## NEWS

More support will be available to families and households to help cover the cost of life's essentials and to deal with emergencies.

First Minister John Swinney has confirmed that £10 million originally earmarked in 2025-26 to support the two-child limit mitigation payment in Scotland will be reallocated to tackling child poverty.

The majority of the funding will be split between charities and government programmes that provide emergency financial support, including:

The [Scottish Welfare Fund](#) is made up of two different grants (Crisis Grant and Community Care Grant) which can be applied for through local authorities and do not need to be paid back. To apply for a grant from the Scottish Welfare Fund you must be 16 or older and on a low income or getting certain benefits.

[Aberlour Children's Charity](#) will receive £550,000 in 2025/26 towards their Urgent Assistance Fund, which provides emergency cash grants to help families who are struggling to provide essentials such as food, heating, beds and clothing for their children. Since April 2021, the fund has supported 28,455 people.

[Children First](#) will receive £1.5 million in 2025/26 to provide funds to families in crisis and to support Children First's helpline for people with money and financial wellbeing issues.

The [Corra Foundation](#) will receive £1.5 million to provide emergency support to households via a new 2025-2026 iteration of their Household Hardship Fund (HHF). This will pass on funding to locally led organisations with established connections with households on low incomes facing hardship and poverty. The previous 2023 HHF, supported by the Scottish Government and other funders, was estimated to reach over 17,000 people.

The Scottish Government's tackling child poverty delivery plan for 2022-26, '[Best Start, Bright Futures](#)', sets out the action being taken across a range of policy areas to reduce child poverty, provide immediate support families and scale up employment support for parents. Projects supported by just under an additional £1 million investment include Local Employability Partnerships, Ending Homelessness Together, Women Returners support and the King's Trust's NHS employability programmes.

### **New funding available for charities working on employability, financial capability and nature**

Aberdeen Group Charitable Trust have launched their strategy with a funding round open now for applications. The Trust's focus will be on working with charities that support people directly by building financial capability and creating pathways to fair work.

The Trust has three main funding programmes (Ideas, Initiatives, and Insights). These are designed to deliver impact where it matters most:

- **[Initiatives](#)** – this programme makes substantial multiyear grants aligned to direct programme delivery. Each round will focus on either employability, financial capability or nature. Grants of up to £1m available for small-to-medium sized charities. Initiatives fund is open now until 4th February.
  - **[Ideas](#)** – this fund supports charities to carry out pilot projects that develop sustainable solutions to persistent challenges. Opening in March. Funding of between £20,000 and £180,000 is available worldwide for organisations working in the communities where Aberdeen Group is based.
  - **[Insights](#)** – this programme funds research on financial capability and routes to fair work to inform future action. Opening later in 2026.

### **Youth Scotland - Rural Action Fund – [Deadline Looming 12<sup>th</sup> February 2026](#)**

Micro grants of between £100 - £750 are available for youth groups in Scotland to enhance and develop community-based youth work in Scotland's rural communities. Awards are made to enable youth groups operating in rural communities to provide more and/or better youth work opportunities for young people. The fund aims to expand and improve community-based youth work in Scotland's rural communities, remove barriers to the access of youth work provision and build youth work capacity across Scotland. Groups must plan to spend the grant within six to nine months of receiving it.

### **[Scottish Government's Community and Renewable Energy Scheme \(CARES\)](#) [Deadline Looming 28<sup>th</sup> February 2026](#)**

Grants are available for community groups in Scotland at the early stages of their community-owned energy or shared ownership journey. Local Energy Scotland administers the Scottish Government's Community and

Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES). Local Energy Scotland provides free impartial advice and support for community groups, rural businesses, social enterprises and other stakeholders to advance local energy projects. Grants of up to £30,000 to cover up to 100% of eligible costs are available. Scottish constituted non-profit distributing organisations can apply.

Examples of support for early-stage capacity building activities include:

- Funding for events.
- Community consultations.
- Community energy plans or action plans.
- Renewable energy option appraisals.
- Initial legal advice.
- Support for part-time or temporary staff or a development officer to take your project forward.

### **Half a million-pound landmark for Argyll & Bute community fund**

The An Suidhe Wind Farm Community Fund has marked a funding milestone with more than £500,000 distributed in grants to local projects in Argyll and Bute. Since its launch in 2011, the fund has awarded grants to over 140 diverse community projects across the region, including support for childcare, heritage, education, and community facilities.

In the latest funding round, £27,830 was awarded to six community projects across the **Glenorchy and Innishail, Inveraray, Furnace, and Dalavich** areas.

The grants were approved by a local community panel made up of residents and representatives from the four community council areas. The panel's local knowledge and insight ensure that funding decisions remain community-focused, meeting the real needs of the area.

Organisations based within the Fund area of benefit are encouraged to apply.

