Argyll and Bute Council has introduced a single [Business Funding Enquiry Form](#) (BFEF) to help local businesses access the right funding and support. By completing this form, your enquiry will be shared internally with the relevant Council teams who manage a range of funding opportunities.



Completing a BFEF does not guarantee funding, but it ensures your enquiry is routed to the appropriate team for consideration. You need only complete the BFEF once. Specific application forms will be issued for relevant support.

What we need to know

The form collects key information about your business and project, including:

- Business type, sector, and size
- Funding needs and intended use
- Project stage and timeframe
- Expected impact on jobs, community, or the local economy

National Lottery Awards for All Scotland: Glasgow 2026

Grants are available to community organisations in Scotland for sports and cultural activity inspired by the Glasgow 2026 Commonwealth Games. The Fund is intended to enable projects that use sport, arts and community engagement to get people active, bring communities together and create local celebrations, ensuring the benefits of Glasgow 2026 are felt across Scotland. Grants of up to £10,000 are available. **Interested organisations can call 0300 123 7110 or email advicescotland@tnlcommunityfund.org.uk to discuss their projects before applying.**

Tesco Fruit and Veg Grants

New grant programme, Tesco Fruit & Veg grants, is now open for applications.

The focus of the fund is getting schools who lack funds and resources to apply for extra financial help they might need to provide healthy food and activities that boost young people's mental and physical wellbeing.

Priority is given to projects working in schools and organisations nominated by Tesco staff.

Customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK vote on which of three local projects they wish to support.

The customer vote determines the amount of money a project receives:

Grants of up to £1,500 for the project with the most votes.

Grants of up to £1,000 for the second most votes.

Grants of up to £500 for the third most votes.

Projects will be shortlisted every four months.

Applications are open to all local good causes that support children and young people, with a particular focus on projects that incorporate provision of healthy food including fruit and veg, such as breakfast clubs, providing holiday club lunches or healthy snacks.

Examples include:

- Breakfast/after-school clubs that provide fruit and veg for pupils
- Sports clubs that provide healthy food as part of the project or at half time
- Growing initiatives to grow fruit and veg or cooking classes using the food to learn
- Holiday clubs that provide healthy meals and snacks
- Projects providing SEND provision with healthy snacks/meals
- Youth clubs that provide a healthy meal/snack
- Addressing holiday hunger amongst children outside of school time
- Healthy eating projects that support families to cook healthy meals on a budget
- Foodbanks to provide food support to families

King Charles III Charitable Fund Reopens 5 August for Small Grants Applications (UK)

UK registered not-for-profit organisations with an annual income of between £25,000 and £500,000 can apply for small grants of up to £3,000 per year, for up to three years (a total of £9,000).

The next round is focused on projects working across the following two themes:

Heritage and conservation – the preservation of historic and culturally important buildings and traditional craftsmanship, together with the sustainable regeneration of communities and the built environment across the globe.

Education – supporting education, training and employability opportunities through which young people and adults can fulfil their potential. This includes grants to non-profit organisations working to narrow the attainment gap, support broader education through music, the arts, sports and outdoor pursuits, as well as investing in teachers continuing professional development.

Priority will be given to projects serving the most disadvantaged communities.

The funding is restricted and must be used exclusively for the project. Core costs or staff salaries may be covered, provided these expenses are directly attributable to the delivery of the project.

Pathways to Work Innovation Fund – opens September 2026

The Government has announced the Pathways to Work Innovation Fund, offering up to £60 million to support projects that develop and test new approaches to helping disabled people and people with health conditions enter and remain in employment.

The programme invites applications from businesses, charities, public sector organisations and innovators across the UK. Funding is intended to support the development and testing of innovative employment support models that could improve outcomes for disabled people and those with health conditions.

This programme will be delivered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP).

The Fund will open for bids in September 2026. Full details on how to apply will be published in due course.

ARTS AND CULTURE

1. Association of Independent Museums (AIM) – Museum Fundamentals Grant Programme

Grants of up to £20,000 are available for small-to-medium sized museums across the UK to support core museum activities such as conservation, collection care, and exhibition development. This fund aims to support museums with core activities, enabling them to care for collection's more effectively and efficiently and to meet the standards required for Accreditation.

2. PRS Foundation - PPL Momentum Music Fund

Grants are available to support the development of talented emerging UK musicians and bands, helping them to sustain and develop their careers. Grants of between £5,000 and £15,000 are available.

3. BFI Filmmaking Fund - Discovery Feature Funding

Funding is available to debut directors to support original live action and animation feature filmmaking in the UK. Discovery feature funding provides awards of up to £1 million for projects with debut directors and a production budget between £1 million and £3.5 million.

4. Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust - Emerging Maker Grants

Grants are available for the training and education of UK-based early-career craftspeople who wish to develop their skills and expertise. The grant provides between £3,000 and £10,000 for essential skills training. The grant is open to all UK based makers who identify their practice within the field of craft and have a strong foundation and clear commitment to their craft. Emerging makers are defined as individuals at an early stage of their career, who have been in professional practice for four years or less. **Applications will open 8 July to 12 August.**

5. Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust - Scholarships and Apprenticeships

Scholarships and apprenticeship support is available to fund further study, training and practical experience for craftsmen and women across the UK who want to improve their craft and trade skills. Scholarships are worth between £3,000 and £18,000, depending on how much funding is required for a project.

6. Agar Trust

Grants are available for young musicians living in rural Scotland to support their musical education and participation in music-related opportunities. Grants of around £200 up to £1,000 are available for individuals aged 8-21 who live in a rural area of Scotland. Grants can contribute towards travel and subsistence costs associated with attending educational opportunities, including short courses, auditions, junior conservatoires, national orchestra, band or choir rehearsals, private tuition, conservatoires or residential music schools.

7. Pear Tree Fund for Music

Grants are available for charities, institutions, and organisations across Scotland to deliver projects and activities that promote the advancement of music. This fund aims to support the promotion of classical music and musicians, projects that promote music to improve health and mental well-being and work with children to further their appreciation of music.

8. The Place's Playground Tour Summer 2027 - Stomping Ground Call Out

A commissioning opportunity for UK-based artists to create a new outdoor dance or movement work for children aged 5-11, with funding and support to develop and tour the work. The aim of the scheme is to support artists to create ambitious, high-quality outdoor performance work that engages children aged 5-11 and can be performed in schools, festivals and public spaces. The commissioned work must be a short solo or duet, ready to premiere in May 2027, and will tour for five weeks during June and July 2027 as part of The Playground Tour. The selected artist will receive a £20,000 commission, up to two weeks of in-kind studio space at The Place, opportunities to test and share the work with children, and creative and producing support.

9. Idlewild Trust

The Trust offers grants of up to £7,000 to registered charities working in the following two areas:

Arts Grants: Nurturing Early Stage Professionals – grants support training opportunities for emerging professionals, working creatively and backstage, within the performing and visual arts, post-training, and at an early stage in their career.

Conservation Grants: Objects and Works of Art – grants support the conservation of cultural heritage of recognised national and international importance in museums, libraries, galleries, historic buildings, or landscapes accessible to the public.

10. PRS Foundation - Open Fund for Music Creators

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to support the development of outstanding UK songwriters and composers of all genres and backgrounds, at different stages of their career.

11. Creative Scotland - Youth Music Initiative Funding

Funding is available to individual musicians, music facilitators, music groups and youth organisations in Scotland for professional development and training activities that will extend and improve music making activities for children and young people. There are three strands to this funding programme:

School Based Music Making (Formula Fund)

This is a managed fund for Scotland's 32 local authorities funding being distributed based on a Scottish Government formula - 'formula funding'. Activity supported through this route will commence at the beginning of the academic year.

Access to Music Making

To create access to high quality music making opportunities for young people aged 0-25 years outside of school time. Open funding applications can apply for between £1,000 and £40,000 for up to 12 months of activity.

Strengthening Youth Music

To support individuals, organisations and networks to undertake strategic action or training that will strengthen the youth music sector in Scotland for the benefit of young people. Organisations and individuals can apply for between £1,000 and £20,000 for up to 12 months of activity.

12. BFI National Lottery Creative Challenge Fund

The funding (£ 150,000) is intended to support UK-based organisations in designing and delivering creative project development programmes in feature film and narrative immersive media. These programmes should benefit participants and their projects by supporting writers, directors, producers and immersive artists.

13. Freelands Foundation – Learning Through Making Fund

Grants are available for UK-based visual art organisations to bring opportunities for making into their work in art education within the UK. Grants of up to £25,000 are available. Proposed projects can be of any length but must take place between 1 January and 31 December 2027. Applications will be considered from UK based visual arts organisations which are run with a charitable purpose and for public benefit.

This includes, but is not limited to:

- Organisations registered with The Charity Commission for England and Wales, the Scottish Charity Regulator, or The Charity Commission for Northern Ireland.
- Exempt charities.
- Galleries, museums, or organisations which are part of a Local Authority.
- Galleries, museums, or organisations part of a larger charitable organisation, such as a university.
- Community Interest Companies (CICs), Community Benefit Societies, and other organisations with charitable purposes run for public benefit.

