There are no negative impacts from the Recovery Plan and the outcomes are either no impact or positive. Positive factors include restatement of services and building stronger and resident communities, which will focus on the positive role of third sector, voluntary groups and volunteers

There will be a greater emphasis on working from home and a likely rationalisation of property. As a result, the implications to Council staff will be considerable and a workplan, including support measures, will be developed based on the outcome of staff and manager surveys.

The economic impact will be dependent upon the level of national sector support, and the adverse impact of COVID could be further exacerbated by EU Exit. This is being given careful consideration by the Economic and Social Recovery Group and its Officer Group.

How has 'due regard' been given to any negative impacts that have been identified?

There are no negative impacts identified as the plan seeks to target these areas. Without the plan and coordinated approach, it is likely that the COVID pandemic would adversely impact communities, the vulnerable and also our economy

The ongoing work to recover and become resilient requires an ongoing commitment from staff and people in communities. Progress may be hindered through the need to focus on the pandemic phase and the potential lack of capacity and resilience across all sectors and communities, to take forward the key considerations of recovery

Details of knock-on effects identified