## **ARTS AND CULTURE**

### **1. Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust - Emerging Maker Grants**

Grants are available for the training and education of UK-based early-career craftspeople who wish to develop their skills and expertise. The grant provides between £3,000 and £10,000 for essential skills training. The grant is open to all UK based makers who identify their practice within the field of craft and have a strong foundation and clear commitment to their craft. Emerging makers are defined as individuals at an early stage of their career, who have been in professional practice for four years or less.

## 2. BFI Filmmaking Fund - Discovery Feature Funding

Funding is available to debut directors to support original live action and animation feature filmmaking in the UK. Discovery feature funding provides awards of up to £1 million for projects with debut directors and a production budget between £1 million and £3.5 million. Funding is a contribution towards the total budget of the film and can be used for crew and cast payments, production fees, legal costs etc.

## 3. BFI National Lottery Creative Challenge Fund

The funding is intended to support UK-based organisations in designing and delivering creative project development programmes in feature film and narrative immersive media. These programmes should benefit participants and their projects by supporting writers, directors, producers and immersive artists. The amount of funding depends on the timeframe and ambition of the applicant's programme. Applicants can apply for between £12,000 and £150,000 for one edition (or call) for their programme, which should run for a maximum of 12 months. BFI can consider making awards for up to three editions of a programme at no more than £150,000 per edition.

## 4. Jerwood Foundation

Discretionary grants are available for arts organisations across the UK to support a variety of projects and activities that make the arts available for public benefit.

## 5. Association for Industrial Archaeology - Restoration Grants

Funding is available for the restoration of historically, technically, architecturally, and/or archaeologically important industrial buildings, structures, machinery, vehicles and vessels within the UK. Two funding streams are available:

- Major projects - up to £30,000. Grants must form a significant portion of the total project costs (normally, at least 20% of the total project costs).
- Small projects - up to £10,000 for projects with total costs of no more than £12,500.

The grant is for capital funding only, not ongoing revenue funding.

## 6. Music for All - Community Project Funding

Discretionary grants are available to UK-based community groups that aim to bring musical projects to their local communities. In the current round, support will be available in the following distinct areas:

- Groups working with those facing chronic diseases and conditions affecting quality of life
- Groups working with those facing financial hardship
- Youth clubs and comparable organisations
- Pure tone classical guitar 1/2 size C45A Natural
- Descant recorders

## 7. Richard and Siobhán Coward Foundation - Grants for Analogue Photography

Grants are available to support photographers in projects taking place in the UK for which use of analogue techniques are central to implementation.

Grants of between £500 and £1,500 are available.

Normally, projects benefitting from these grants would be expected to last for up to one year's duration, and be implementable within the year of the grant being awarded.

## 8. William Syson Foundation

The aim of this fund is to support projects and activities that promote the advancement of the arts, heritage, and culture. This includes, but is not limited to, the promotion and development of the arts, including music, the visual arts, theatre, and literature. Grants of up to £5,000 are available.

#### 9. Elephant Trust

Grants are available to artists, small organisations and galleries within the UK to make it possible for artists and those presenting their work to undertake and complete projects when frustrated by lack of funds. Grants are usually between £2,000 and £5,000, but some larger grants may be awarded.

#### 10. BFI National Lottery Audience Projects Fund

Funding is available to support various audience related activities in the UK, including film festivals, distribution releases, multiplatform distribution proposals, touring film programmes, large scale and ambitious film programmes. Grants of between £20,000 and £200,000 are available, with an upper limit of £500,000 for projects of exceptional scale and ambition.

#### 11. Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts-based Learning Fund

The funding of up to £ 300,000 is intended to create a more equitable school system where high-quality arts-based learning is a core part of all children's education. Applications will be accepted from:

Arts and cultural organisations working in partnership with formal education settings (including state-funded primary and secondary schools, SEND specialist schools, Further Education colleges, alternative provision settings such as Pupil Referral Units, and some types of state-funded Early Years settings).

Organisations that are developing established programmes of work and/or testing new approaches.

#### 12. Creative Scotland – Open Fund for Individuals

Supports a wide range of activity initiated by artists, writers, producers and other creative practitioners in Scotland. The fund is intended to support periods of research, development and/or delivery of creative activity, such as specific projects and productions for up to 24 months. It can support an individual's time where this is related to specific creative outcomes. Grants are available for amounts between £500 and £50,000.

#### 13. National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations

This fund aims to support organisations who seek funding to undertake creative activity such as a specific project or production, a programme of creative work, or a period of research and development. This includes funding for: a specific one-off project or production or a period of creative research and development or a longer term programme of work.

It can also support organisations to undertake business and organisational development that will: enhance their business sustainability through the development of new or more diverse income streams, or consider broader organisational development costs.

