

How good is your place? Area wide engagement results using the Place Standard Tool

Between May and October 2019, the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) used <u>the Place</u>

<u>Standard tool</u> to engage residents in Argyll and Bute on how they feel about the place(s) that they live and work in Argyll and Bute.

We are very grateful to all the responses that we received. We hope you find the information easy to understand and of interest to you and your community.

We are pleased to see that the thematic areas of Natural Space, Feeling Safe, Identity and Sense of Belonging and Social Contact came out with the highest scores, needing the least improvement, when considering Argyll and Bute as a whole.

The engagement has been undertaken at a place-based level and respondents provided their postcode, groupings of postcodes have created the settlement/community level detail.

The results are available for community groups and partner agencies to use, for example, to assist with service planning or for community-led action plans.

Please note: The information is the views of individuals who responded to the engagement. We trust that the information provided will be viewed within the context of which it is provided. We are grateful to all those who have taken part in the consultation and believe in sharing information for openness and transparency.

We appreciate that the documents can be lengthy due to the amount of information and we hope that the format is user-friendly.




Next steps

This information is helping to shape plans for the area. Other information such as information from partners' data and statistics is also used to consider priorities for improvement. The CPP will analyse the information to identify priority themes for improvement within each of the four administrative areas and shape actions to address these where this is possible with resources.

We are currently mapping out what activity is already happening, what is planned within the next 3-4 years and where the gaps are. This information will be considered by both the CPP Management Committee and the Area Community Planning Groups to shape the actions.

There are short stretches of pavement alongside some roads within Minard, but from the village boundary onwards there are no footpaths/cycle paths that allow one to walk or cycle to nearby locations such as Crarae Gardens, Quarry View, or Furnace. The only option is to walk along the busy main road or wet grassy banks. If you have a car, you can drive to forestry tracks in the area to take exercise, but this is not possible on foot.

We live in the village of Minard. Pavements and footpaths do not extend beyond the bounds of the village. There is no provision for cyclists. It would be helpful to have safe footpaths linking the village with Crarae Gardens, Quarry View, Furnace, and Minard Castle. It is unsafe to cycle on the busy main road, and unsafe to walk along the verge.

Comments

As a pensioner, I rely heavily on public transport. The local and intercity buses are good quality, but very infrequent. The last bus from Glasgow to Minard leaves Glasgow at 6 pm, which rules out attending evening functions in Glasgow. In Minard, there is a bus shelter on the lochside of the main road, but there is no shelter on the opposite side, northbound. One can quickly become soaked waiting for the 926 bus. It is impossible to travel from Minard to Dunoon before midmorning, which creates problems when called for jury service.

Public transport is very limited in this region. The coach service provided by Citylink is comfortable but infrequent. Returning from Glasgow to Minard, the last bus is at 6pm and this rules out attending functions in Glasgow in the evening. I was unable to accept a call for Jury Service because the earliest bus from Minard to Dunoon arrived at 11am, two hours after the court started. If you have to rely on public transport you become used to standing at the side of a busy road for long periods of time, often without shelter in inclement weather.

Comments

Generally, the local roads are not too busy, and traffic is not a major problem. Parking is not generally a problem. Closure of the Rest and Be Thankful road as a consequence of landslips is a big issue, requiring a very long diversion, and the ongoing costly repairs do not seem to be changing the situation. Another major issue is potholes, and the patchwork way of dealing with them. Many stretches of the A83 are inherently dangerous, and accidents are frequent. We could learn a lot from the Scandinavian approach to accident reduction by providing overtaking opportunities that do not result in head-on collisions. The popularity of the region with motorcycle clubs can lead to dangerous interactions on the two-way road.

Comments

We are sometimes asked for our opinions and ideas, as for example when the windfarm was built behind Minard and windfall funding was offered. However, then everything goes quiet again and we are not kept informed of any outcomes. The general trend here seems to be one of loss of facilities rather than improvement. I have filled in several surveys like this one but never receive any feedback as a result of the survey.

What are the main issues and priorities for change that you have identified?

- improve walking/cycling paths linking Minard with nearby facilities - provide imaginative opportunities for employment locally - encourage and find funding for more public art in villages and towns in this area.

Minard is a small village in a beautiful setting alongside Loch Fyne. It has a sense of community, but since closure of the shop and school there is the realisation that there are no longer any amenities here and very little informal contact between residents. Apart from a reliable binemptying service and road-gritting during the winter, we have no provisions from the Council. For every need now we have to go to Lochgilphead or Inveraray. Public transport is very infrequent.

What actions could be taken to deal with these?

- council members to travel only by public transport, bicycle, or on foot - ban car use so that council members can understand where improvement is needed and act accordingly - ensure that all public and business facilities are tested by council members when sitting in wheelchairs to ensure that disability needs are met - ensure that feedback is always given when surveys are carried out so that dialogue is maintained.

Small communities are fragile and easily lost as more people drift towards the bigger towns and cities. This migration is understandable. In Minard we pay very high Council Tax but receive little in return - bin emptying and road gritting during the winter. For shopping we have to travel 12 miles in either direction. For healthcare or a library, we have to travel to Lochgilphead. For dental care, we have to travel to Tarbert. We have not seen a member of the police here since a break-in some 5 years ago. Small communities have to be self-motivated and well-organised if they are to survive, but if all the usual amenities have closed then there is no longer that informal network of interaction that keeps the community alive. I am concerned that Minard has dropped below the survival threshold.
