Argyll and Bute Outcomes Improvement Plan 2024-2034

The Community Planning Partnership is preparing to publish its next Local Outcomes Improvement Plan, which will provide the focus for its work over the next ten years. Based on extensive community consultation, input from partners and a review of existing data, the top three priority themes that the plan will seek to improve are: (1) Transport Infrastructure; (2) Housing; (3) Community Wellbeing.

The Community Planning Partnership Bulletin will now seek to spotlight information relevant to each of these priority themes, as well as previously established cross-cutting themes that will continue to be a part of our work.

Outcome 2: Housing

Have your say: Social Housing Net Zero Standard in Scotland

The Scottish Government wants all of our homes to be warmer, greener and more efficient, and is committed to ensuring that everyone in Scotland, no matter their financial situation, has access to good quality housing that they can afford to heat.

The social housing sector has led the way on energy efficiency in recent years and is well placed to build on this further while building in longer term ambition to transition to clean heating. These actions will see the sector make a vital contribution to achieving our ambitious climate change emissions reductions targets.

Have your say: Proposals for a Heat in Buildings Bill

Like many other countries, Scotland has a legal target to reach 'net zero' greenhouse gas emissions. The way we heat our homes, workplaces and other buildings is the third-largest cause of greenhouse gas emissions in Scotland.

Scotland cannot meet our legal obligation to reach 'net zero' without changing the heating systems in the vast majority of our buildings.

The purpose of this consultation is to make you aware of proposals to make new laws around the heating systems that can be used in homes and places of work, and to invite your views on those proposals.

The Scottish Government plans to:

- reconfirm that the use of polluting heating systems will be prohibited after 2045; and
- as a pathway to 2045, require those purchasing a home or business premises to end their use of polluting heating systems within a fixed period following completion of the sale

- introduce a new law that will require homeowners to make sure that their homes meet a reasonable minimum energy efficiency standard by 2033
- require private landlords to meet this minimum energy efficiency standard by 2028

The consultation describes proposals for how home owners and landlords can meet this standard – either through installing a number of simple insulation and draught-proofing measures, where those are possible, or by meeting a certain level of heat demand.



Outcome 3: Community Wellbeing Supporting Communities Fund open for applications

Argyll & Bute Council's Supporting Communities Fund (SCF) is now open for applications.

Not-for-profit community organisations, who have a constitution or a Scheme of Establishment are eligible to apply for up to £2,500 to support community projects based on the following themes:

- Fairer Communities tackling poverty by sharing opportunities
- Resilient Communities capacity building, as well as repairing and rebuilding from the pandemic
- Greener, Cleaner Communities environmental action to support addressing climate change

Have your say: Independent review of Community Learning and Development (CLD)

An independent review of Community Learning and Development (CLD) is seeking views from Community Planning partners.

The Scottish Government is conducting a review of CLD and has appointed an independent reviewer to find out what is working well and what could be improved, with a focus on the learning element of CLD.

The review will include an online consultation and a number of engagement events which Community Planning partners are being encouraged to contribute to and participate in.

The <u>Consultation and Call for Evidence</u> is open from 22nd January to 3rd March and has been designed for responses from the learner or potential future learner perspective, with input from interested stakeholders also sought.

Three regional engagement events will also be held across Scotland which will consist of meetings with invitees including CPP members and visits to see CLD in action, and these will be complemented by three online engagement events with one session to be held exclusively for CLD practioners and CPP members in the Highlands and Islands.

Further details of the review, consultation and engagement events will be shared on the <u>dedicated</u> <u>Independent Review web page</u>.

The review will culminate in a series of recommendations to be presented to the Minister for Higher Education, Further Education and Skills before the end of June.

Poverty has returned to close to pre-pandemic levels with children and working-age adults with children experiencing the highest rates of poverty. Minority ethnic groups and people with a disability also face high levels of poverty.

Transformation Programme Launches Leadership Practitioner Forum



A new Leadership Practitioner Forum is being launched as part of the current Improvement Service and Solace Scotland transformation work, looking at proposals for a future operating model for councils and options for the future delivery of council services.

The Forum will be a network for aspiring Chief Executives, Directors and Heads of Service, led and supported by the Improvement Service with current local authority Chief Executives. Members of the Leadership Practitioner Forum will attend a series of events that focus on <u>the anchors and</u> <u>associated workstreams of the transformation programme</u>, bringing colleagues together to explore topics and challenges.

These events and the wider Forum will also provide an opportunity for members to contribute to the development of the six anchors and answer key questions about the direction of the transformation programme and how it can progress.

Getting involved with the Leadership Practitioner Forum is a great way to ensure that this radical transformation programme aligns with the priorities of your local council or Community Planning Partnership (CPP).

An investment scam is where you are convinced to move your money into a fictitious fund or pay for a fake investment which promised a high return.