Eligible organisations can apply for funding between £1k and £100k for projects or programmes lasting up to 18 months.

Grants of £100 to £2,000 are available for the UK's most talented young instrumentalists in any genre, aged five to 17 years of age who, because of financial need, may be prevented from fulfilling their creative potential.

#### 15. BFI National Lottery Audience Projects Fund

Grants of between £20,000 and £200,000 are available to support various audience related activities in the UK, including film festivals, distribution releases, multiplatform distribution proposals, touring film programmes, large scale and ambitious film programmes. Applications are accepted all year round but must be submitted 16 weeks before any funded activity.

#### 16. Creative Scotland – National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations

Grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 are for constituted artistic, creative, or cultural organisations across Scotland to deliver a variety of creative projects and activities and enable business changes or development projects that make the organisation more financially sustainable. The fund is open all year round.

## BUSINESS AND ENTERPRISE

### 17. eBay Circular Fashion Fund

The eBay Circular Fashion Fund is a funding programme for startups and small businesses developing solutions that support a more circular approach to fashion. It focuses on initiatives that extend product life, keep materials in use and reduce waste across the fashion sector. Max. value £ 223,896.

Grants are available to bring empty properties back into productive use in Argyll and Bute. The funding supports property owners and tenants in Argyll and Bute with the costs of refurbishing or repurposing empty business premises to bring them back into use.

### 19. SWEF Business Grants

Grants are available for young entrepreneurs across the UK, aged between 18 and 30, to start or grow a new business.

The following levels of funding are available:

- Start-up grants of up to £500 for pre-revenue businesses or businesses turning over less than £500 per month.
- Business grants of up to £2,000 for businesses turning over more than £500 per month that have been trading for less than two years.

### 20. Startup Mull

Grants to support any early-stage business on Mull (and surrounding islands) to become established and successful. Any start-up business, working in any industry, established within 12 months and based on Mull (or nearby islands) can apply for support. Existing businesses may be considered for an award but applications must demonstrate how the grant will achieve major changes to the business. Grants between £5,000 and £10,000 are offered and paid directly to the business.

Equity investments available to early-stage UK SMEs that demonstrate high growth potential. Although MMC Ventures can provide investments to companies in any sector, they tend to focus support on the following:

### 22. Pentech Ventures

Pentech invests in teams who believe they can build a category leading software company. Areas of interest include: Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning; Big Data; Infrastructure such as Blockchain; and verticals that are enabled via the efficient use of AI and new infrastructure approaches, such as FinServ, Health, and Enterprise Transformation. Initial investment is likely to be £500,000 to £2 million, with up to £10 million invested over the lifetime of the investment.

### 23. Highlands and Islands Enterprise - Green Grant Fund

The funding is intended to help businesses or social enterprises with projects to reduce or green their energy usage and make progress towards achieving net zero carbon emissions, for example energy efficiency measures, renewables, active non-commuting business travel and waste management. Grants of between £20,000 and £250,000 are available (covering between 10% and 40% of the total cost of a project).

#### **24. Oban Business Improvement District Frontage Grant Scheme**

The Oban Business Improvement District Frontage Grant Scheme offers grant funding to any existing commercial business operating in the town that wishes to improve the appearance of its business frontage, signage or environment. The maximum grant will be £1,200 per business or 75% of the costs. There is an expectation that businesses will use local contractors wherever possible.

#### **25. Access to Work**

Financial assistance is available to help organisations in Great Britain with any extra employment costs that result from employing a person with a disability. Access to Work provides grants to employers towards extra employment costs which result from an employee having a disability. The programme aims to provide practical advice and support to disabled people and their employers, in order to overcome work related obstacles which result from disability.

#### 34. Kelly Family Charitable Trust

Grants are available for UK registered charities, working locally or regionally in the United Kingdom, whose activities nurture and support family life. The three principal areas that the charity wishes to support are: Interventions that support families and help them in ways that prevent the fracture of the family unit, eg relationship counselling, mediation.

Families where sexual abuse, physical abuse, domestic violence, alcohol abuse and drugs abuse threaten the integrity of the family unit.

Prisoners and in particular their families, during and after the period of imprisonment.

The Charity supports families with children aged 3-17 who have learning difficulties, physical or mental disabilities, acute, chronic or life limiting illnesses, been abused or neglected, witnessed domestic violence, been bereaved or act as carers for a parent or a sibling.

#### 44. Mother and Baby Unit Family Fund

A Mother and Baby Unit (MBU) is a specialist inpatient unit for people who:

- develop severe mental health problems in the later stages of pregnancy
- develop severe mental health problems during the year after their baby is born

You can claim towards the cost of travel, food and accommodation when you're visiting someone in an MBU, if you are the:

- partner of the person who gave birth
- baby's other parent
- main carer of the person who gave birth
