Prior to taking up study in psychology in his late 30's Stuart completed a Degree in Youth and Community Education. Following this he worked in a number of roles with children and young people with additional support needs; including a Residential Care Officer in a secure unit for adolescents (which he describes as never having a dull moment); a group worker with Inverclyde Council Social Work Department and a Project Manager with Inverclyde Community schools. During this time he ran group work programmes for children and young people from age eight to sixteen and led a youth club for children on the autism spectrum. It was while working in these roles, and in particular Community Schools, that he came into contact with and worked alongside Educational Psychologists, sparking his interest in the subject and the role.

Stuart graduated with an MSc in Educational Psychology in 2009 with a distinction in the practice element of the course and took up his post with Argyll & Bute Council in August of that year. He started working in schools in Cowal & Bute and has had central roles in the Authority Literacy Forum and in the Psychological Service's Validated Self Evaluation process. He is currently involved in fewer of the schools in Cowal than previously, now being more involved "out west" on the picturesque island of Mull.


Toe by Toe – Improving the literacy skills of learners

Toe by Toe is a structured reading programme for those children who have difficulties in reading. For the last number of years, following the administration of the Suffolk Reading Test with all Primary 4 children and along with sound teacher judgement and other assessment information, schools identified those children who would benefit from working through this programme. This is a well -researched approach that has been found to have a significant impact on the reading skills of learners.

During the EPS process of Validated Self Evaluation, the outcome of which was published in 2016, children themselves reported positively on their use of Toe by Toe. One child confirmed *'it just helps me understand words better'*. Toe by Toe materials continue to be made available to schools by the Education Service.

In preparation for schools requesting Toe by Toe books at the end of this academic session, the Educational Psychology Service has developed a brief guide to administering Toe by Toe to ensure maximum impact for learners. This will be circulated to all primary schools at the start of next term.

Cowal Autism Champions – INSET Day for Support & Early Years Staff

The Cowal Autism Champions group recently facilitated a training day for support and early years staff from the Cowal cluster. Interest in the day far exceeded expectations, and with over 70 staff attending we eventually had to limit numbers!

The day was opened by Alison Munro, Dunoon Primary's 'champion' and closed by Julie McPhee and Lisa Bulloch, champions from Clyde Cottage (voluntary and local authority) nursery. Following a keynote by Sabrina, which introduced staff to the online professional resource (see www.getset4autism.org), a range of workshops were provided. Attendees then chose 4 workshops from:

- Lego Clubs (Sabrina)
- Autism Toolbox (Alison Currie & Ruth Sweeney, APTs)
- Comic Strip Conversations (Elaine Murray & Fiona Bradley, SLT)
- Autism & anxiety (Peter Cartwright, Primary Mental Health)
- Autism Diagnosis (Dr Caroline Clark, Community Paediatrician)
- Living with Autism (early years parent)

There was a real buzz of enthusiasm throughout the day, which was evaluated very positively. Workshops were all well received, and staff left with a combination of information about new strategies for supporting our children, and increased understanding about topics. The workshop "Living with autism" which was very informal and interactive was particularly well received and probably the most valued by those attend-The admiration and empathy staff had for the parent could be felt within the room. There is no doubt that such an open, honest, and positive discussion will have a positive impact on the young person themselves.

A number of staff commented that teachers would benefit from attending a day like this.... Cowal teachers, watch this space!