14. Theatre Improvement Scheme

Grants of up to £20,000 are available for not-for-profit theatres in the UK for capital improvement projects that will improve environmental sustainability.

15. Scops Arts Trust

A limited number of grants are available to charities across the UK for new high quality projects that provide opportunities for people from all backgrounds to access, enjoy and participate in the arts.

16. Association of Independent Museums (AIM) Collections Care Audits

Grants available to enable small museums to undertake a basic, professional collections care audit. This fund aims to support museums to care for their collections more effectively and efficiently in the long-term, to meet the standards required for Accreditation, and will give museums the option to undertake an audit before making a full application to the AIM Collections Care Grant Scheme. Grants of £1,200 are available.

17. Fidelio Trust

Grant funding of up to £5,000 to help individuals (over 21 years) and groups of exceptional ability in the UK that would not otherwise be able to carry out an artistic project or activity without financial support.

18. Youth Music - NextGen Fund

Grants of up to £3,000 are available to young creatives in the UK to help them take a step forward to participating in and changing the music industries. The funding is intended help early-stage musicians and wider music adjacent creatives to invest in their own projects and make their ideas happen. The fund is especially aimed at those whose lack of finance holds them back from pursuing their goals.

19. Michael Tippett Musical Foundation

Grants are available to support projects and activities that support young musicians and composers, new music, and music education initiatives. Grants of between £500 and £3,000 are available. The average grant is around £2,000. This fund aims to support group music-making, especially those that involve young people in the process of composing and developing new ideas.

20. Creative Scotland - Touring Fund for Theatre and Dance

Grants are available to support the touring of theatre and dance, enhancing opportunities for artists, producers and companies to work more collaboratively with venues to grow audiences and provide greater access to high quality work across Scotland. The Touring Fund for Theatre and Dance has been developed as a collaboration between Creative Scotland, the Federation of Scottish Theatre and their members. The scheme is supported by the National Lottery through Creative Scotland. The funding is intended to support touring of high-quality theatre and dance (including outdoor, circus, interdisciplinary and site-specific work).

21. Richard and Siobhán Coward Foundation - Grants for Community Photography

Grants are available to support the provision of participatory projects in the UK which seek to improve the health and wellbeing of children and young people under 25. The use of photography must be a core element of the project. Activities must have the ultimate aim of achieving a beneficial therapeutic effect on the children's or young people's physical and/or mental health and wellbeing. Grants of between £500 and £1,500 are available.

22. Oppenheim-John Downes Memorial Trust

Small grants are available to British artists, designers, writers and performers over the age of 30 who are experiencing financial difficulties in the pursuit of their careers. Awards typically range from £250 to £1,000.

23. VisitScotland - National Events Programme

Funding is available towards cultural and sporting events, designed to showcase specific towns and regions across Scotland, outside of the key metropolitan areas of Glasgow and Edinburgh. Awards of between £5,000 and £25,000 are available to events which can demonstrate alignment with key impact areas identified in the national events strategy, Scotland the Perfect Stage. These events will have delivery budgets in excess of £20,000 and attract more than 1,000 in-person attendees, while showcasing Scotland's key event and tourism assets.

24. Business Catalyst (Small) Grants

Grants of up to £2,000 available to self-employed, sole traders or micro businesses in the jewellery, silversmithing and allied industries to help them grow.

25. Heritage Crafts Association - Endangered Crafts Fund

Grants are available for craft practitioners, community groups and voluntary organisations across the United Kingdom to deliver projects that protect endangered crafts and provide opportunities for makers and trainees to develop their skills. Grants of up to £2,500 are available.

26. The Charlotte Aitkens Trust

Grants of up to £2,500 are available for charitable organisations within the UK who promote the creative arts for the public benefit, especially literature, whether fiction, non-fiction drama or poetry. The Trust will only accept applications from organisations whose core purpose is in the support of literature and literacy.

27. Screen Scotland - Film Festival and Screening Programme Fund

Grants are available to support organisations in Scotland that produce film festivals and public screening programmes that increase the reach, depth and diversity of screen culture for audiences. The Film Festival and Screening Programme Fund is provided by Screen Scotland. Grants of between £15,000 and £45,000 are available (if applying for Development Funding, this amount is **per year**).

28. Passion Play Directors Development Programme

The grants of £2,000 are intended to develop outdoor community theatre, encourage a new generation of Passion Play directors, strengthen directing skills through professional mentoring, and support high-quality productions that bring the Easter story to local communities.

