity and Sense of Belonging and Social Contact came out with the highest scores, needing the least improvement, when considering Argyll and Bute as a whole.

The engagement has been undertaken at a place-based level and respondents provided their postcode, groupings of postcodes have created the settlement/community level detail.

The results are available for community groups and partner agencies to use, for example, to assist with service planning or for community-led action plans.

Please note: The information is the views of individuals who responded to the engagement. We trust that the information provided will be viewed within the context of which it is provided. We are grateful to all those who have taken part in the consultation and believe in sharing information for openness and transparency.

We appreciate that the documents can be lengthy due to the amount of information and we hope that the format is user-friendly.

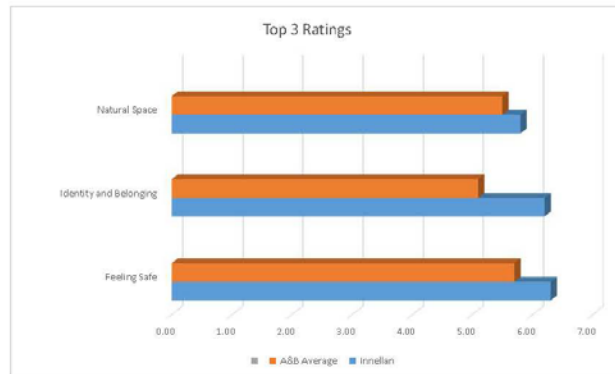
	Feeling Safe	Respondents rated this area 6.3 out of 7 compared to Argyll & Bute Average of 5.7 out of 7.

	Natural Space	Respondents rated this area 5.8 out of 7 compared to Argyll & Bute Average of 5.5 out of 7.



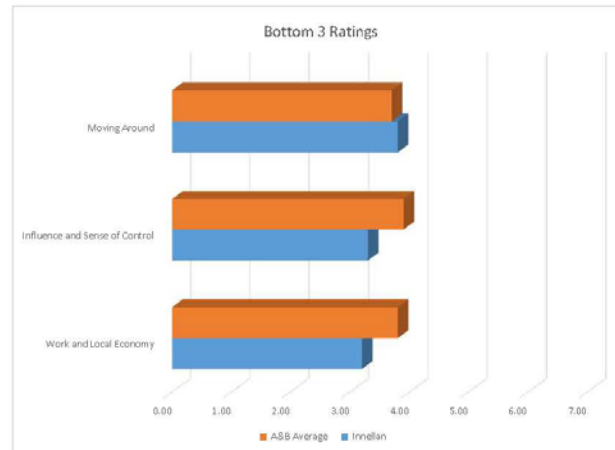

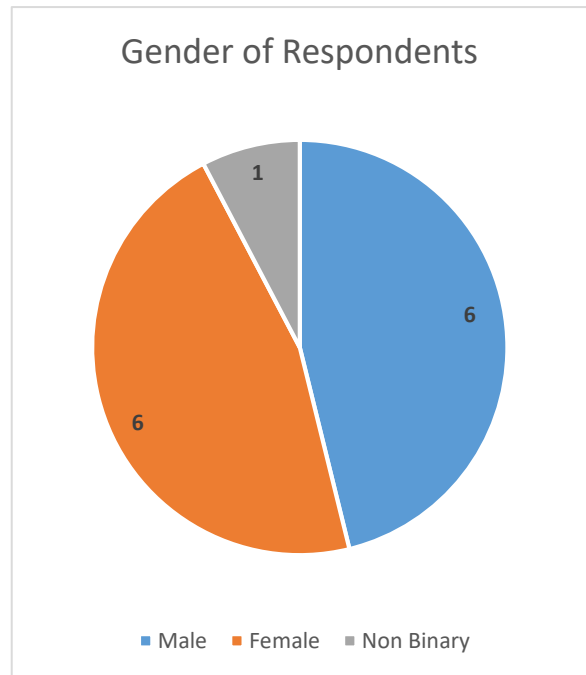
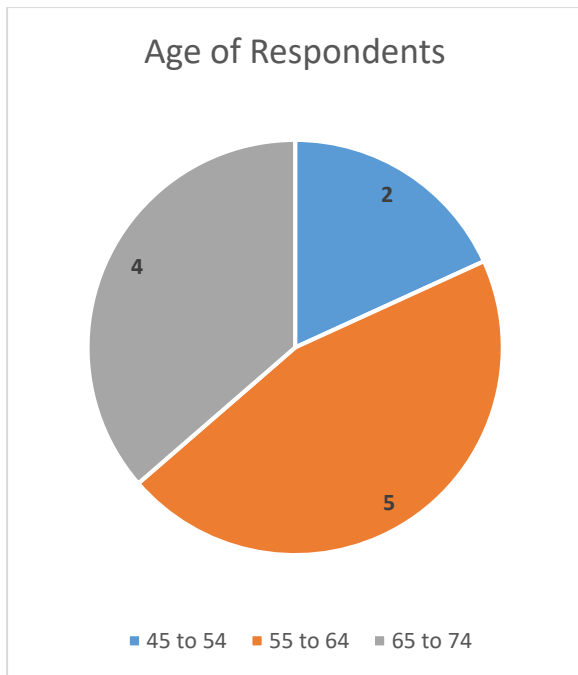

Q1. Moving Around: Can I easily walk and cycle around using good-quality routes?

