# 1 CPCScotland 'For Kids' Sake' Campaign Launches Today

In this new 7 week For Kids' Sake... campaign, Child Protection Committees Scotland are asking everyone to look and listen carefully for signs that all is not well for a child, and pay full attention if a child or young person's behaviour has changed. Designed specifically to coincide with the school holidays, the campaign uses a series of vivid, summery images combined with direct "instruction" phrases encouraging action. The campaign not only asks family members, friends and members of the local community to be alert to signs that all is not well, but also not to stay silent if they're worried about a child.

This Scotland-wide digital campaign launched today and will run for 7 weeks on our public-facing Child Protection Scotland social media streams and website. Content will be posted throughout the campaign via our social media streams - Facebook, Twitter and Instagram - using our @childprotectsco handle. The campaign features a wide range of eye-catching new illustrations and short animations, "instruction" messages, and the campaign hashtag **#forkidssake**.

# 2 Framework for Risk Assessment Management and Evaluation (FRAME) with children aged 12-17 & Care & Risk Management (CARM)

This update of the 2014 guidance outlines the standards and operational requirements for risk practice in circumstances where a child's behaviour may pose an imminent risk of serious harm or has caused serious harm.

This framework recognises that in all circumstances where aspects of a child's behaviour has or may pose a risk of serious harm to others, initial consideration as to whether child protection actions are required is critical. Consideration should be given to the need to protect any child harmed, as well as to whether the child who has caused the harm is in need of protection, as research tells us that often children who have caused serious harm have experienced trauma in their own lives and are potentially still living in that trauma situation. However, where there is a risk of serious harm to others, additional guidance is required for the management and reduction of the potential risk of harm. This document provides the standards, guidance and operational requirements for risk practice.

Section 1 is the Framework for Risk Assessment Management and Evaluation (FRAME) for children aged 12-17.

Section 2 of the document provides updated operational requirements for implementing Care and Risk Management (CARM), the proposed best practice formal risk management process, underpinned by the principles of risk practice through a child-centric lens.

The governance and oversight requirements sit with Child Protection Committee's and are as follows:-

- CPC will provide oversight and scrutiny of the functioning of the CARM process, the decision-making, views of children and their parents/ carers involved.
- When a child subject to CARM process has been involved in an incident where further harm has resulted from their behaviour the CARM chair must notify the CPC for consideration about whether a Learning Review is required.

A proposed dataset for monitoring data on the use of the CARM process is included.

### 3 Modern slavery and child trafficking

The Home Office has published guidance for a pilot programme that will test alternative models of decision making for child victims of modern slavery and human trafficking. The ten pilot programmes in England, Wales and Scotland start in June 2021 and will run for 12 months. Separate guidance for the pilot site of Glasgow City Council is due to be published in recognition that Scotland operates with devolved legislation and has a different statutory framework regarding child welfare, protection and human trafficking.

## 4 ACEs, Distance and Sources of Resilience

This CYCJ report shares findings from their 2019 secure care census, which measured the prevalence of a range of life experiences encountered by children resident within Scotland's secure care estate on one particular day in 2019.

Key findings include:

74% of children surveyed had been exposed to four or more ACEs prior to entering secure care – higher than the 64% recorded in the 2018 census

Even greater levels of exposure were found amongst those children who lived in relative poverty, with 86% of children having been exposed to four or more ACEs.

Sixty three percent of children had been placed in secure care by a Scottish local authority, and 37% from England and Wales

Being placed by a local authority from outwith Scotland was found to be a statistically significant factor in a child's exposure to ACEs

Most Scottish children were placed less than 50 miles from their family. For children from England and Wales, 69% were placed more than 300 miles away from families.

The majority of children from Scottish local authorities were boys, (63%) but most from outwith Scotland were girls (56%)

There was an increase in the number of 16 and 17 year old children in secure care

# 11 Children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities

NSPCC Learning has published an evaluation of the implementation of the NSPCC's Keeping Safe programme in five schools for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and additional support needs in Northern Ireland between 2016 and 2018. The programme aims to support school staff and parents to deliver sensitive messages to children about recognising abusive behaviours. The evaluation found that the programme can be implemented in the context of the special school, with the right support and resources.

# 12 SEND: old issues, new issues, next steps

Ofsted has published a report about the experiences of children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and their families during the coronavirus pandemic, in the context of the SEND reforms over the last 10 years. Findings from visits by Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission in 2020/21 to 10 local areas representing 84,000 children and young people with special educational needs (SEN) support show: the cumulative effects of the disruption caused by the pandemic on the health, learning and development of children with SEND; missed and narrowed education; the absence of essential services such as physiotherapy or speech and language support; and long waiting times for assessment and treatment.

During a Ministerial Statement on Redress for Survivors (Historical Child Abuse in Care) Scotland Act 2021 in the Scottish Parliament the Chair of Redress Scotland was announced as Johnny Gwynne, former Deputy Chief Constable of Police Scotland and past director of the UK National Crime Agency with responsibility for tackling child exploitation.