29. Association of Independent Museums (AIM) Training Grants

Grants are available to support member museums across the UK in developing the skills and expertise of their workforce (paid or voluntary). Grants of £350 are available.

30. Turtleton Charitable Trust

Grants are available to registered charities in Scotland for charitable projects in the fields of heritage, the arts and education. Grants are usually for between £5,000 and £25,000, although larger grants or multi-year commitments may be awarded at the discretion of the Trustees in limited circumstances. The Turtleton Charitable Trust was established in 2007 and is administered by Turcan Connell.

31. Creative Scotland - Maoin nan Ealan Gàidhlig

Grants are available to assist individual artists and art organisations with the delivery of Gaelic arts projects in Scotland.

32. Museums Galleries Scotland - Museum Futures: Innovation Fund

Grants are available to museums in Scotland to improve their financial sustainability. Grants of between £20,000 and £250,000 are available. Projects can last up to three years and must begin with six months of the award date.

33. Museums Galleries Scotland - Museum Futures: Unlocking Potential Fund

Grants are available to museums in Scotland to address barriers to strategic development. Grants of between £10,000 and £100,000 are available.

34. Association for Industrial Archaeology - Restoration Grants

Funding is available for the restoration of historically, technically, architecturally, and/or archaeologically important industrial buildings, structures, machinery, vehicles and vessels within the UK. Two funding streams are available: Major projects - up to £30,000. Grants must form a significant portion of the total project costs (normally, at least 20% of the total project costs).

Small projects - up to £10,000 for projects with total costs of no more than £12,500.

35. Golsoncott Foundation

Grants of up to £3,000 are available to voluntary sector organisations in the UK for projects that promote fine arts and music. Applications for the August 2026 trustee meeting are currently being accepted.

The Trustees normally meet on a quarterly basis (February, May, August, and November).

Applications should be submitted at least three weeks before a scheduled trustees' meeting.

36. Made in Scotland: Funding for Onward International Touring

Support available for Scottish artists, companies and organisations, who presented work as part of the Edinburgh Festival Fringe, to take advantage of invitations to present work at international festival and venues. The maximum that applicants can routinely apply for is £15,000.

37. BFI National Lottery Audience Projects Fund

Funding to is available to support various audience related activities in the UK, including film festivals, distribution releases, multiplatform distribution proposals, touring film programmes, large scale and ambitious film programmes. Grants of between £20,000 and £200,000 are available, with an upper limit of £500,000 for projects of exceptional scale and ambition.

38. BFI National Lottery Screen Heritage Fund

The funding is intended to support organisations that hold screen heritage collections to widen access, develop skills and build resilience.

There are three funding strands:

Project funding - for audience-facing projects that ensure more people can engage with heritage collections that better reflect the diversity of the UK; build a thriving screen heritage sector; unlock the UK's screen heritage for education and enjoyment; and help enable everyone to experience a greater range of screen culture.

Resilience funding - to support public screen heritage archives and collection networks across the UK to help the sector adapt and thrive.

Individual Skills funding - to remove the obstacles to getting into the screen heritage sector or for career progression.

The following levels of funding are available:

- Project funding - grants of between £10,000 and £140,000.
- Resilience funding - grants of between £10,000 and £140,000.
- Individual Skills funding - grant of £10,000 per year.

39. Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts-based Learning Fund

The funding of up to £ 300,000 is intended to create a more equitable school system where high-quality arts-based learning is a core part of all children's education. Applications will be accepted from:

Arts and cultural organisations working in partnership with formal education settings (including state-funded primary and secondary schools, SEND specialist schools, Further Education colleges, alternative provision settings such as Pupil Referral Units, and some types of state-funded Early Years settings).

Organisations that are developing established programmes of work and/or testing new approaches.

40. Creative Scotland – Open Fund for Individuals

Supports a wide range of activity initiated by artists, writers, producers and other creative practitioners in Scotland.

The fund is intended to support periods of research, development and/or delivery of creative activity, such as specific projects and productions for up to 24 months. It can support an individual's time where this is related to specific creative outcomes. Grants are available for amounts between £500 and £50,000.

41. National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations

This fund aims to support organisations who seek funding to undertake creative activity such as a specific project or production, a programme of creative work, or a period of research and development. This includes funding for: a specific one-off project or production or

a period of creative research and development or

a longer term programme of work.

It can also support organisations to undertake business and organisational development that will:

enhance their business sustainability through the development of new or more diverse income streams, or consider broader organisational development costs.

Eligible organisations can apply for funding between £1k and £100k for projects or programmes lasting up to 18 months.

42. Awards for Young Musicians