Comments

Some good parts with some having problems with maintenance
Pavement is primary safe route for cycling. Plenty of walks though.
Not bad
The road is not great for cycling as it is narrow and used by a lot of lorries - forestry, fish farm, sand & gravel etc. The pavement between my postcode and Sandy Beach is uneven and sloping, so not easy to walk on.
There are great walking and cycling routes, although not accessible to everyone. More places to stop and admire the view would be helpful, perhaps with seating, toilet facilities and a drinking well.
The roads and pavements are broken and dangerous, the recent repairs to the road outside Dalriada Grove where a drain was sunken took months to fix and when it was done the road has been left with a dangerous dip as it is uneven. The 5 benches at Sandy Beach Innellan are rotten and dangerous. They've been mentioned to the Community Council several time, but still nothing has been done.
An off road cycle route exists, but it requires resurfacing. Due to previous Utility Services excavating the pavement it is uneven and dangerous to ride on. Cyclists generally cycle on the road which is in better condition rendering them at risk from motorists.

Limited bus service
The bus service (once per hour) is adequate and the ferry is OK (When it runs!!) but does need improvement.
Good service except a Sunday
buses are convenient
The bus service is good and reliable. The CalMac passenger ferry service from Dunoon to Gourock is neither good nor reliable. The boats are elderly and frequently taken out of service due to weather or 'technical issues'.
Ferry (passenger) not fit for purpose - need a car and passenger ferry
The bus service is adequate, considering it is not widely used.
The bus service to Dunoon is good, however the cessation of the 907 to Glasgow is a real problem as the Argyll Ferries/ train isn't a reliable option.
Public Transport is excellent.

Comments

A great deal of parking on pavements makes it difficult for the bus to pass up Newton Road, Wyndham Road (not so bad) and the worst along North Campbell Road
In the main they are OK but some stricter enforcement of parking is required (Parking on pavements for example)
Parking in Dunoon is horrendous, traffic meters are needed
There is not generally a problem with traffic in Dunoon. I agree with charging for parking close to the shops but I think the large seafront car park should all be free to encourage visitors as well as locals who use it when catching the ferry.
More free parking space would encourage people to use the main shopping street, in our case Argyll street.

Good improvements have been made (Burgh hall, Queens Hall, Library for example) but there is still much to do (Lower Argyll St. , Provision of Public Toilets etc.)
Getting better
Not much to do at nights
Recently quite a lot of graffiti has appeared in Innellan and Dunoon. I hope the Council will be able to remove it quickly as I am concerned that leaving it will encourage more of it to appear. It would be nice to see the grass verges and public grassy spaces cut more often. Community groups have done a lot to improve local areas and it would be nice if the Council would acknowledge this by doing things such as removing weeds from pavements. Between Innellan and Dunoon there are places where the pavement has almost disappeared due to all the weeds.
Not too bad, empty shops
The centre of town does look a bit careworn, with many closed shop spaces, although an incentive is underway to upgrade some facades on the main street. Town centre feels very abandoned at night.
More needs to be done!
The Dunoon pier building is dilapidated and impacts on visitor first impressions of the town. Dunoon could learn a lot from Largs seafront which is inviting and attractive to walk around.

There are football goals at Sandy Beach but it would be nice to have some swings or other play equipment too.

We could benefit from more outdoor facilities. Play parks for children, sports grounds for adolescents and gym equipment for the elderly would be very useful.

Our local community council is very active and provides a platform for any issues to be heard.
The Council don't seem to act on requests from Innellan Community Council or on behalf of the Community

What are the main issues and priorities for change that you have identified?

Council Tax is far too high for the amount and quality of service we receive. Roads are in a terrible state, bus has difficulty with access due to excessive parking on pavements and refuse collection is far too infrequent.
Ferry service reliability (Passenger ferry that is the vehicle ferry is very good. Parking on pavements by cars and commercial vehicles
No real issues beyond cycle routes and affordable housing
The Pier needs to be fixed
We need: A good and reliable passenger ferry service between Dunoon and Gourock. Safe and well-maintained pavements to walk on. Structures that the Council can't afford to maintain (eg Dunoon Pier) should be transferred to community groups, who might be able to access grant money.
More facilities and equipment to promote the natural resources of our area. More signage to identify the highlights and walks available in the area.
Upkeep of the roads, pavements, green spaces at Sandy Beach Innellan.
Dunoon pier building needs substantial maintenance and repair. Paint the railings along the seafront.

What actions could be taken to deal with these?

Reduce Council Tax or fix the roads, stop cars from parking on pavements and increase frequency of bin collection. I do not believe I receive good value for the very large amount of Council Tax which I am required to pay.
Better enforcement of parking regulations (and report them in the local press) Press for better ferry service and RET fares
Cycle routes could be introduced
The Scottish Government should take over and solve the ferry problem. The Council should maintain the pavements properly or ask a local business to adopt a stretch of pavement and maintain it. People will often respond to an article in the local paper.
More signage, seating, drinking fountains, toilet facilities.
The council need to come out and assess the benches at Sandy beach and repair them before someone gets injured. One picnic bench, instead of being repaired, was just removed. That is not a solution, especially when the rubber base was left and is one a trip hazard for dog walkers.
Community groups take responsibility for the railings.