People may be targeted by cold callers or presented with fake investment opportunities promoted on search engines and social media pressuring you to act quickly.


Argyll and Bute Council – Advice and Assistance in the Cost of Living Crisis



The council and partners are working to support people and businesses affected by the cost of living crisis in Argyll and Bute. Please find here a summary of that work, the sources of help and advice that are available and please feel free to share this with third parties and other

DETAILS:

Argyll and Bute's island, rural and mainland geography brings additional cost to our citizens' day to day lives (as highlighted in a report to Council on 29th September). For fuel costs alone this means that 70% of our households are at risk of fuel poverty or extreme fuel poverty; impact on additional key areas of living are outlined in the graphic below and at the end of this information note.



Working with partners to support people and businesses:

The council's FIAG group (Financial Inclusion and Advice Group) brings together council services and support agencies. To make it as easy as possible for people to get support when they need it the council provides a 'one-stop-shop' of information on our website to provide key information and also help and information on money saving initiatives such as cheaper deals for internet connection and the availability of warm spaces provide by other organisations: www.argyll-bute.gov.uk/advice-services

We summarise below some of the help available:

Fuel

FIAG brings together different sources of support specifically with fuel costs on our website: <u>Heat</u> <u>your home - managing rising costs (argyll-bute.gov.uk)</u>. This includes information about warm spaces – (link may be slow to load) <u>https://www.argylltsi.org/warmspaces.html</u>

Money

Bute Advice Centre and ALIenergy produced a <u>booklet highlighting financial support services</u> <u>available across Argyll and Bute</u>. This includes for example maximising income, foodbanks, energy and budgeting advice. It has been widely circulated to Elected members, across the NHS, Schools, support agencies and is available on the <u>Bute Advice Centre website</u>.

Argyll and Bute Scotland Loves Local Gift Cards The Council is rolling out an initiative to provide £120 gift cards to around 6,650 Council Tax Reduction recipients. This will support households on low incomes and the local businesses registered for the card.

The Council is looking at a proposal to develop Welfare Rights & Health Partnerships in Argyll & Bute. The pilot is looking at 5 practices within Mid-Argyll, Kintyre & Islay where the Council would

embed Local Authority welfare advice specialists within the practice's healthcare setting for an average of one day per week per practice.

Data mining to identify benefits eligibility and maximise household income The Council's Data Advisory Group is working on matching data from relevant council systems to identify unmet benefit eligibility so we can support eligible households to maximize their income.

Food

<u>Flexible Food Fund</u>: The Fund provides a one-off cash payment to families on low incomes to help with food and fuel. The size of the payment is based on their household composition. Claimants are offered a second cash payment if they have engaged with support agencies, the Bute Advice Centre and ALIEnergy, in financial management. The project achieved national acclaim in October 2021 for Excellence in Innovation from the Institute of Revenue Rating and Valuation. Over 96% of people receiving the first grant payment engage, get the support they need and get a second payment; applicants, through different routes, have received a total of £2 million they could otherwise have missed out on.

Food banks: there is a list of food banks on the council's website

Clothing

Preloved School Clothing Project. The Council and its schools are working with community groups to give every child in Argyll and Bute access to a school uniform, by developing a uniform re-use scheme. There is a reused school uniform hub in Helensburgh, one nearing completion in Campbeltown, and work in in planning for schemes for Dunoon, Rothesay, Oban and Lochgilphead, Tarbert, Islay and Mull. <u>School uniform scheme information</u>

Support

Additional funding for advice agencies. The Council has provided £40,000 in funding to ALIenergy, Bute Advice Centre and the Argyll and Bute Citizens Advice Bureau to help them meet increasing demands from the public between 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023.

Anti-poverty training. The Poverty Alliance has delivered training across the Council and Community Planning Partners on anti-poverty actions and this will be extended to elected members on 30 November.

Promoting information

The Council's Communications Team is already using social media and also statements provided to local press in the area to reach groups and individuals who perhaps don't use social media to make people who need it, aware of support available, using for example digital and traditional media channels, and word of mouth, inviting the help of Councillors, council employees, partner agencies and the public in passing information on, via whatever channels they have, to people who need it.

What is GRANTnet?

- Up-to-date information on over 7,000 grants and other incentives,
- Rapid identification of funding sources specific to need,
- Data sourced from EC and UK Government sources, including Government departments, local authorities, charitable trusts and corporate sponsors.

How to access GRANTnet

Access the GRANTnet home page

When using the system for the first time, <u>go to the 'Log in / Register' page</u> and enter your details including your e-mail address (this will become the username), name, organisation, postal address and telephone number. Clicking on the 'Register' button will generate an e-mail providing a password.

Using GRANTnet - When you log into the system you must answer some questions about your organisation and the project which you wish to undertake. GRANTnet will then provide an overview of all the funds available.
